Calvary Baptist To Observe Seventh Anniversary Sunday

Sunday, Jan. 24, the Calvary Baptist church will observe the seventh anniversary of its organization.

On Wednesday night, Jan. 22, 1947, a group of Baptist people met in the auditorium of the public library for the purpose of organizing a church. A council was formed by the following ministers: J. M. Cooper, Frank Nixon, R. E. Milam and C. A. Waterhouse. Thirty-five members made up the charter group, which voted to affiliate with the Southern Baptist convention.

Perry M. Johnson was called as the first pastor on March 23, 1947. The church purchased property on the corner of East Main and Garden and held its first worship at that location Jan. 4, 1948.

After the Rev. Johnson resigned, the church called E. R. Jacks of Oklahoma, who became pastor Nov. 1, 1948.

The church began a building program in the spring of 1949 and on March 25, 1951, the first service was held in the new auditorium. Soon after this the Rev. Jacks resigned and the church called B. P. Baggett, who served until September, 1952.

The present pastor is the Rev. Grady E. Estes, who came to Calvary Baptist from the First Baptist church of Rosepine, La. During the 15 months that the Rev. Estes has been pastor, the church has received 48 new members and done extensive work on the auditorium.

At the present time the church is converting the old building into an educational building. The junior department, which will consist of a department room and four classrooms, will be completed this week and used for the first time Jan. 24.

The Rev. Robert N. Stapp, who was ordained to the gospel ministry by Calvary Baptist church Nov. 12, 1947, and is now pastor of Calvary Baptist church in Yuba City, Calif., will be the guest speaker at both services on the anniversary day.
