Price Props Considered By Sheepmen

WASHINGTON (AP) - Officials of the National Wool Growers Association met Thursday in the first of a series of conferences called to determine the association's position on wool price supports legislation.

Headed by Ray Willoughby of San Angelo, association president, representatives of sheep producers from a dozen states met in a hotel room to draft an outline of their views. The meeting was not open to reporters.

J. M. Jones of Salt Lake City, executive secretary of the group, said they would meet Friday with Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

Advance word was that the group would agree to endorse an administration-backed wool bill now before Congress only if amendments are offered.

As introduced by Chairman Hope (R-Kan) of the House Agriculture Committee, the bill proposes that the secretary of agriculture provide incentive payments to encourage an annual domestic production of 300 million pounds of raw wool.

The production now is about 225 million pounds. The payments would be made by the Commodity Credit Corporation, and would come out of money collected by the existing 25 1/2 cents a pound tariff on imported clean, or scoured, wools.

Hells Canyon Discussed By Mitchell

BAKER, Ore. (AP) - Stephen A. Mitchell, Democratic national chairman, spoke at this eastern Oregon town within 100 miles of the site of Hells Canyon Dam in the Snake River Canyon, Mitchell said the fight had prevented the Idaho Power Co. from pushing through quickly its plan to get the site for a low-head dam.

He said Secretary of Interior McKay was in the forefront of those over to the Idaho Power Co.

In announcing last May 5 that the Interior Department was withdrawing its opposition to the Idaho plan, McKay said it was because the firm was ready to go ahead with privately financed construction of three hydroelectric power dams, while he said there was no assurance that Congress would authorize money for the federal project.

McKay also said the decision to reverse the Truman administration's stand in the matter was prompted in part by the Eisenhower administration's desire to trim federal spending.

The delay caused by the fight "has made it possible for the people to make their views known on Hells Canyon," he said at a dinner meeting sponsored by Democrats.

"The fight to save Hells Canyon is a spectacular recurrence of an age-old battle. It is the battle by resources for the greatest good of the people to develop their natural resources for the greatest good of the greatest number for the longest period of time," he said.

The Hells Canyon site is now at stake in a hearing conducted by the Federal Power Commission in Washington.

Mitchell also aimed these remarks at the cattle and grain industry in this area.

"The recession now spreading across the country had its origin more than anywhere else in the livestock industry. The place to stop this recession was at its source. But all last year the Republicans came up with no sign of any program to check the fall in livestock prices. Instead all we got from Secretary Benson was Pollyanna talk about how everything would be all right now."

Of the Republican farm policy he said, "Never perhaps has there been so much advance buildup for any plan with such a small content of new ideas."

Habeas Corpus Denied Coates

A petition for a writ of habeas corpus to free Thomas Victor Coates, 31-year-old clerk, from the County Jail was denied late Thursday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Coates is held on an executive warrant of extradition issued by Gov. Paul Patterson for California authorities. The way is now clear for his return to that state as a parole violator.

Defense Attorney A. C. Yaden, who petitioned the court for the habeas corpus writ, contended that Coates could not be legally turned over to California.

In ruling on the issue, Judge Vandenberg held that the petitioner claimed he was wrongly imprisoned as a fugitive from justice. The warrant of extradition, the judge said, named Coates as a parole violator.

Attorney Yaden had argued that a person could not be classed as a fugitive from justice unless they went from one state into another of their own volition to avoid arrest or prosecution. Coates was brought to Oregon from Texas by
