Senate Committee Defends Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate 10-6 legislative relations subcommittee says that what the U. S. propaganda-information program needs most is a three to four year respite from congressional investigations and administrative shake-ups.

Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) filed the report with the Senate Wednesday, ending the subcommittee's 18 months study of the program.

The Senate investigations subcommittee headed by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) has announced plans to revive its own investigation of the program, possibly late this month.

The McCarthy group has charged that the program under Democratic administration was weakened seriously by Communist infiltration. The Hickenlooper subcommittee made no such findings in its study of how the Democrats ran the program but in a report to Congress last June did list many other reasons why it considered the program had been less effective than it should have been.

Hollywood Star Denies Rumor

HOLLYWOOD—June Haver admitted Thursday she is dating one else but Fred MacMurray but said "it's too early" to discuss matters.

The MacMurray-Haver combination became the talk of Hollywood when they first started dating a few weeks ago.

Talk of a romance will increase when the two leave for the Brazilian film festival next Thursday. They will be part of a Hollywood good will contingent.

PETERBOROUGH, N. Y.—American Breeders Service, Chicago, Ill., has just purchased the young Guernsey sire, Cla-Ore Mon-Luke, from Fred Rudal Jr. and Ray Hobson, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

This richly bred young bull is out of the well-bred cow, Lilly of Cla-Ore, that has once been classified very good for type, has two production records of 15,485 pounds of milk and 772 pounds of butterfat made as a six-year-old, and 13,862 pounds of milk and 679 pounds of butterfat made as an eight-year-old. He is sired by Cla-Ore Mongoose.

India Protects Former POW's

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—India announced Thursday that the 88 Korean prisoners of war who want to go to neutral countries will be kept under military "protection" at an army cantonment near New Delhi.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said the men, who refused repatriation, were "simply being given protection until their future is settled."

"We do not consider them prisoners any longer," he declared.

The contingent—74 North Koreans, 12 Chinese and 2 South Koreans—sailed Tuesday from Inchon, Korea, with 1,600 of the 6,000 Indian troops who guarded the more than 20,000 unrepatriated POW's in the Korean demilitarized zone.

South Korea angrily threatened action to prevent the prisoners' departure, terming their transfer a "flagrant violation" of the Korean armistice, but no violence developed.

Trade Pact

LONDON—Britain's House of Commons in effect Wednesday night approved the controversial new British-Japanese trade pact to admit limited imports from Japan for the first time since the war.

The speaker reminded the young people of Christ's words, "As the Father hath sent Me, so send I you." (Matt. 21:21)

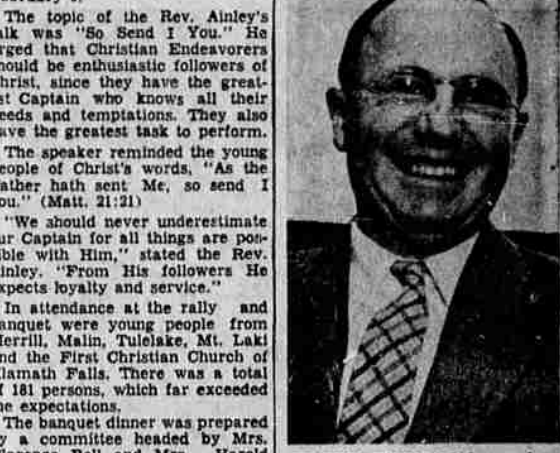
"We should never underestimate our Captain for all things are possible with Him," stated the Rev. Ainley. "From His followers He expects loyalty and service."
