NEW YORK (AP)—Police and officials of the American Savings Bank pondered the "case of the mysterious burglar" today and wondered:

There were no clues, and officials apparently would have been unaware of the intruder last night if he had not set off a burglar alarm in opening an unlocked door inside the bank. The fourth-floor window through which he gained entry was not wired with a burglar alarm.

Hartley, who is his sole survivor; the couple had no children. She is the daughter of the late Frank Hartley, and now lives in Stockton, California.

In their first year of advertising, fluid milk consumption increased 12.3 percent and a substantial increase was shown in 1952 figures over 1951. Distribution was expanded, also, to include other areas in northern California.

Another guest speaker, Roy L. Stein, also an extension specialist from OSC, stated that Oregon has one of the highest Grade A standards of any state in the nation. Grade A standards, he said, are set by state and city laws and therefore vary from state to state. Here in Oregon our basic Grade A law calls for higher standards of milk solids and milkfat in Grade A milk. He congratulated the group on being the leading dairy producer group in the state.
