A&P To Shut Down Outlets
SCRANTON, Pa. (AP)—The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. says it will close indefinitely some 153 stores through northeastern Pennsylvania and lower New York in a dispute with AFL warehousemen.
In advertisements appearing in today's newspapers throughout the area, the food chain said it was unable to make deliveries to the stores because of a strike of 200 members of Scranton local 229, general drivers and helpers union.
The stores are to be closed starting at 6 p.m. (EST) tomorrow.
