Bail Set In
Timber Case

PORTLAND (AP) — Arthur Puls, 23, and Howard Puls, 30, Eugene brothers, were held under \$1,000 bail each Thursday after arraignment on a charge of stealing a million feet of timber from government land.

Their attorney, Bart Cole, asked U. S. Commissioner Robert Leander to set low bail so the brothers would be free and able to seek a man who contracted to have the timber cut. Cole said the older brother had a \$2,000 contract to do the cutting—much the government says was on O & C land near Cottage Grove.

The brothers went to jail after the hearing when their bail money was not immediately available.

They were arrested Wednesday on the complaint of the Bureau of Land Management that they had cut about \$75,000 worth of timber on government land.

Cole said it had not been determined whether a preliminary hearing would be sought. The commissioner set next Monday for it in case the brothers want it.

Washington State
Business Up In '53

SEATTLE (AP) — The University of Washington's Bureau of Business Research said Thursday that the Pacific Northwest's business activity index was higher in the final months of 1953 than a year earlier. The Inland Empire was credited with most of the year-end boost.

The index showed the Inland Empire 5.8 per cent above the previous year in November and 11.5 per cent higher in December. For the Puget Sound area the index showed rises of 1 1/2 per cent for November and for December. The Lower Columbia area was up 4.6 per cent in November and 1.9 in December.
