Concentrate On Pastures, Advises SCD

Cattle raising is one of Klamath county's big industries. Yet, the beef producing potential of this country is barely scratched.

Expansion of the industry is possible by putting more land into pasture production, but production could be doubled without putting in a single acre more.

1. Eradicate undesirable, low producing grasses now growing. 2. Prepare a smooth, firm weed-free seedbed.

3. Seed to locally-adapted, high quality, high producing grass-legume mixtures. Select certified seed, inoculate the legumes and as a general rule seed pastures without a nurse crop.

4. Apply fertilizers or barnyard manure. The proper fertilizer at the proper rate will more than pay its own way.

5. Control encroaching weeds along the ditch banks before they get started in the pastures. 6. Rotate pastures. Avoid overgrazing, supplement pasture feeding with hay or temporary pastures when permanent pastures are not in condition to be grazed.

7. Scatter the droppings, when not done so by the cattle, with a spike tooth harrow or brush drag. There is no better way to conserve and build up soil than by having it in properly managed high producing pasture.
