Bulgarian Reds Seek Way Youth By Way Of Books

OKLAHOMA (AP)—Bulgarian Communists have opened a new drive to win the minds and hearts of the youth. The plan is to do it through their books. Bulgarian radio broadcasts will report Communist activities. The country's writers and artists are being prodded to get in line. The Ministry of Education and the Academy of Science are called on to "improve" the quality and quantity of children's literature. The country's paper and chemical industries are asked to provide better paper and ink for the new children's editions. A lengthy decree, published in Bulgarian news journals, says flatly children's books are in "bad shape." Not only are they "poorly printed" and "improperly illustrated" but, most important, they "fail to glorify Communist heroes and the Communist way of life." From now on, according to the decree, competitions will be staged to encourage new writings of "patriotic enthusiasm" about Communist achievements.
