Klamath Turns To King's-X

The Klamath Pelicans have four king's-X games on tap before heading back into Southern Oregon Conference play, starting with a Friday-Saturday date here with the Roseburg Indians.

Preliminary games on Pelican Court put the Klamath junior varsity against the league-leading National Guard team of the City League Friday and against Henley Saturday.

Four Klamath Falls players are in the Top 20 in the Big Four scoring race after six games. Guy Munsell, Leo Davis and Jim Dougherty just missed the top 20 in that order.

Guard Larry Yarnell is in second place in the conference, just three points behind the leader, Gene Barber of Grants Pass. David D'Olivio skidded from a tie for first to a tie for third in the Pelis two losing games to Grants Pass that robbed the Klamath club of its league lead.

Don Mills is eighteenth, Ed Barron tied for twentieth. Klamath Coach Paul McCall still hasn't settled on a starting five in mid-season and he's expected to do a lot of experimenting against the Indians in an attempt to find a quint that can start, and maintain, a scoring place.

Harrison, eighth-ranking contender for Marciano's crown, dropped Walls, ranked fifth, for counting of nine in the fourth and sixth rounds Tuesday night and went on to take a unanimous 10-round decision. The Canadian champion, a 2 to 1 favorite, outweighed Harrison, 190 1/2 to 183 pounds. Walls looked every bit the loser.

Chieftains Run Win Streak to Eighteen

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Seattle University, which started the season with a loss to Wichita, Wednesday was the proud co-owner of the longest winning streak of the country's college basketball teams.

Only undefeated Western Kentucky can match the Chieftains' streak. Tuesday night, they won No. 18, a 55-49 decision over Oklahoma City, the ninth-ranked team in the country. It was the second successive night Seattle whipped OCU, which now shows 11 triumphs and four losses.

At Brightman's lads have a good chance of going through the rest of the season without another defeat, too, because of their eight remaining games, four are with Portland, two with Gonzaga and one each with Puget Sound and Pacific Lutheran. They've beaten them all but Portland in the course of their streak, and Portland's record is not impressive.

NOT IMPRESSIVE

Joe Pehanick, the lad who never played high school basketball, was high man with 30 points. OCU led, 27-26 at the half mainly on the efforts of Arnold Short, who wound up operations with 23 points.

But in the second half, Pehanick got some help from his mates, Cal Bauer, who found his shooting eye, and Ron Bissett, who took over control of the backboards.

Elsewhere the action was thin. Bevo Francis and his operatives from Rio Grande crushed Morris Harvey, 74-62, but Bevo was held to a paltry 26 points, far below his 48-point-a-game average which is leading the nation's college scorers.

Maxim Confident Of Upset

By BEN FUNK. MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A moody, tight-lipped Archie Moore, although heavily beset by marital troubles, is a 2-1 favorite to defend his light heavyweight championship successfully against jabbing Joey Maxim tonight in their 15-round outdoor fight in Miami Stadium.

Archie's wife Alice dealt the champ a legal blow that hurt him worse than anything the light-punching Maxim can throw when she filed a separate maintenance suit yesterday that tied up his purse and will keep him in Florida until a settlement is reached.

The action was particularly painful to Moore, 37, and exciting it promises to be the richest payday of his 17-year career.

BIG GATE. If predictions of a \$100,000 gate hold up, his share will be in the neighborhood of \$52,000. He is to receive 40 per cent and Maxim 20 per cent of the net pot, which will be sweetened by \$50,000 in television and radio receipts.

Moore had been quiet and edgy even before his wife brought the legal action, possibly because of difficulty in making the 176-pound weight limit. During a strenuous two-week training program, he wore either heavy woollens or a plastic suit in the ring.

He had no weight trouble before. He scored 17 1/2 pounds when he lifted the title from Maxim in St. Louis Dec. 17, 1952, and 17 3/4 when he defended it against Maxim in their return match in Ogden, Utah, last June 24.

BROADCAST. Tonight's fight will be broadcast and telecast nationally by CBS starting at 10 p.m., EST.

