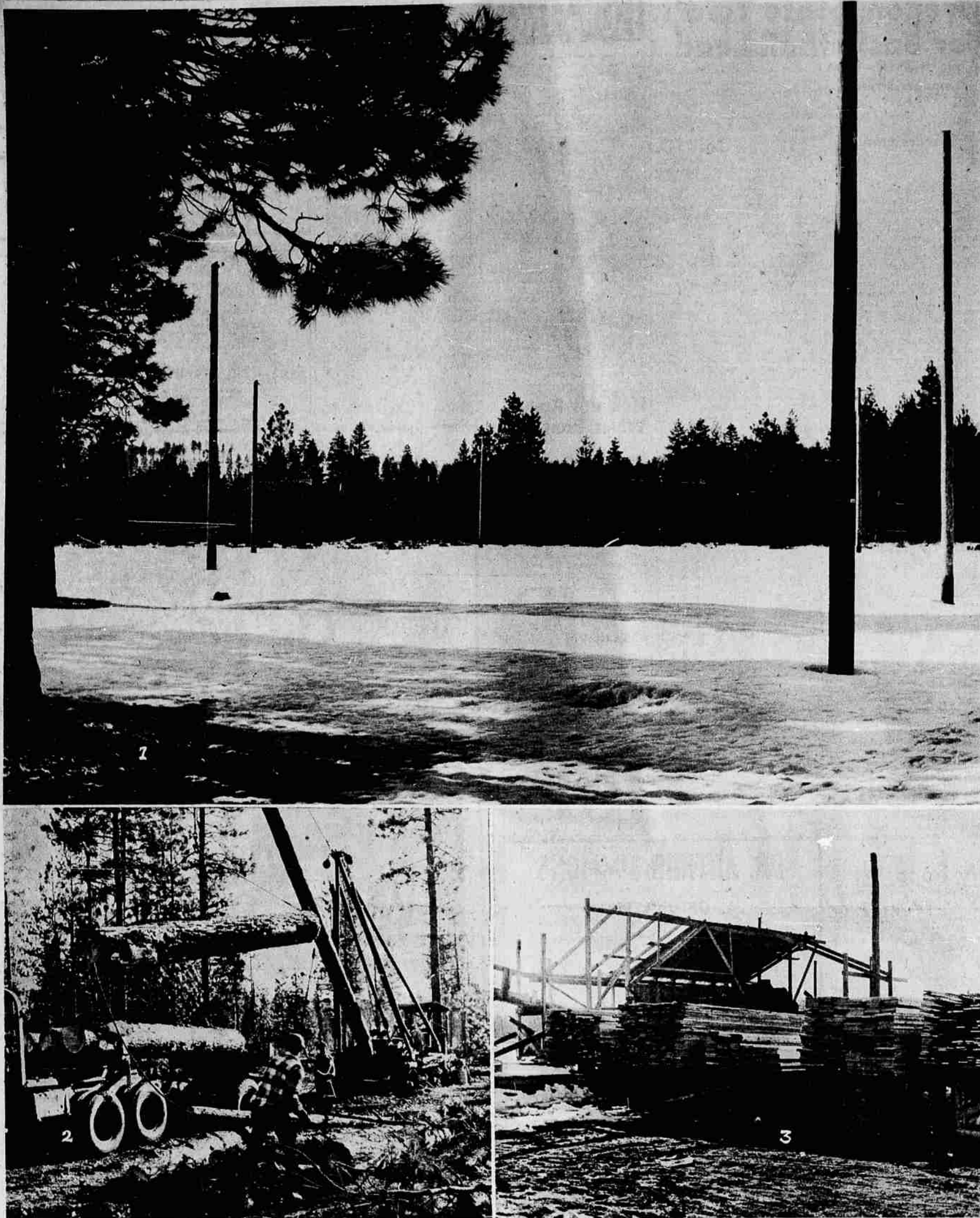

Senators Eye Speculation In Coffee

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators moved on two fronts today in response to clamor over recent sharp increases in coffee prices.

Five leaders of the coffee trade in New York City were asked to testify before a Senate Banking subcommittee headed by Sen. Aiken (R-Md.). It is seeking to learn whether speculation played a part in price jumps to more than \$1 a pound.

Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) asked quick passage of a bill that would impose government supervision of trading and speculation in coffee.

Aiken, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, said in an interview the bill likely would go through on a calendar call, a procedure by which the Senate passes bills without debate unless there is objection.

The legislation would require the Commodity Exchange Authority, an Agriculture Department agency, to monitor trading in coffee futures contracts.

Spokesmen for coffee producers in Latin-American nations have said a poor crop and the operation of supply and demand caused the price jumps. They have called for action to counter any consumer boycotts of coffee.

Beall said his special coffee probe aims at fostering friendly relations with coffee-producing nations.

Disposal Of Atomic Waste To Be Big New Problem

RICHMOND, Calif. (AP) — Attempts to use microbes as a means of disposing of dangerous radioactive wastes are being made by three University of California scientists.

Waste "hot" atoms are present wherever atomic energy is produced or used. They come mainly from the big reactors which produce uranium 235 and plutonium for bombs and power. But they also exist wherever radioactive isotopes are used — in experimental laboratories, in hospitals and in industrial plants.

When the atomic age reaches its full stature the disposal of radioactive wastes will be a big and complicated problem. "Hot" other wastes. Fire has no effect on them. They continue to give off their radioactivity for years, or even centuries. They must be destroyed like potentially dangerous rays for days, weeks, even months.

At present there are only three major ways of disposal. They are:

1. Keeping the waste material confined until the radioactivity dies down to a safe level, then dumping the stuff into a river or the ocean.
2. Concentrating the waste material as much as possible and then entombing it in concrete blocks which can be buried in the ground or taken out to sea and pushed overboard.
3. Converting the "hot" atoms to combine chemically with other non-radioactive atoms, which distribute and dilute the radioactivity to a non-hazardous level.

At present, the biggest problem exists at the Hanford, Wash., Works where great reactors produce plutonium. Every day millions of gallons of water have to be pumped through the plants. This water is contaminated with hot atoms. Huge ponds have been scooped out to hold the water until its radioactivity drops to a safe level. Then the water is turned into the Columbia River. This is a big item in the cost of producing plutonium.

If atomic power plants ever become numerous, the problem will be multiplied many times.

The UC scientists have been putting radioactive wastes into sewage in a carefully controlled test to determine how much of the stuff can be picked up by bacteria. The experiments are being done by Dr. Warren J. Kaufman, sanitary engineer; Gerhard Klein, project engineer; and Arnold E. Greenberg, microbiologist. They made their first report in a technical bulletin.

Sewage is inoculated with an assortment of ordinary microbes and then aerated to promote bacterial activity. Three kinds of hot atoms have been added for the test — radio iodine, radio phosphorus and radio strontium.

The cleaned water which comes out of the sewage treatment tanks is tested for radioactivity. This test is a measure of how much of the dangerous material has been picked up by the microbes. The tests thus far show that they pick up some of it in their food gathering process but that the amount varies widely.

The experimenters also tried planting the microbes on a bed of rocks and then running the sewage over them. This was an attempt to utilize the negative electric charges of the bacteria as an attraction for the hot atoms, which
