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Americans Kept From War Front

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — The number of Americans in Indochina is climbing rapidly towards the 1,000 mark, but rarely do any of them get to see what French union forces are doing with U. S.-supplied equipment in the war against the Communist-led Vietminh.

The U. S. embassy staff in Saigon numbers well over 200 persons and seems to be expanding under Ambassador Donald R. Heath. Also in Saigon are between 100 and 150 U. S. Army officers and enlisted men of the U. S. Military Assistance and Advisory Group (MAAG) in Indochina.

Another 100 or so Americans are employed in the Foreign Operations Administration (FOA), which since 1950 has supervised distribution of 102 million dollars in technical and economic aid to Indochina's three states—Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia.

More than 200 American Air Force technicians and mechanics already are reported in Indochina and more are expected.

Additionally, the U. S. government maintains a consulate in Hanoi, headquarters city for the French union forces, and American diplomats are posted in Phnom Penh, capital of Cambodia, and in Vietnamese, seat of government for Laos.

A scattering of American businessmen bring the total to near 1,000.

Less than 20 Americans probably are in Hanoi. That's the closest most Americans get to the war zones.

Congressional Pot Boils Despite Ike's Advice

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fresh senatorial charges that Democrats had consorted with Communists indicated today President Eisenhower's advice to Republicans to soften their political blows may be ignored outside his own Cabinet and staff.

Reiterating his characterization of Democratic administrations as "20 years of treason," Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said he will not change his tactics to win Democratic support for parts of Eisenhower's program.

"The price is too high," he told a Lincoln Day audience of some 6,000 persons in San Mateo, Calif., last night. Referring to the Democrats, he declared that "we can't whitewash them or we would be guilty of a crime worse than theirs."

McCarthy and Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.), insisting they are only reciting the facts, said they intend to continue to do so.

Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell of the Democratic National Committee said at Portland, Ore., that Eisenhower did not go far enough when he said he would advise his official family to avoid extreme partisanship.

Eisenhower said the times are too serious for such partisanship, the guns were silent Thursday.

Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) said the President "failed to meet the issue." He said, "We don't mind the extreme partisanship, but it is the extreme treason" which he said some GOP speakers have been attributing to Democrats.

The President told his news conference yesterday he cheerfully admits he needs Democratic support for some parts of his legislative program, but he added he isn't much of a partisan and knows of no way he can stop this sort of thing except among members of his official family.

McCarthy told newsmen in San Francisco, ahead of his speech in

suburban San Mateo: "I intend to continue giving to the American people all the facts . . . It isn't abuse to tell what's going on. When it's the Democrats' turn to come in, it is our party's duty to expose the details of 20 years of treason."

Similarly, Jenner said at New Castle, Ind., that "I propose to tell the truth regardless of politics."

In his Lincoln Day talk, Jenner made no reference to the President's remarks but he said: "Don't let anyone tell you communism will not be an issue in the coming campaign. It must and will continue to be until we get the rats out of government."

Eisenhower said last year he hopes that any fear of Reds "actively undermining" the government will have vanished by November's congressional elections.

Jenner told his audience that while Americans were fighting in Korea, "their victory was being thrown away by men high in the (Truman) administration who were friends or allies or willing appeasers of the Soviet destroyers."

Both he and McCarthy were speaking under auspices of the Republican National Committee, which Eisenhower said ought to observe the rule of moderation he voiced.

While some Democrats in Congress applauded Eisenhower's remarks, Sen. Gillette (D-Iowa) said, too, that the President didn't go far enough.

"I don't believe President Eisenhower has been a party to the campaign of calumny that has developed but which he repudiates it definitely, he must share part of the blame for it," Gillette said.

Sen. George (D-Ga.) said while the general public is going to charge Eisenhower with responsibility for the "treason" charges, "it will be far beyond his power to control and direct what some of these Republicans say."

Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) said he isn't kidding himself that Republicans are going to quit criticizing the Democrats, even though they must have Democratic votes to get any major measures approved by Congress.

"But I deplore this blanket indictment of the patriotism of members of either political party—it's poor ethics," Russell said.

Volunteers from Chiloquin, Sprague River, Beatty, Modoc Point, Fort Klamath and Crater Lake piled up a total of 117 pints, spurred by a contest among the communities. This campaign was sponsored by the Civic Improvement Club, Fort Klamath.

