**Pollution Action To Be Taken**  
 PORTLAND (AP) — The State Sanitary Authority Friday decided to start court action to halt stream pollution by the towns of Molalla and Mount Angel.  
 The attorney general will be asked to seek injunctions to prevent further dumping of sewage into streams which flow near the two towns.  
 Molalla Mayor Fred Averill told the authority that he favored construction of a sewage disposal plant but that Molalla voters last Tuesday turned down a bond issue which would have financed the project.  
 Mount Angel, ordered to halt pollution by July 1, 1953, has not yet held a bond issue election for its sewage disposal system, nor has it completed final engineering plans, the authority reported.  
 It would be the second time the authority has started court action to force a city to clean up its streams. An injunction against the community of Toledo still is pending.  
 In other action Friday the authority:  
 Gave what it said was final warning to Newport, Gage and Galloway to abate stream pollution. All three cities are behind schedule on work required for compliance with earlier orders.  
 Approved temporarily the present Mt. Hood Aerial Transportation Co. sewage treatment plant near Government Camp.  
 Commended the towns of Rockaway, Gresham, Gladstone and Sheridan for progress on their sewage disposal program.

**Fish Group Men Named**  
 WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Saturday named the first three of the four American members of the newly approved International North Pacific Fisheries Commission.  
 The members are John L. Farley of Seattle, director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, interior department; Edward W. Allen of Seattle, and Milton E. Brooding of Orinda, Calif. All three are Republicans. A fourth member will be named later.  
 The commission was set up under a 10-year agreement between the United States, Canada and Japan to conduct scientific research on the marine resources of the North Pacific with a view to achieving conservation and better use of these fisheries by the member countries.  
 The agreement was negotiated in 1951 and ratified by the three countries last year. The first meeting of the commission primarily to organize, will be held at the State Department Monday.  
**Youngsters Okay After Night Out**  
 ALTADENA, Calif. (AP) — Three youngsters, missing all night on a mountain hike, found their way home and said they weren't lost at all.  
 They reached the sheriff's substation here yesterday, tired but otherwise in good shape. A searching party had been organized Saturday night when they failed to return on time.  
 Edward Gregory, 14, told deputies: "We weren't lost. We just started to hike up there when it got dark. So we spent the night."  
 With him were his sister Marilyn, 12, and a neighbor girl, Camella Merwin, 12.  
**Hiroshima Bomb Victims To Sue**  
 TOKYO (AP) — The Hiroshima Atom Bomb Victims Assn. said today plans to file damage suits against the United States in American courts as soon as possible.  
 The association said it would ask the courts to award \$2,777 to families of each Japanese who died in the world war atom bomb raids on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.  
 Kyodo news agency said leading lawyers here say the suits would not have a chance in American courts.  
 "A belligerent power has no right or privilege to seek damage action as a result of war," Kyodo quoted outstanding lawyers.  
 More than 120,000 persons were killed in the atom bomb blasts, Kyodo said.

