Clara (Shazie) Shaw Retires From Long and Successful Business Life As Stationer on KF Main Street

"Chance" played a leading role in the production — "Shazie"—which had a successful run on Main Street for almost 27 years.

Mrs. Clara Shaw, known to her host of friends as "Shazie," recently announced her retirement from Shaw Stationery Company, after being identified with that concern for the above stated number of years.

She was living in Portland in 1926, and was staying in Medford with friends, when she made a side trip over here "just to see what Klamath Falls was like." Registered at the White Pelican Hotel, she heard that a stationery store owned by W. W. Southwell was for sale. She investigated, paid the required earnest money — and went to Seaside "to think it over."

She returned in September, and assumed ownership of the store which was located on Main Street in the 600 block. The lobby of the Hart Hotel is now occupying the store space. In that same year, she moved two doors down, toward Link River; and then, in the spring of '27, opened the store at 729 Main Street, present location of Shaw Stationery, now owned by Albert M. and Ruth Hattan, who bought the business in June 1944.

The immediate vicinity of the 729 Main location has changed considerably since Mrs. Shaw moved there. At that time the stationery store faced a frog pond instead of the U.S. Bank and the Williams Buildings.

The tiny, competent and energetic woman, had brought with her a background of experience in meeting the public—and it was a sustaining factor in her successful career as a woman operating in the business world of males.

She had gained much knowledge in meeting the public in Lewiston, Astoria and Portland; and her practical knowledge of merchandising stems partly from long exposure to methods employed in the operation of a drug store, which included a photograph and record department—this at the time when disc records replaced the cylinder.

Her daughter, Mrs. J. Frank (Ruth) Adams, was associated with her in the store from 1937 until its sale to Mr. and Mrs. Hattan. During her long career as a business woman, she also reared a family. Son, Frank Shaw lives at Naselle, Washington; and she lost a son, Bela, in World War I. Daughter Ruth lives here.

She has eight grandchildren, and eighteen great-grandchildren. "Shazie" has always led an amazingly active life after store hours; and her famous New Year's day open house grew from a group of only five to 389 registered in the guest book some years later. She could leave the store after a busy day and prepare and beautifully serve a marvelous dinner to any number of guests.
