

Bevo, Selvy Assault Cage Marks

NEW YORK (AP)—Bevo Francis and Frank Selvy, the hottest stars in college basketball, today appeared certain to break almost every available individual scoring record for the sport before the winter ends.

Francis, the hook shot artist from tiny Rio Grande College in Ohio, is methodically demolishing the small college marks, while Selvy, a master of every shot except the hook, is climbing three years at Furman with a devastating assault on the major college records.

Bevo stuck his name on top of the record list for single-season totals last night by grabbing 59 points against Anderson, Ind. His performance gave him 988 in 20 games this season, 18 more than the old mark set by Johnny O'Brien of Seattle in 35 games in 1951-52.

CINCH
The 6-9 Ohio sophomore with five games left is a cinch to wind up with the best single-season average, single-season total, two-year average and single-game high. He set the one game mark of 113 points last week.

Selvy, a 6-3 wizard, shines just as brightly against much tougher competition. He added 35 points last night against George Washington to his already record-breaking total for a three-year career which now stands at 2,046 points.

With a minimum of nine games to play—more if Furman gets lucky in the tournaments—Selvy also will establish a record average per game for a three-year career, for a single season and for any two seasons in addition to the

beat single-season total and best two-season total.

BEST 63
The only mark that apparently will elude the Southerner is the individual game high. His best so far is 63 last season against Mercer. The record is 73 by Temple's Bill Mikvy in 1951.

Bevo's spree last night paced Rio Grande to a 101-85 victory over

Anderson, but Selvy's scoring was in a losing cause as Furman dropped its first Southern Conference game 102-97 to the 10th ranking Colonials from Washington. Furman now has a 4-1 mark in the conference while George Washington is 8-0.

Three other members of the nation's top 10 were in action last night and like GW they all won. Sixth-ranking Notre Dame found Michigan State unexpectedly tough and had to stall through the final 35 seconds for a 74-71 victory.

24 WINS
Holy Cross, No. 9, smothered Springfield, Mass., 92-68, and eighth-ranking Seattle ran its winning streak to 24 after an opening game loss with an 85-72 conquest of Puget Sound.

Rice kept alive its title hopes in the Southwest Conference by whipping Texas A&M 61-47. The Owls meet league-leading Texas in Houston Saturday night and could tie for first by winning. Baylor virtually eliminated defending champion Texas Christian with a 63-56 decision.

A jump shot by Lester Lane from 20 feet out with two seconds to play gave Oklahoma an 80-78 Big Seven victory over Missouri. Wake Forest mopped up on Clemson 98-87 and Duke nipped North Carolina State 90-89 on two free throws by Rudy Lucy and a goal by Don Tobin in the closing seconds in Atlantic Coast Conference games.

In other action Wichita won its 20th against three losses, 89-60 over Drake. Niagara routed Siena 74-50; Villanova edged Seton Hall 61-59; and Bradley beat De Paul 80-69.

Chiefs Top Puget For 24th

SEATTLE (AP)—Seattle University upended College of Puget Sound 85-72 Tuesday night for its 24th straight victory, three short of the all-time major college record set by Seton Hall in 1953.

The Chiefs, No. 8 in this week's Associated Press poll, had trouble only in the first period when the lead changed five times. Seattle pulled away early in the second period, led 40-36 at the half and never again was threatened.

Stan Glowaski topped Seattle's point production with 27.

It was Seattle's last game until Feb. 26 when the Chiefs open a two-game series with Portland University here. That will close the regular season for the Chiefs, although they are expected to compete in at least one postseason tournament.

Six Mix On Mat Tonight

A six-sided donnybrook is on the wrestling menu for tonight with a battle royal headlining the weekly Armory program.

Actually, the battle royal is a means to an end and will pick the matmen for three bouts to follow.

The six wrestlers square off at 8:30, one hour after the Armory box-office opens.

The first two to be eliminated will be paired in the opening bout; the next two to go come back in the semi-windup.

The last two survivors return for the headline bout, all three timed for a half hour or the best of three falls.

The battle royal lineup includes such outstanding performers as Georges Dusette, the Canadian Strongman who last week made The Great Atlas look like a rank amateur in a test of strength; Tony Ross, the Salem slaughterer, the old reliable on the Northwest mat circuit; John Paul Henning, a brilliant newcomer to the Klamath scene; Jack Rush, a sardonic half-headed veteran; Bronco Lublich and Danno McDonald, two good-looking youngsters in the mat game.

There is no time limit on the battle royal; it will go until the participants in the three bouts are determined according to order of elimination.
