Idaho Power's Plan To Develop the Hells Canyon Stretch Of Snake River

IN July the Idaho Power Company presented in formal hearings before the Federal Power Commission its plan for full development of the Hells Canyon area of the Snake River for electric power, flood control, navigation and recreation. The Federal Power Commission is required by law to determine the most comprehensive plan—the one

of greatest benefit to the people of the area and the nation. Because a good deal of misinformation has been circulated and confusion created about the Company's proposal, it is taking this means to inform the people of the area just how the Company will proceed, supported by the findings of its engineers and technicians in many fields.

WHAT?

3 Great Dams to Fully Develop the River

A series of three huge dams — Oxbow, Brownlee and Hells Canyon—will be built on the river at the locations described below. They will completely utilize the full head of water—602 feet—available at that 100-mile stretch of the river. Together they will constitute one of the largest of all western hydroelectric developments.

WHERE?

On Snake River Downstream From Weiser, Idaho

The three dams will be located in the river canyon north and west of Weiser, on the Idaho-Oregon boundary. The Hells Canyon site is 100 miles below Weiser, and its reservoir will be 22 miles in length, immediately below the Oxbow site. The Oxbow reservoir will extend about 12 miles to the tailrace of the Brownlee dam, which will create a reservoir approximately 58 miles long.

WHEN?

20 Months to Produce Power! 38 Months Until Completion!

The first generator can be on the lines twenty months after commencing construction—if necessary, all three big dams can be producing at capacity thirty-eight months after starting to build. By contrast it would be eight to ten years before the proposed federal dam could start producing power.

HOW BIG?

Huge!—Almost a Million Kilowatts The Cost—\$154,000,000

Even by Western standards, and compared to some of the world's largest river developments, the Idaho Power project is immense. Its dams will produce 900,800 kilowatts of power capacity—they will cost approximately \$133 million, and other facilities \$21 million more, a total investment of \$154 million.

Conclusions of Three Expert Witnesses Before the Federal Power Commission:

MAJOR GENERAL THOMAS M. ROBINS, Retired, former Deputy Chief of Engineers and former Division Engineer at Portland, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, during the construction of Bonneville Dam — said, taking into account the various factors of navigation, flood control and power, the best plan for the development of this reach of the Snake River is the Idaho Power 3-dam plan rather than the proposed federal Hells Canyon Dam; that it would not prevent the federal government from building anything that should be built in the public interest, and that the 3-dam (Idaho Power) plan is the most economical.

J. E. MOORE, formerly in charge of Power Supply Section, Office of War

Utilities, War Production Board; consultant to the Utilities Division, National Security Resources Board, and to the Administrator of the Defense Electric Power Administration (DEPA); with varied engineering experience in electric power since 1907—testified that, comparing the high-head Hells Canyon project with the three-dam project, the three-dam project is best. The three plants can be completed quickly, an important aspect when the region and the country need a solution for the North-west power shortage. This conclusion (superiority of the three-dam development) is irrespective of ownership—regardless of who built it. Even if this section of the Snake River were to be developed by the Federal Government, the three-dam plan would be by far the sounder choice.

ROBERT DE LUCCIA, former Chief of the Bureau of Power, Federal Power Commission, long experienced in both public and private developments of water and power projects, Vice President and Chief Engineer, Pacific Power & Light Company—concluded his sworn testimony by saying: "As a result of my review and study in this matter, it is my carefully considered opinion that a three-dam scheme of development is much better adapted to a comprehensive development of the Hells Canyon section of the Snake River than would be a single high dam and should be adopted in preference thereto, irrespective of whether the works are constructed by the Federal Government or by non-Federal agencies, public or private."