## Russian Intelligence Agent Seeks Refuge In US; Reds Protest

 TOKYO (AP) — An American source said today Yuri Alexandrovich Rastvorov, a Russian diplomat-intelligence agent, asked for and was granted political asylum by the United States.  
 The source, who refused to be identified, told The Associated Press it is almost certain that Rastvorov has left Japan and may be en route to the United States.  
 A Russian spokesman accused the United States of kidnapping Rastvorov, second secretary of the Soviet mission to Tokyo, which Japan does not recognize. The object, he charged, was "provocation of the Soviet Union."  
 Official American sources in Tokyo said they knew nothing of the matter.  
 The break in the long silence on the cloak-and-dagger story of Rastvorov stirred speculation that the largest spy ring in Asia may have been cracked.  
 The affable 34-year-old Russian diplomat disappeared from the Soviet Embassy Jan. 24, on the eve of his scheduled departure for Russia.  
 There was speculation that the Russian had been flown Saturday to Okinawa, a huge U. S. base 700 miles south of here.  
 S. I. Runov, spokesman for the Russian mission, called in Japanese reporters and issued a prepared statement accusing "the American espionage organ in Japan" of seizing and holding Rastvorov.  
 The U. S. State Department and Far East Command had no comment.  
 Rastvorov was known to be an intelligence agent. The Russian diplomats had from time to time gathered information on U. S. bases.  
 Kyodo news agency reported earlier that Rastvorov was being returned to the Soviet Union to explain how he botched a spy assignment.  
 Kyodo said Japanese police had caught Rastvorov last spring buying American jet secrets from a U. S. airman here. The Air Force denied this.  
 Rastvorov was one of several dozen Soviet diplomats who stayed behind after the Japanese Peace Treaty was signed in April 1952. Since the Soviet Union has not signed the peace treaty, the mission has no official status as it did during the occupation.  
 A reliable source said 32 of the Russians remaining were intelligence officers.  
 The Soviet statement said Japanese police, who were asked by the Russians to find Rastvorov, had not been able to locate him. It also said Rastvorov was "very happy" at the prospect of returning to the Soviet Union.  
 "When the facts . . . are compared together with the data on hand . . . regarding the special interest which the American espionage division had in Rastvorov, then the mysterious disappearance of Rastvorov becomes clear," the statement said.  
 "All this forms the foundation to believe that Rastvorov has been seized and is being detained by the American espionage organ in Japan with the aim of provocation of the Soviet Union."  
 American newsmen were not invited to the press conference.  
 The Russians' report of Rastvorov was suffering from a "nervous breakdown."  
 The request appeared designed to fish for information and to lay the foundation for charges of kidnapping or that Rastvorov was insane, should he cooperate with U. S. authorities.

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Two gunmen told bedtime stories to keep three small children quiet last night while they awaited the return of the father who had been held in a robbery.  
 Mrs. Fahrberger was at their bakery during the robbery.  
 \$1,000 in cash in his pockets.  
 One of the gang of five posed as a Western Union messenger to get into the Northwest Side home of Louis Fahrberger, a bakery owner.  
 The baby sitter, who admitted them, Mrs. Marian Schmidt, 26, was forced to escort one robber through the house on his search for valuables. She said two more men entered the house and she saw another two men in two automobiles outside.  
 The noise of their attempts to break into a wall safe aroused the children—Christine, 3; Fred, 4; and Louis Jr., 8.

 During a lull in the 45-minute story-telling session, Christine sang "Doggie in the Window."  
 When Fahrberger walked in, he told police, one of the robbers seized Christine and said, "I'll shoot her if you don't get your hands up and that safe open."  
 The robbers locked Fahrberger, Mrs. Schmidt and the youngsters in a closet before leaving. Fahrberger, who was able to force the door open, said they overlooked

 Furthermore, she is a highly respectable doll. She can play in Westerns or musicals, comedies or costume dramas. Her current film is one of the latter. She is appearing in "The Tallman," her first assignment since the birth of her daughter.  
 Gorgeously gowned in a period costume, she came out of a love scene with British actor Laurence Harvey and was rubbing her neck. I asked if she ever complained.

## Housewives Stick To Guns

**MARSHALL, Tex. (AP)** — Rebuffed by the Supreme Court, Marshall's rebellious housewives say by gum they're still not paying social security taxes on wages of domestic servants.  
 In their first move since the Supreme Court refused to hear their appeal from adverse lower court decisions, the housewives Saturday fired off a letter to Internal Revenue Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews.  
 They told him they are again filing quarterly income tax reports but are making no payments and charged the courts have based their rulings on tax law instead of constitutional law.  
 The housewives argue they cannot constitutionally be forced to serve as tax collectors. Their leader, Mrs. Carolyn Abney, told reporters, "We have been given a judicial runaround."  
 Several times internal revenue agents have tapped the women's bank accounts for enough money to cover the tax they claim is due.
