Council Asks Jail Check

City Council Monday night passed a motion asking the police committee to check the windows of the city jail "to make sure they meet specifications." Committee Chairman Don Kenyon told council he had already checked the plans and specifications and was satisfied they were followed.

The specifications for the jail, from the office of Howard R. Perlin, architect, require standard detention bars on the single federal cell window. Specifications call for moderate detention bars on all the windows in the time rank, from which two prisoners sawed their way to freedom last Friday night.

Neither standard detention nor moderate detention bars are too or heat resisting steel.

Contractors for the jail, Pinniger and Watkins, said this morning that to the best of their knowledge, the jail was constructed according to specifications. They pointed out that the city jail was not expected to house really dangerous criminals, and that for the money allotted and the requirements necessary, the jail does provide "reasonable security."

Other business at the regular council meeting included awarding bids on bonds for improvement units 119, 120, 121 and 122 (street repairs) to United States National Bank of Portland.

Bids on a car for the police department were opened and the contract awarded to Balseiger Motor Co., with a bid of \$1,601.54 for a "police interceptor."

Council also voted to amend the plumbing code to conform with state specifications. This will mean that cast iron sewer lines will only be required for a distance of five feet from the house instead of all the way to the main sewer as is required now. It will also mean that anyone engaged in sewer cleaning in Klamath Falls will be required to take out a license and be bonded to insure against damage to city sewers.

Ike Opens Trade Fair By Wire

SEATTLE (AP) — President Eisenhower tapped a telegraph key at the White House Monday night and Seattle's third International Trade Fair opened for a three-day run.

Lights at the international exposition flashed on promptly at 8:15 p.m., PST, as the President, seated in a basement room at the White House 3,000 miles away, pressed the same golden key used by President Taft to open the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition here in 1909.

Earlier, the President had telephoned personal greetings for success of the fair to Secretary of Commerce Sinclair Weeks, here as the fair's keynote speaker. Dignitaries from 23 nations and territories of South Asia and the Pacific Rim from American Samoa to Chile were welcomed by Weeks who in his keynote address called the fair "an international bazaar of brotherhood."

Referring to Vice President Nixon's recent tour of the Far East and the reception Weeks said he received, the commerce secretary told the visitors he hoped they would "return home with similar memories and with the lasting impression that North and South Americans are your true friends."

The secretary predicted 1954 will be "one of the most prosperous years in the United States history."

"The people today have vast purchasing power," he said, including savings and other liquid assets amounting to about 375 billion dollars and annual personal income of 185 billions."

Mild Weather Over Nation

More spring-like weather appeared in prospect for wide areas in the southern half of the nation Tuesday but it was snowy and a little cooler in northern regions from Minnesota to the Eastern Seaboard.

Light snow or snow flurries fell in the lower Great Lakes region, along the western slopes of the Central and Western Appalachian Mountains, into parts of the middle Atlantic coast and through Central New England. Snow also was reported in parts of upper Michigan and over Northwestern lower Michigan.

Temperatures generally were at the freezing mark or below in the Great Lakes region, the upper Ohio Valley and the Northern Atlantic coastal states. Similar readings were reported in the Northern and Central Plateau region.

Considerable fog and light freezing drizzle prevailed in sections of the Pacific Northwest and in interior valleys of Northern and Central California. Skies were mostly clear in other parts of the country.

New temperature records for the date were set in many cities from Omaha to Los Angeles Monday. It was 85 in Los Angeles and a mild 75 in North Platte, Neb.

Unusual Abduction Story Reported To Authorities

Local authorities are checking on the authenticity of a story of the alleged kidnapping and robbery of a Tacoma man who told officers he was kidnapped in Tacoma and released somewhere south of Klamath Falls.

Clyde H. Lovelace, 60, 1818 1/2 South L. St., Tacoma, employed by the Geary Lerew Roofing Company, told Klamath Falls police officers the following story:

On Monday morning February 1, he went to a Tacoma residence and collected \$408 for a roofing job just completed by his company. This money, all in bills he placed in the collar of his coat and continued around town trying to sell roofing jobs.

About 8:30 that evening, just before going home, he stopped to purchase some cough drops and was about to re-enter his car when grabbed by two men and forced into another car. The men demanded that he give them the money he had collected, but Lovelace stated he told them he didn't have any money.

After blindfolding him they drove for a long time and finally stopped in a town, which Lovelace believes was Portland. Here they took him into a house and beat him up, still demanding the money. When again told he had none they went through his pockets and wallet and ripped open the lining of his trousers.

Locked in a room until Saturday morning, where he slept on a cot and was fed only coffee and doughnuts, Lovelace said he decided to tell the men where the money was hidden.

After taking the money the men informed him they would drive him close to his home and turn him loose, Lovelace told authorities.

After driving most of the day, he said the men stopped about 10 p.m. put him out and drove off. He estimated this was about fifty miles south of Klamath Falls and along a railroad track on which a freight train was standing.

Boarding the freight he arrived here around midnight and notified police.
