# Desperate GOP Leaders Seek Bricker Out

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Grim Republican leaders faced the possibility today that their efforts to compromise the Bricker constitutional amendment on treaty powers might collapse in a legal welter of words. Senators Knowland of California, Ferguson of Michigan and Millikin of Colorado planned to continue the search for language that would be acceptable to President Eisenhower and Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio). Bricker's proposal would limit the scope of treaties and provide for congressional regulation of other international agreements. Knowland, the Senate GOP leader, insisted despite weeks of unsuccessful efforts that he was still hopeful an acceptable compromise would be found. He said, "discussions will continue."

# Detroit Youths Go On Trial

DETROIT (AP) — A six-woman Recorder's Court jury was expected to get the case against prep cager Ross DeBoskey's alleged assailants Tuesday. DeBoskey, 17, was beaten and stabbed with an icepick on the street after a high school basketball game the night of Jan. 15. Accused of assault and battery are Rex Durham and Leslie Wakefield, both 17, and Alonzo Edwards, 18.

# Irrigation Cuts Draw Protest

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Miller (R-Neb) of the House Interior Committee demanded Tuesday that the Budget Bureau prepare a supplemental budget request for funds to begin new irrigation and reclamation projects. Miller said he was "quite disturbed over the arbitrary manner" he said the bureau showed in considering Interior Department recommendations for "new starts."

# Army Adds To Korean Dead

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Tuesday listed 29 more soldiers, previously classified as missing in action in Korea, who have been determined to be dead. The Army makes a determination of death where supporting evidence is available, usually from eyewitnesses, that a man has died even though his body has not been recovered and identified. The Army said most of the deaths were determined to have taken place while the men were prisoners.

# Czech Peasants Offered Homes

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Communist Czechoslovakia is offering houses cheap to peasants who will help repopulate deserted villages of the Sudetenland, the mountainous border strip Britain and France gave to Hitler in the 1938 Munich Pact. Some three million Germans—about three-fourths of the coal and power-producing area's prewar population—were expelled from the Sudeten in 1945 after Czechoslovakia regained it. The government wants to repopulate them, but Czech workers reportedly fear some new deal between Moscow and the Communist East German government will bring the displaced Germans back.

# Pope Troubled With Hiccups

VATICAN CITY (AP) — After a week of treatment for a strengthening stomach condition, Pope Pius XII's condition was reported "unchanged" Tuesday. He passed a quiet and restful night, but the hiccups which have afflicted him since Jan. 26 have not gone completely, according to Vatican sources.

# Prisoners Demand Special Food

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio (AP) — Twenty-two men waiting trial on felony charges at Clark County Jail staged a disturbance at supper-time last night. They wanted peanut butter instead of apple butter with their bread. Sheriff J. Arthur Shuman told them, "you'll eat apple butter or nothing." The prisoners started banging pans, stamping feet and shouting. Shuman called in city police and, an hour from the time the disturbance started, the men were hustled to their cells—without their supper.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Traffic is bad enough normally on Lakewood boulevard, but when a runaway Army tank got into the act this is what happened: The 7-ton steel monster swerved into a parking lot yesterday, crushed five automobiles, snapped off a power pole and smashed a steel sign. Then it flattened a mailbox and knocked another sign into a house trailer. Nobody was injured but W. O. Robert B. Duke, 25, Altadena, was badly shaken up by the time the tank ground to a stop. He told sheriff's deputies the tank went out of control when he swerved to miss an automobile.

# Korea Seeking Law Enforcement

SEOUL (AP) — South Korean Foreign Minister Pyun Yung Tai predicted today that U. N. personnel in Korea soon will be held responsible by his government for offenses against Korean law committed while off duty. Pyun said during a news conference that negotiations between the United States and South Korea would begin this month to outline an administrative agreement. The United States has a similar agreement with Japan.

# Fumes Overcome Clerks In Store

CLEVELAND (AP) — Fumes overcame 22 clerks and a young girl yesterday at a department store in a suburban Fairview Park. Twelve of the women were confined overnight at Bay View Hospital. Fire Chief Orrie Baumgardner said that apparently carbon monoxide fumes from a heating plant got into the store's air-conditioning system.