The club furnished table decorations for the canteen and sandwiches for the volunteer workers. Child care was also provided.

The program was carried out in the Chiloquin high school. Boy Scouts helped move the operation in orderly fashion.

One hundred and forty donors reported with 23 being deferred.

Irate Taxpayer Pays Taxes With Silver, Blood

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — An irate taxpayer, who paid part of a \$13,542 federal tax claim with a tub full of silver dollars over which he had poured two buckets of blood, threw the U. S. tax office into a furore here yesterday.

The taxpayer, Robert Friel, 37, of Council Bluffs, said he staged the dramatic incident to "raise hell" with tax collectors because he said they had harassed his parents during an investigation of his finances. He said he got the blood from a packing house.

He drew the ire of Iowa Internal Revenue Director Frank Halpin, who accused him of defacing U. S. money. But after the Secret Service ruled that the silver dollars were not defaced unless they were permanently damaged, Halpin agreed to accept the payment.

However he insisted that Friel count it. That took Friel more than two hours. The payment added up to \$4,997.

Friel, who said he had been in the construction and investment business before he got into income tax trouble, told newsmen the incident was his way of protesting the "harassment" of his parents because of his tax troubles. He said his father, F. E. Friel, suffered three strokes as a result.

State Blue Book Is Published

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Blue Book, containing 480 pages of information about Oregon government history, industries and recreation, finally was published Thursday.

The book, prepared by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, is completely revamped, containing many more pictures. It sells for \$1.

It was to have been published early last fall, but changing the format caused the delay, Newberry said.

The cover contains pictures of the state capitol, a lumber mill, the Bonneville Power Administration's building in Portland, the Declaration of Independence, and part of an abstract of votes of a primary election.

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Molotov Bid May Appeal To French

BERLIN (AP) — V. M. Molotov's security pact bid, already spurned by the Western foreign ministers, appeared loaded today with considerable popular appeal for West Europeans—and particularly for the French. Some nibbling may develop long after the Big Four conference ends.

French observers deemed the Soviet proposal's clause calling for the neutralization of Germany would mean fresh trouble for Foreign Minister Georges Bidault in his fight to get the six-nation European Defense Community Treaty ratified by France's balky Parliament.

The Soviet foreign minister's avowed aim is to do away with both that treaty, which would arm West Germans along with French, Italian, Belgian, Dutch and Luxembourgish under a unified command, and the 14-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The Soviet proposal for a Big Four meeting with Communist China and rival Soviet and French proposals for a world disarmament conference were up for renewed discussion today.

In yesterday's regular meeting at West Berlin's old Allied Control Authority Building, Molotov offered Europe a 50-year collective security pact in return for expelling United States armed forces from the continent and shattering the Western Alliance.

He sought to promote a European security conference at some time in the future. This proposal was certain to invite hesitant French parliamentarians—pegging their opposition to traditional German militarism—to delay yet more months on EDC. And in such an interval a rising impatience could be expected in the U. S. Congress, which votes the funds that have been the backbone of Western defense.

Molotov got his answer from Britain and France in perhaps the most dramatic hour of the Big Four conference. Indirectly, it was an answer also to warnings by Secretary of State Dulles that the United States will get out of European affairs if Europe so desires.

Bidault and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, facing Molotov across the conference table, called on the United States to stay in Europe. They said Britain and France choose to remain in NATO, of which the United States is the cornerstone.

Dulles remarked that NATO is a defense organization directed at no one.

"The United States, I think, has never intruded itself as an unwanted participant in European affairs and we do not have any intentions of doing so in the future," the secretary said.

It is up to the European states, he said, to make the decisions. State Department undersecretaries put great stress on the conclusion of Dulles' reply to the Molotov proposal.

"Whether or not the Soviet proposal of today will obliterate that division of Europe (between those who have been absorbed by Russia and those who do not want to be absorbed) is, as I say something which is primarily to be considered by other states than the United States."

"So far as the United States is concerned, we are determined that we will not be absorbed."

Council To Hear D. A. On Vice

Another offensive in the drive against vice will be launched Monday by District Attorney Frank Alderson who hopes to ban forever members of the "scarlet sisterhood" from Klamath Falls.

The district attorney said he will appear Monday night before the City Council and seek assurances that the present closure of four local parlor houses is for keeps.

