

Newport Man Gives Defense

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP)—Richard Thomson took to the stand in his own defense against a charge of assault with intent to kill his former business partner. He was an early defense witness Tuesday and returned Wednesday.

The state, which contends that the 26-year-old automobile dealer tried to kill James Mueller, 31, by hitting him on the head with an iron pipe and then driving him over a cliff in a car, rested its case Tuesday.

Before completing his presenta-

tion, Dist. Atty. William Hollen called three witnesses who testified Thomson admitted in a statement—later repudiated—that he slugged Mueller with the pipe because of an "obsession," that he then drove along the highway a short way, that his mind then went blank and that his next memory was of the car going over the cliff.

Circuit Judge Fred McHenry refused to admit the statement itself as evidence. Thomson told the jury he and Mueller, in the two days preceding the Sept. 10, 1953 crash, had drunk more liquor than he was used to. He denied that he had been at Otter Crest on the Oregon Coast the scene of the crash, several days before it took place. Prosecution witnesses said they had seen him there.
