Milwaukie Keeps Top Poll Spot

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Milwaukie's orphans, more impressive with every game, defeated two more teams in the past week and solidified their position at the top of the weekly Associated Press poll on Oregon High School basketball.

The two victories made it 13 straight for the homeless Milwaukie players, who at long last will get a home next weekend. Construction of their new basketball floor will be completed, and Milwaukie will be able for the first time this season to play at home.

All but one of the sports writers taking part in the weekly poll named Milwaukie as the No. 1 team in the state. Corvallis held to the No. 2 position and Marshfield to No. 3.

Eugene, despite impressive victories over Cottage Grove and Salem, slipped a notch from the No. 4 position. Roosevelt of Portland also won two games and moved up from No. 5 to take Eugene's place.

Gresham, rated No. 6 last week, lost to Milwaukie and Central Catholic and fell out of the top 10. Albany, tied for tenth place last week, vaulted into the No. 6 position. Albany was idle in the past week.

Grants Pass defeated Klamath Falls in a pair of games and moved up from No. 8 to seventh place.

Baker, tied with Albany for tenth place last week, also advanced, getting the No. 8 spot.

Redmond was the only team besides Milwaukie to get a vote for first place, but that did not stop the Central Oregon team from tumbling from seventh to ninth place. Redmond suffered defeat at the hands of Burns and Lakeview last week.

Central Catholic of Portland barely managed to stay in the top 10, getting the tenth spot after splitting a pair of games last week.

Eleven sports writers from different sections of the state cast ballots, in which 10 points were awarded for a first-place vote, nine points for a second-place vote, etc.

OTI Tops Beavers, 19 to 11

Little Larry Dryden upset Gary McClain, Oregon State's Pacific Coast champion 123-pounder, last night on Pelican Court and with that stunning upset there was no stopping the Oregon Tech matmen as they swept to a 19-11 eight-round win over the highly-rated Beavers.

Upending the favored Oregon Slaters, 1933 PCC co-champions with Washington State College, was another brilliant mark for the spunky Owls in their first season in intercollegiate wrestling.

Dryden, facing his ex-high school teammate from Albany, piled up three points in the first round, the second round went scoreless, and the furious last round

saw Dryden hang tough for the victory.

The win lit a spark under the Owls and they ran up 11 points before the Beavers marked the scoreboard.

J. C. Thorpe followed Dryden's win with a 4-3 decision over Ben Shepherd, ex-Klamath Union High Schooler in the 130-pound division.

Then Don Earle knocked over another ex-Pelican, Orville Swindler, in the 137-pound class.

The bout was stopped twice in the first round when Earle cut his forehead and again in the second round when Swindler went ahead 4-2 on points. But Earle came back strong in the third and last heat to score a fall in 2:38 of the period.

That gave the Owls 11 points and Art Keith pinned Tom Wells in 1:54 of the second round in the 147-pounder to give OSC his first five points (five points are scored for falls, three for decisions in amateur wrestling).

But Fred Stepper, Tech's brilliant 157-pounder, threw State's Bill Tubbs in 2:48 of the second round to give Oretch a 16-5 advantage.

Bill Geister, another of OSC's coast champions, handed his team another three points in the 167-pound class but had to get on his bicycle to come out with a 5-3 decision over Dean Schmitt.

Reece Richardson cinched the meet for Tech with a 3-1 nod over Kirby Brumfield in the 177-pound fight that gave OTI a 19-11 lead.

Lew Williams, the third PCC champ with Oregon State, won a 3-1 verdict over Floyd Pierce in the heavyweight match but his win that didn't come the easy way was anti-climax.

SPOKANE (AP) — Don Osburn notified the Spokane Indians Monday he will be back as manager of the Western International League baseball club in 1954.

Osburn, manager of the 1953 championship team, said he will return here Thursday and accompany owner Roy Hotchkiss to Lewiston, Idaho, for the weekend WIL meeting.

Osburn was returned to the Indians by the Philadelphia Phillies, who have a working agreement with the Spokane club which provides the Phils train and assign nearly all the Indiana players.

Osburn's team last year won the second-half WIL championship and defeated Salem in the postseason playoff.

Unknown Stops Layne, Eyes Bout With Henry

By JACK HAND NEW YORK (AP) — Hurricane Tommy Jackson, a "new face" fighting his first main event, has nudged hulking Rex Layne a little closer to the end of the line.

The 22-year-old Jackson, a surprising 8-5 favorite over a man who once beat Jersey Joe Walcott and Ezzard Charles, wore down Layne, dropped him twice and forced Referee Mark Conn to call a merciful halt at 1:44 of the sixth round last night at Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway. It went as a technical knockout with the completely exhausted Layne unable to continue.

"I'd kind of like to fight Henry," said Jackson in his dressing room. "I think I'll give him a tough go, too. I was just beginning to get warmed up."

Strictly a six-round prelim boy until the Layne fight, tireless Tommy now has a chance to move up in the thinly manned division. Not too much of a slugger, he wears down his opponents with his orthodox right uppercut and continuous punching. He is crude but rough and ready.

Layne classified Jackson as an

"all the time puncher" who "wears a guy down."

Although Layne, slow at 202 pounds, took a nine-couplet in the sixth and dropped to his knees from exhaustion at the end, he said he wasn't ready to quit.

"It was just one of those nights," he said. "I'll rest awhile, maybe a month or two. Then I'd like to have it another go. I can't seem to get that weight down. I was up to 225 before this fight. My weight just seems to run away with me."

UO Building Plans Okayed

PORTLAND (AP) — The State Board of Higher Education approved plans Monday to enlarge the seating capacity at the basketball court and football field at the University of Oregon.

The board approved architects' plans to add 900-seat balcony to McArthur Court. The balcony and two exit towers will be on the west side of the building. Four posts now there will be removed. The estimated cost of the project is \$137,000.

Engineers' plans for Hayward Field call for lifting of the east grandstand 20 feet and addition of 4,700 seats in front of the grandstand. The seats would be removed in the spring to clear the cinder track.

Contracts on both jobs will be awarded March 8. The work is to be completed in time for the next football and basketball seasons.

The award is named for former Stanford and Carlisle Coach Glenn (Pop) Warner, who resides here. It is made by the Palo Alto Sports Club.
