

Full Nelson Experts On Armory Mat Card

Two of the top experts of the full nelson appear Wednesday night at the Armory when professional wrestling opens a new season.

Georges Dusette's full nelson needs no introduction; the Canadian Strongman has won a string of bouts here longer than your shoelaces with his unbreakable nelson.

The Great Atlas—who likes to be different—doesn't call his hold the full nelson, but it is. The Peacock of Wrestling dubs it the Atlas Nelson and has this to say about the crippling hold: "Once I lock my fingers, my prodigious strength, plus the straining of my opponent to break the hold, swells my fingers until I can't let go even if I want to."

MAIN EVENT
The Great Atlas faces David Jones, British junior heavyweight champion, in the one-hour main event.

Dusette returns to his old stomping grounds against Jack (Cueball) Rush, the Boston Badman, in one of two 30-minute scuffles.

Bronco Lublich and Danno McDonald open the show in the other 15-minute bouts.

The Great Atlas appeared here almost three years ago in several mat shows. Since then, he's picked up more experience and a national reputation on the television circuit.

He counts some of the top wrestlers in the country among his victims, including Jim London, George George, Primo Carnera, Danny McShane, Gene Stanley and Argentine Rocco.

Jones' speed could frustrate the self-styled Great Atlas—his real name is Morris Shapiro—and, regardless of the outcome, mat faithful are promised a real doozy.

Dusette, crowd-pleaser, still holds the Number 1 position here in the popularity poll.

Hilltoppers Win 20th, Whip Bowling Green

NEW YORK (AP)—Furman's Frank Selvy, a 6-foot-3 midget among the basketball giants, today seemed a cinch to lift the major college scoring record so high that even the big boys won't be able to touch it for many seasons to come.

The jump-shot artist from Corbin, Ky., got his hands on the record last night by scoring 25 points in a 70-55 victory over Clemson. This gave him 1,904 for 24 seasons of play with a dozen games left. The old three-year mark of 1,888 was set by Clyde Lovellette of Kansas in 1952.

Selvy's performance was the highlight of a big night in college basketball as the teams started hitting the boards in earnest after midyear exams.

STRAIGHT
Western Kentucky and Duquesne both triumphed, bringing them a game closer to the elusive perfect season that no major school has attained since Army did it in 1943-44.

Western beat Bowling Green 94-83 for its 20th straight. Duquesne notched No. 18 at the expense of Villanova 70-41. Indiana's defending NCAA champions won their 13th against a single loss, defeating Louisville 80-71.

Duquesne, ranked second to Kentucky in this week's Associated Press poll, overpowered Villanova with an all-around team effort.

fort. The losers came up with the game's high scorer in Bob Schaefer with 27 points, but none of his teammates got close to double figures.

Clutch shooting by Forest Able kept Western Kentucky's streak intact. Bowling Green crept within three points in the third quarter only to have Able hit for six straight points. He got a total of 25 points to 31 for Tom Marshall.

ROUGH
Indiana's battle with Louisville was a rough-and-tumble affair in which Louisville stars John Purdue and Chuck Noble fouled out and Indiana forward Dick White had a technical foul called against him for pushing a Louisville player in an out-of-bounds scramble late in the contest. Don Schlund hit 13 of 16 free throws and added eight baskets for scoring honors with 26 points.

Bob Pettit of Louisiana State, runner-up to Selvy in the season's scoring race, was held to 15 points as LSU squeezed past Mississippi 53-42 for its sixth straight Southeastern Conference victory.

BIG TEN
Michigan State edged Northwestern 85-82 in a single Big Ten game. Richmond beat West Virginia 85-80 in the Southern Conference. Arkansas whipped Texas A&M 80-55 in the Southwest Conference. St. Louis nipped Houston 73-71 on a last-second basket by Dick Boukha in the Missouri Valley. And in the Southeastern, Alabama beat Florida 80-71 and Tulane defeated Mississippi State 79-56.

MOVES UP
Duke (13-4) moved up 12 notches to the No. 8 position. The Blue Devils had 187 points, most of them as a result of the 82-65 licking they handed Navy Saturday.

Up-and-coming La Salle moved from 12th to ninth place with 169 points and two first-place ballots. The Philadelphia five has come on strong after dropping three early season games. They have won 15.

Poll-Leaders Stick

Kentucky Still High Milwaukie Stays Put

Seattle Climbs To Sixth

NEW YORK (AP)—Seattle, Duke and La Salle today swept in among the first 10 teams in the weekly Associated Press basketball poll. Unbeaten Kentucky and Duquesne still ranked one-two.

Kentucky received 27 first-place votes and an aggregate of 798 points as reward for its 13 straight victories from the 97 sports writers and sportscasters who cast their ballots.

Duquesne, which rode to its 18th straight success last night by downing Villanova 70-41, corralled 696 points on the usual 10 for first place, nine for second, etc., basis. The Dukes grabbed 12 votes for first place.

Indiana, 13-1, including last night's 80-71 victory over Louisville, remained in third place, with 16 No. 1 ballots.

BREAKS TIE
Western Kentucky, undefeated in 20 starts, broke the fourth-place tie which existed between the Hilltoppers and Oklahoma A&M. Western picked up 603 points (with seven firsts) and the Aggies (17-1) had 547 points—with nine for first place.

Seattle climbed from 11th to sixth place on the strength of its continued improved play. The West Coast club has won 29 in a row since its opening game loss to Wichita, and five of those who believed they're the nation's best.

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During the 1953 season the Cincinnati Redlegs played 77 road games and hit 77 home runs in opposition ball parks.

Undefeated Milwaukie, winning its 14th and 15th victories, continued this week to be the choice of sports writers as Oregon's best high school basketball team.

Milwaukie got seven first place votes and 97 points to maintain a comfortable lead over Corvallis, the No. 2 team which for the first time drew a vote for top spot.

Marshfield wallowed Salem twice to remain in third place, and with 80 points, moved to within 4 points of Corvallis.

Roosevelt, undefeated in the Portland city league, again was No. 4, getting one first place vote, and Eugene continued fifth.

There were changes in the second five teams. Albany fell from No. 6 to No. 9 after losing to Salem, which moved in as No. 10. Salem replaced Central Catholic, which fell out after losing to Milwaukie.

Grants Pass, Baker and Redmond each moved up a notch to take the sixth, seventh and eighth spots. Redmond continued to draw one first place vote.
