Slide Claims Coos Logger's Life

Slides resulting from heavy rain claimed one life at a remote Coos County logging operation late Wednesday.

The storm blocked major highways, the Southern Pacific Railroad's Siskiyou line, closed lumber operations and many schools. But rain and snow let up during the night and conditions over the state were generally improved Thursday morning.

Wesley Duley, 56, a logging company employee, died when a slide carried the tractor he was operating into the Coquille River. He and Siskiyou National Forest employees were trying to clear a slide from a logging road. Another slide came down, hitting the tractor.
