35TH BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY OBSERVED BY ALL QUOTA CLUBS

Quota Club International, Inc., a classified service club for women executives, will celebrate its 35th birthday throughout the month of February. Mrs. Nadine Colvin, president of the Klamath County Quota Club, has received a proclamation from Mrs. Bess C. Noble, Memphis, Tennessee, International president, calling upon each affiliated Quota Club to devote one of its February meetings to a birthday observance.

In her proclamation, Mrs. Noble urged that Quotarians everywhere give full cooperation and assistance to women with leadership, in their respective communities, and that they encourage all phases of educational advancement. She also suggested that recognition of the achievements of women be a part of the birthday observance of local Quota Clubs.

Quota Club International was founded in Buffalo, New York, in December, 1918, and received its charter the following February.

It was the dream of five Buffalo business women who had been guests at a Christmas party given by the Kiwanis Club of that city. Inspired by the help that Kiwanis was giving underprivileged boys, these women interested other business women in joining a club that would be dedicated to helping underprivileged girls. They named the club "Quota", which means a share. Today there are 258 Quota Clubs in the United States, Alaska, Canada, Mexico and Australia, with a total membership of 8,200.

Although girl's service is still an important Quota project, according to Alice Vilus, aid to the hard of hearing has been receiving particular emphasis as an international project, during the past six years. Helen Majors points out a total of \$19,177 to help acoustically handicapped children and adults. This money made possible contributions to speech and hearing clinics and lip reading classes; purchases of audiometers, hearing aids and batteries; scholarships for training teachers for hard of hearing children; and educational programs pointing out the importance of hearing tests for children. In addition, Quotarians gave thousands of hours of volunteer service.
