

### Klamath Gets Car Revenues

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's 38 counties were given \$2,528,859 Monday as their 19 percent share of state motor vehicle revenues collected during the last three months of 1953.

The state's collections in that period totaled \$8,768,063 in gasoline taxes, \$2,143,862 in motor vehicle license fees, \$2,782,925 in taxes on trucks and buses, and \$108,203 in fines for motor vehicle violations. This adds up to \$13,782,845.

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## Farm Surplus Items May Go To Anti-Red Countries In Exchange For Projects

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower was reported today about to propose giving up to one billion dollars worth of farm surpluses to non-Communist countries in exchange for pledges to undertake economic projects.

Officials helping draft the plan said the governments getting the products would be asked to sign agreements to undertake specific projects aimed at bettering the living standards of their people.

Countries which would be eligible would be those hard-pressed for funds to finance such projects, such as India, Pakistan and others, mainly in Asia.

### Showers Stick With Father

BEMIDJI, Minn. (AP) — A father told a public meeting last night his twin boys would be kept from school if they had to take group showers.

Norman G. Moe, a service station employee, told some 60 adults at the meeting, "My children are not going to school if they have to go through that."

"There are plenty of places where they can go to school without being run like beasts in a market place."

Moe was recently given a 90-day suspended sentence on charges of failure to send his children to school. The sentence was suspended on condition he return his 13-year-old boys to school or that he present a physician's certificate indicating they were not in suitable health. The boys were absent last week with rheumatic fever.

The school board granted Moe's request for the public meeting. School authorities indicated an arrangement may be worked out to permit his boys to shower separately.

### School Offers Fishing Course

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — Want to go to college and learn how to fish as one of your courses? You can do it at Florida Southern College here.

Jim Lease, associate professor in the physical education department, conducts the class, which meets an hour a day, three days a week.

The students, both boys and girls, learn to care for their equipment and to clean and cook their fish as well as how to catch them. If they want to preserve a fine catch, they get help in that too, for Lease has studied taxidermy.

### SABOTAGE

ROME (AP) — British Minister of Civil Aviation Alan Lennox-Boyd said Tuesday investigators "are not overlooking the possibility of sabotage" in their probe into the Comet jet crash which took 35 lives Jan. 10.

### Onion Blight Cure Mystery

PORTLAND (AP) — The Pacific Northwest Vegetable Insect Council was told Monday that no way has yet been found to control maggots which are infesting Lake Labish area onions.

Tests with chlordane and other chemical bug killers mixed with seed have resulted in failure, H. H. Crowell of Oregon State College reported.

Tests will continue, however, and the next step will be application of chemicals along the rows, he said.

Lake Labish area growers last year lost 50 to 100 per cent of their crops because of the maggots, Crowell reported.

Other tests revealed that isodrin was effective in controlling cabbage maggots in radish and turnip fields in the Northwest. The chemical gave 98 per cent control in the first year in a test radish plot and 95 per cent control in a turnip patch.

### Mac Spikes Mine Rumor

NEW YORK (AP) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur took issue Tuesday with a Japanese report that he used Japanese minesweepers in Korean War landing operations at Wonsan, Korea, in 1950.

The former Far East commander said the minesweepers were used to clear suspected old Japanese mines from Wonsan and other waters in accordance with terms of the Japanese surrender and that they were not involved in belligerent action.

He said that, on the contrary, their activities were "entirely humanitarian" and that there was no secrecy involved than is normal in such operations.

The Tokyo newspaper Sangyo Keizai had quoted the resigned commander of Japan's Coast Guard, Sanjo Oku, as saying that the use of the vessels constituted a violation of international law.

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### Red Schools Said Best

CINCINNATI (AP) — A Roman Catholic priest who is a professor at the Russian Institute at Fordham University says schools in Russia "may be superior to American schools."

The Rev. Maurice Meyers told a religious meeting at Xavier University yesterday the Soviet educational system has been particularly successful in "achieving discipline and a spirit of devotion to school work."

He said the Russian school system is "now effectively operating throughout virtually the entire land and that attendance at elementary and junior high school is now obligatory for all the children. While strongly tinted with Soviet propaganda the text books in use are interesting and seemingly effective."

Father Meyers warned that Russia wants the ultimate destruction of religion despite a current policy of concession to some religious groups.

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
