Unusual Operation Tried On Gorilla

SARASOTA, Fla.—A circus gorilla was made ready today for a brain operation which his veterinarian said was unprecedented in the animal world. Dr. Mason Trupp of Tampa, a leading brain surgeon, is to operate on Toto II this afternoon in an attempt to halt paralysis which has been creeping over the gorilla's body. Preliminary diagnosis indicates that the paralysis is caused by a brain tumor blood clot, the veterinarian, Dr. J. Y. Henderson, said. The operation is expected to take three to four hours.

Wayne, member of a Klamath Falls family, will appear in Eugene on February 21. He has gained favorable attention for his many appearances in Portland during the past year. WASHINGTON—Cpl. Edward S. Dickenson, former Korean prisoner of war who changed his mind about staying with the Reds, will have a new officer in charge of investigating his case as the result of objection by defense counsel. The military district of Washington which is handling the trial inquiry as to whether Dickenson should face court-martial, announced last night that Col. James Jewett Carnes has been relieved as officer in charge of the pre-trial group. Lt. Col. George W. Carter Jr. has been named in Carnes' place.

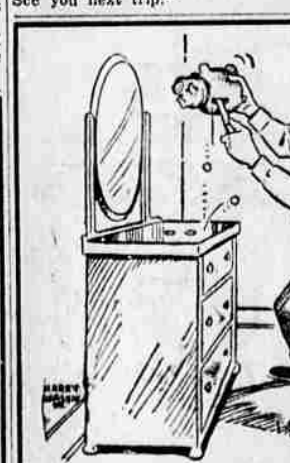
Aside from saying the switch was due to a request from defense counsel Lt. Col. E. Hendrick, the announcement gave no further explanation.
