 Betty is a bright-faced brunette with a smile that could warm a pawn broker's heart. On TV she sings a little and talks a little but mostly she glows. She exudes a friendliness that is rare in this nervous age. NBC is banking on this quality to capture the housewife's attention from coast to coast.

 She is frank enough to admit that she's somewhat flabbergasted by the new project. Only a few years ago, she was doing TV for the experience.  
 Chicago-born, she came here when she was 2 and grew up in the land of sunshine. Her ambition was to be a singer, but she realized she didn't have enough talent to become another Dinah Shore. So she turned to radio acting and little theater work.  
 When TV started to blossom, she acted jobs delivering commercials. "At first I did them for nothing," she recalls, "but then I decided it might be better if I got paid for them. The station agreed, and they began paying me \$5 per appearance."  
 Her big break came 4 1/2 years ago when she was signed to play the "secretary" of Al Jarvis on a daytime show over KLAB (now KCOF). That meant being on camera for a large part of 5 1/2 hours. She has probably done more TV than any other girl in the country.  
 She continued with Jarvis' replacement, Eddie Albert, then did the show on her own. At the same

## AFL Officials Submit Plans

**MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) -** A compromise plan for solving union jurisdictional feuds within the AFL was expected to win approval today from the AFL Executive Council.  
 The plan was worked out last night by a special committee. It reportedly gives AFL unions this choice: submitting scraps to binding arbitration, or leaving them up to previously ineffectual AFL machinery.  
 The problem has long annoyed employers and contributed to inter-union warfare. It involved rival union claims over what types of work properly belong to particular unions. Employers are often harassed by conflicting union claims over the "right" to perform various jobs.  
 With rising unemployment AFL unions have indicated more frequently a desire to work out conflicting work claims in an orderly manner and the AFL convention in St. Louis last fall directed the AFL council to make some arrangement.  
 A special committee headed by AFL President George Meany agreed on a plan for the council's consideration today that halfway meets the problem. It provides that arbitration, or a binding decision by a neutral, will be offered in such disputes but unions can veto arbitrations and submit their troubles to the Executive Council.

## Mountain Fall Kills Student

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) -** An 18-year-old Colorado College freshman, whose father conquered the highest peak in North America three years ago, fell and rolled 400 feet to his death yesterday.  
 The victim was Robert Albert Buchtel, son of Dr. and Mrs. Henry Buchtel of Englewood, Colo.  
 Buchtel and three other students were climbing in a rocky region of Williams Canyon near Manitou Springs when the accident occurred.  
 The youth's father, a widely known surgeon, is an accomplished mountain climber. With two others, he reached the peak of 20,270 foot Mt. McKinley in Alaska in 1951.

## Texas Rancher Offers "Sample"

**AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) -** The little Minneapolis schoolgirl with a year for a Texas horse can have one if she comes to Texas after it and rides it home.  
 The offer was received by Secretary of State Howard Callaway today from West Texas rancher Guy H. Tomlinson of San Angelo and Tulla.  
 Andrea Michalik wrote the secretary of state last week seeking a "sample" of Texas. She said she would prefer a horse and enclosed a dime for postage.  
 "There must be some ranchman who has so many he can spare me one," she wrote.  
 Tomlinson told Callaway he has a surplus of horses, including one for Andrea. But Andrea will have to claim the mare at his ranch in Tulla and ride her home, he said.
