A poll of coaches and officials of various NFL teams brought the general opinion that the quality of 1953 collegiate players was below par. The lack of specialization cut the list of good prospects, they said.

The 12 NFL teams drafted 380 players at Thursday's 14 hour draft session. Each club picked 30 players.
