Klamath Indians

VOTE on Monday, Jan. 25th for

Wade Crawford and Ida M. Crawford

for delegates to Washington, D. C. who shall stand united for the Klamath Indians on the following principles.

- 1. A secret ballot vote on all five propositions to end Federal supervision.
2. We shall insist upon legislation in the 83rd. Congress for a Final Settlement NOW, while we have something of value to settle. We are opposed to the delay of three or seven years as proposed.
3. We shall insist upon complete termination of the Indian Bureau to STOP exploitation.
4. We are opposed to the Department's Corporation Bill which is now before the Congress.

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