Otherwise, Alderson says he has a directive from Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton to institute abatement proceedings against four houses of prostitution.

The district attorney also said he has a letter from the attorney general which he will read to the mayor and the council. He refused to divulge contents of the letter.

Alderson also says he notified the mayor that he will attend the next council session.

Alderson also says public response to his one-man drive to end prostitution in Klamath Falls has been very favorable. He declared many persons have written and telephoned their praise for his stand against the forces of the underworld.

On the other side of the battle the guns were silent Thursday. Mayor Paul Landry said he is looking forward eagerly to Alderson's appearance in the council chambers.

In commenting upon a statement given the Herald and News Wednesday about the Klamath Improvement Fund which received contributions from brothels, Alderson said he disagreed that the setup was legal.

"I don't see how receiving tribute from law breakers could be legalized," he declared. "After all, there is a law against prostitution of the statute books."

If Alderson does institute abatement proceedings against the four parlor houses named by city officials as donors to civic projects, it will have to be done in Circuit Court. A regular trial will be held and if the court decides to issue abatement orders, the defendants can obtain a six months stay during which they can abate the houses themselves. Otherwise, it would be up to the sheriff's office to padlock them.

FBI Catch 'Most Wanted' Fugitive

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 35-year-old man charged with two killings is in custody Thursday, arrested exactly a week after he went on the FBI's list of "ten most wanted men."

Apce Hamp Chapman, accused of killing his wife and another woman and wounding two others in a shooting affray in Cleveland, Ohio, Feb. 8, 1953, offered no resistance Wednesday when FBI agents took him into custody in Silver Spring, a Maryland suburb of Washington.

New Federal Judge Districts Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seventeen states will get 21 new federal district judges under legislation signed by President Eisenhower Wednesday.

Three additional U. S. circuit judges are also authorized: Two in the Western (9th) Circuit and one in the Southern (11th) Circuit.

The bill also provides for six more temporary district judges in six states and makes permanent three district judgeships previously classed as temporary.

Indochina Border Is Threatened

WASHINGTON (AP) — Claire L. Chennault, chairman of the board of the Formosan Airline Civil Air Transport, said Thursday Chinese Communists have built up the "capability to operate quite a large air force" in south China.

Chennault, a retired major general and the World War II head of the China-based 14th Air Force, said the Chinese Reds have Russian-built jet airplanes, Russian-made weapons and equipment, and Russian-supplied fuel.

He told a reporter the Reds are building and improving airfields along the Chinese-Indochinese border and are stockpiling supplies there, in apparent readiness to operate against the French air force in Indochina.

He added that Russian-built MIG 15 fighters and Tupelov TU2 twin engine bombers have been moved south from Manchuria and possibly from Korea.

Chennault said he has learned that a great deal of jet fuel is being shipped into south China ports, including Canton and Shanghai, and that some of it comes from Black Sea ports. He said that in addition to Russian ships vessels of the Polish, Finnish, Greek and Portuguese flags are being used.

Chennault, a former adviser to Chiang Kai-Shek, said the generalissimo is determined that 1954 see the start of an offensive by Chinese Nationalists against the Reds in China.

Gambler Wins Court Ruling

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal judge Thursday granted a government motion to dismiss a contempt of Congress charge against gambler Frank Erickson.

The charge grew out of Erickson's refusal to answer questions before the U. S. Senate Crime Investigating Committee in the spring of 1951.

Federal Judge John F. X. McGohy dismissed the incident, after U. S. attorney J. Edward Lumbard explained that recent court decisions made it "impossible to convict" Erickson.

The moon-faced Erickson, one-time kingpin of a multi-million-dollar bookmaking empire, currently is serving a six-month federal prison term for income tax evasion at Milan, Mich.

He had been facing trial on the contempt charge, after his release. The indictment was based on Erickson's refusal to reply to 74 questions posed by the crime investigators. He claimed answers might tend to incriminate him.

Lumbard said that court decisions, handed down since the crime hearings, have "broadened the scope of the privilege against self-incrimination under the fifth amendment."

Under these decisions, Lumbard added, the courts "have generally found that the very nature of the hearings conducted by the Kefauver Senate crime committee . . . was such as to create a setting adverse to the witness."

He said that as a result the prosecution has been unsuccessful "in the case of virtually every witness who was indicted for contempt for hiding behind the fifth amendment before the Kefauver committee."