Scattered showers were forecast, but nothing had enough to postpone the show. In event of heavy rain, the fight will be postponed a week and the semifinal between middleweights Bobby Dykes, Miami, and Johnny Lombardo, Mt. Carmel, Pa., will be staged in the Coral Gables Coliseum as the TV fight of the night.

Maxim has looked sharp and confident in his training sessions here and some competent observers are picking him to outbox Moore and become the first eight-light heavyweight champion to win back the title in the ring. Maxim says he'll weigh about 174 pounds.

Dexter Sets Scoring Mark

Kentucky's Cage Dreams Dashed

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky was ready Wednesday to bow to the rule that could wreck its national basketball championship dreams.

The rule, which outlaws graduate students in the NCAA play-offs, is expected to rob the nation's No. 1 team of its steering one-two-three scoring punch of Cliff Hagan, Frank Ramsey and Lou Tsiropoulos.

Tsiropoulos has completed his bachelor's degree work. Hagan, an All-America center, and Ramsey expect to receive theirs before the NCAA eliminations.

Viks OTI Weekend Cage Foe

A gassed-up Oregon Tech team hopes to keep its foot in the car-buretor Friday and Saturday nights in Portland against the Portland State Vikings in an Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball doubleheader.

The Owls are dealing in conjecture this week — with one eye toward Monmouth where the Oregon College Wolves host league-leading Eastern Oregon the same nights in a twin bill.

Two wins for the Owls over Portland State (0-2) would give Tech a 5-3 record in league play. If the Wolves can sweep its series on home cooking they'd take the loop lead with 4-2 and Tech would be just a game back at 5-3.

TO LA GRANDE. Next week the Owls travel to La Grande where Eastern Oregon is tough on its home floor, hoping for a split.

Tech's double victory against OCE Friday and Saturday put the Owls back in the race but they'll have to have just as much hustle — or more — to come out the next two weekends against Portland State and EOC with an even break.

The Vikings, although picked to finish in the OOC cellar, have a constant threat in high-scoring Don Porter.

But if Don Sutphin and Jerry Wyatt hit par and with Keith Thompson back in scoring form, the Owls will be favored to sweep the series with Portland State.

Porter, a center who averaged 24 points in eight pre-league games, will probably team with Ron Brown, John Foughi, Rich Green and Jim Perkins on the starting line-up.

Oregon Tech Coach Skeet O'Connell hasn't announced his starting five but probably will before he takes his team north Thursday.

Langlois, Fans Hoot Decision

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — An old familiar boxing echo resounded through the Arena Tuesday night as Gil Turner whipped Pierre Langlois. "We was robbed."

Langlois, speaking in French, English and with gestures that even a member of the fight mob could understand, sat in his dressing room decrying the unanimous 5-4-1 verdict of the officials.

"I ween, I ween," he repeated over and over again. "He foul me six times," said Pierre and he stripped to show what he claimed was a beet red groin. This was the 14th defeat as against 63 victories and five draws for the 157 1/2 pound Langlois.

"ROBBED." Jean Bretonnel, chubby manager of the monsieur from Port Auimer in Normandy, was bathed in sweat, most of it created in the hectic moments after the fight when he jumped around screaming "no, no, no," and several French versions of the "we was robbed" routine.

Bretonnel said the decision was given to the draw Langlois was given in Syracuse recently against Carmine Basilio. He said the Frenchman would protest to the Pennsylvania State Athletic Commission and would demand a return bout "in Philadelphia if necessary."

REMATCH. Turner's manager George Katz said "we'll be glad to fight again."

The 7,168 fans — they paid \$38.63 — seemed to agree with Langlois, although the ringside expert did not. The fans booed, threw paper into the ring and bounced their chairs on the stone floor. Several fights broke out in the aisles. One woman picked a fight and got slugged for her efforts.

The Associated Press scored the fight 5-3-2 for Turner, and a check of other cards at ringside showed some with 5 and some with 6 rounds for Turner.
