Owls' Third — Quarter Binge Buries Wolves

By RED HURD Oregon Tech's Owls were hitting on all five last night to jump back into the thick of the Oregon College Conference race when they twenty-pointed the Wolves of Oregon College, 73-53.

The story of Tech's win—particularly sweet after two losses a week ago to the Wolves in Monmouth—wouldn't be complete without giving an assist to the Oretch student section.

For the first time in the basketball history on the mile-high campus, the Blue and Gold cheering section resembled a college rah-rah group. They never stopped making noise and almost tore the roof off when the Owls wrapped up the game with a thunderous 22-point third quarter, while holding the Wolves to one field goal by Frank Grove and a total of five points.

The third-quarter assault came after both teams slipped through a rousing first half that saw the Owls post a slim 34-33 lead at the rest period.

But Tech's halftime lead didn't come until the lead changed hands 10 times and the score was tied half a dozen times. It all at the end of the first 10-minute stanza. Don Sutphin was little short of terrific last night. He scored 23 points—just one on a free throw—and the majority of his 11 field goals came on his pet shot, a long one-handed loper. He made them with or without the screen and murdered the Wolves in the third quarter with five from the floor.

BRIGHT NOTE The bright note of the win, however, was Keith Thompson's return to scoring form, the first time he's found the two-point recipe to any great degree since last season.

The big Phoenix, Ore., center scored 15 points on seven field goals and a free throw. Jerry Wyatt didn't surprise anyone with his usual drive and hustle and 16 points. That put three Owls higher than Grove for OCE with 11. Larry Chamberlain and Bobby Prantz added 10 each.

Gary Dorn started the game at a guard position but his ankle, injured four games ago, didn't hold up and he was pulled early in the second in favor of Alan Cunningham, who did an adequate job of pinch-hitting for the Owls.

Don Hubble, the other starter at forward, came out of the game with a finger nail torn off and 9 points. His rebounding was second only to Thompson. Keith grabbed 11 of Tech's 32 off the boards, Hubble 9.

REVERSAL The Owls out-boarded the Wolves, 32-21, a reversal of OCE's sweep when Grove wrecked OTI with too many points and too many rebounds.

The third quarter came as a surprise after a touch-and-go first half. Wyatt started it off with a jump shot and, after Charles Pinon made it 2-1 with a free throw, the lead changed on four straight field goals by OCE's Darrell Davis, Sutphin, Prantz and Sutphin again.

Sutphin added a free throw at his last-mentioned field goal and Thompson scored on a lay-in to give the Owls a 9-5 lead. But Grove on a rebound shot and Pinon on a jump shot tied it at 9-all. It was 11-11 with two and a half minutes to go in the first frame after Wyatt and Prantz traded shots. Grove made it 13-11 OCE and Thompson tied it at 13. It was 15-11 at the first buzzer on Sutphin's long counter.

The trading continued in the second quarter and it was Thompson who gave the Owls the lead at 17-15, 25-23 and 29-28 and the Owls were ahead to stay, but didn't pour it on until the third quarter.

Both teams were torrid in the first half. Oregon Tech hitting. 469 for Oregon College's 467. But OCE's frigid third quarter knocked the Wolves down considerably and they finished with a 20 for 59 mark, 339 after throwing in just 6 of 29 in the last half.

COOL The Owls cooled off some but still finished with 31 for 70 or 44.3. The two teams met again tonight and another win for Oretch would put the Owls feet first back in the OCE chase.

Last night's result pushed Eastern Oregon, idle with Portland State, up to first place with a 3-1 record. The Wolves skidded to second with 2-1, the Owls stayed in third with 2-3, while Portland State holds an option on the cellar with 0-2.

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Oregon held undisputed first place in the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball standings Saturday as Oregon State's Beavers, pre-season title favorites, mullied over what happened Friday night.

Oregon, now boasting a 4-1 record, just barely managed a 77-76 victory over Washington Friday night, and Oregon State took its second licking at the hands of Idaho, 79-55.

The loss dumped the Beavers into third place with a 3-2 record and shoved Idaho into the challengers role at 4-2.

SHARE Washington and Washington State share the cellar with 1-4 records. The Cougars were idle Friday night.

Oregon had its way during the first half of the Ducks - Huskies game at Eugene, but the Washingtons struck back in the second half and had the Ducks tied at 70-all before the Webfoots snapped to.

Jerry Ross walked off with high point honors with 17 for the Ducks. Dean Parsons dropped 14 through the net for the Huskies.

DARKHORSE Idaho, rated the division darkhorse before the teams started playing for keeps, played the part to the hilt. The Vandals punched the Beavers, Wade (Swede) Halbrook notwithstanding, into the ropes after the opening buzzer and kept them there all the way.

Halbrook did his scoring best to keep the Beavers in the game, with 35 points for his night's work, but the Vandals' team play, speed and clever ball handling more than offset Halbrook's performance.

Oregon and Washington hook up again Saturday night at Eugene and Idaho again hosts Oregon State at Moscow.
