Lumber Bids By Canada Out

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Foreign Operations Administration, reversing an earlier policy, has decided against permitting Canadian mills to bid on 10 million board feet of lumber the United States plans to send to Formosa, Rep. Mack (R-Wash.) said Tuesday.

Mack said FOA director Harold Starnes has advised him the agency has decided lumber trades specified in the original bid were too high and new specifications on lower grades are being prepared. He estimated purchase price of the lumber would be around one million dollars.

Mack's statement said only American firms will be permitted to submit bids when the new calls go out.

FOA's original decision to permit Canadian mills to bid on the lumber brought protests from Washington congressmen. They said the Formosa order would increase employment in U.S. mills and contended only American industry should be used since the United States is financing the FOA program.

Mack said he believed Washington and Oregon mills could supply most of the lumber, under the new specifications, because of their geographical advantage.

CAMERA-CHATTER

"FLASH BY BOUNCE"

Do you think the room is too dark to take good snaps of the children? - Next time try flash! For those shots where the room is too dark to get the picture, regular flash is swell - but we do always come up against this remark: "How do I get a 'Natural' effect in my flash shots?"

At this point I will bring up the word, "Bounce!" You are familiar with the bounce of a ball or the bounce of an active boy down the sidewalk. The same thing happens to light; the light, when it strikes a white object, or bounces off that white wall and diffuses and softens the light that exposes the subject.

For those with adventure in their blood, this bounce method will open new horizons in that natural, "at home" look to family snaps. Where your flash is removable from your camera and the connection is through the cord, remove the cord, remove the flash from the camera and point the flash at the ceiling while you are taking the picture. The exposure of your film will be different and for the average white ceilinged room, if you open the lens 2 more numbers or 1 stop than for normal, at the distance you are taking the picture, your efforts will result in a well exposed picture. (Example: regular f11 - open lens to f8.3)

Democrats Hope For New Gains

SEATTLE (AP) - The chairman of the Democratic National Committee says his party anticipates congressional gains in Washington and other Pacific Northwest states in the 1954 elections.

Stephen A. Mitchell here for a one-day conference of party leaders, told interviewers Tuesday he believes this will come about because the voting public agrees with the Democratic Party's hydroelectric power policies - stressing major development by the federal government.

Mitchell charged that Republican leaders are unfamiliar with the "geography and problems of the Northwest," and declared: "It appears as though we must start our fight for full utilization of Western resources all over again. We are ready for that battle."

Elk Hunter Feared Lost

WALLA WALLA (AP) - Bloodhounds, a sheriff's posse and maintenance dogs began a search early Wednesday for a Pollman elk hunter feared lost in the Blue Mountains east of here.

Walla Walla County Sheriff J. R. Cummins organized the search Tuesday after receiving a report that the man had failed to return to his camp 12 miles east of here Monday night.

The man was identified from papers found in his automobile as Milton L. Stewart. He had been camped on the ranch of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bates at Blue Creek since the start of the special Mill Creek elk hunt Jan. 31.

Stewart's home is Pullman, Wash.

Mrs. Bates said Stewart left camp each morning and returned at night. Monday night he failed to return and a search of his tent revealed he had taken no bedding or extra food with him.

His rifle was the only article missing.

The Wagon Wheelers, a mounted sheriff's posse, started the search in coordination with two teams of Alaskan sled dogs. The owner of one team also will have with him two bloodhounds.

Search headquarters are at Stewart's camp. It is a low-freezing weather has prevailed in the area the past several days.

Josslin Raps GOP Spending

"Excessive campaign expenditures by Republican candidates is seriously undermining popular government in Oregon," Les Josslin, Portland attorney mentioned as a possible candidate for Governor, declared at a dinner held in his honor at Klamath Falls Tuesday night. In the 1952 campaign in Oregon, Republicans spent 14 times as much as Democrats - a sharp increase in the average of 6 to 1 for the Republicans in the six previous national elections, stated Josslin.

"Television will substantially increase campaign costs," Josslin said, pointing out that in a recent campaign in California one candidate paid \$10,000 for half an hour on a television circuit.

"The people are being served when both sides of every public question and the records of each candidate are adequately and equally presented, but when the required finances are given to one side only, the people lack the information necessary to a correct decision. Should access to wealth be made the chief, if not sole requirement for election to high public office?"

"The time will come when the voters of Oregon in their wisdom will correct this situation by voting against the lavish spenders, who by their huge expenditures, are attempting to put public office on the auction block," he concluded.

Former Star's Damage Suit Out

DENVER (AP) - A million-dollar damage suit by former shimmy dancer Gilda Gray, in which she charged Columbia Pictures Corp. embarrassed her by using her career as basis for the Rita Hayworth film "Gilda," was dismissed in U. S. District Court yesterday.

The dismissal, "with prejudice," climaxed a five-year legal fight started in April 1949 by Miss Gray, then living at Larkspur, Colo. Her suit followed by three years Columbia's release of "Gilda," in which Miss Hayworth appeared frequently on the dance floor doing what Miss Gray charged was an imitation of the shimmy she originated.

Miss Gray now is staying with friends in Colorado Springs.

Attorneys did not state the reason for the dismissal, agreed to by both sides. The "with prejudice" part means Miss Gray can never sue Columbia again on the same basis.

Such a dismissal almost always means the parties have settled out of court, a court attache said.

Searchers Find Crashed Plane

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - A ground party radioed Tuesday from the site of a plane crash that claimed three and possibly 10 lives there appear to be bodies inside the wrecked air force C47 transport.

Search and rescue planes circling over the wilderness area some 180 miles north of here reported the ground crew requested additional equipment.

The crew remained overnight at the scene and planned to continue its investigations Wednesday, the Air Force said.

Sixteen were aboard the plane when it left Elmendorf Air Force Base here last Friday on a flight to Ladd Air Force Base near Fairbanks. The plane crashed, apparently after an unexplained explosion, near Curry.

Six parachuted to safety, three are known dead and seven are listed as missing.

Seven planes from Elmendorf searched in the crash area without success Tuesday for possible additional survivors.

The Air Force said three bodies found in the immediate area of the crash would be flown to Curry Wednesday, weather permitting.
