## Newscaster Gets Award As Outstanding TV Attraction

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Edward J. Murrow, Eve Arden and Donald O'Connor won the top awards of the Television Academy last night, but a pudgy English professor stole the show.

Murrow, who rose to fame with his broadcasts during the London blitz, was named the outstanding TV personality of 1953 by the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

Murrow's See It Now was also named the best news or sports program.

Miss Murrow, the glamorous schoolmarm of Our Miss Brooks, was announced as the best female star of a regular series at the gala dinner in the Hollywood Falladium.

O'Connor, one of the comedians on the Sunday night Comedy Hour, the best male star.

None of the top winners was present. The biggest ovation went to Dr. Frank O. Baxter, University of Southern California professor who delivers Shakespearean lectures on KNXT. He won two local awards for the best public affairs program, and as outstanding male performer.

Continuing on a highbrow level, the academy named Omnibus as the best variety program over the shows of Sullivan, Jackie Gleason, Sid Caesar and others. The two most popular programs in the country repeated their wins of last year. I Love Lucy was selected the best situation comedy program, and light-tipped Jack Webb's Dragnet scored as the best mystery, action or adventure series.

The other national awards or bests:

Dramatic program: U.S. Steel Hour.

Public affairs program: "Victory at Sea."

Children's program: Kukla, Fran & Ollie.

New program: Make Room for Daddy and U.S. Steel Hour (tie).

Supporting actor in a series: Art Carney of the Jackie Gleason Show.

Audience participation, quiz or panel program: This Is Your Life and What's My Line (tie).

Supporting actress of a series: Vivian Vance of I Love Lucy.

The TV academy awards are nominated by television editors throughout the nation and final selections are made by the academy's 50 members.

## Jobless Lists Still Rise

WASHINGTON (AP)—Unemployment still was rising last week, according to Labor Department figures, but the increase was the smallest in a month.

The department's Bureau of Employment Security said yesterday 364,400 workers filed new applications for unemployment compensation in the week ended Feb. 6. This was 13,500 fewer than the previous week and well below the winter peak—468,878 in the week ended Jan. 9.

The new national total of jobless workers under unemployment compensation stood at 2,126,100 last week—higher than any corresponding week since World War II, except in the 1950 recession period when it rose to nearly 2,400,000. The total of workers drawing jobless pay has risen for 10 straight weeks.

Weather conditions and production cutbacks contributed to the continuing volume of claims.

## So. Americans Stick to Tea

DETROIT (AP)—The price of coffee is too high for millions of South Americans, too. And that isn't a recent development, either, says Institute botanist.

So, what do they drink?

Tea, of course. It is a special type called "yerba mate," and it has been a beverage some 2,000 years.

Botanist Hall says cow-punching Gauchos carry a gourd of dried mate and mix a batch of tea whenever they're thirsty, drinking through a metal straw with a sieve-like strainer attachment.

Mate is made of leaves from a plant that grows wild over southern Brazil, Paraguay and northern Argentina. It contains caffeine and the leaves are toasted to reduce moisture.

## Coffee Lists Inspected

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Beall (R-Md.) said today one New York coffee broker has supplied investigating senators with a complete list of all trades and traders in coffee futures contracts of recent months.

Beall is chairman of a Senate banking subcommittee looking into the jump in coffee prices. He said the group will wait "a week or ten days" to enable other coffee brokers to supply similar lists on a voluntary basis. He has said subpoenas will be used if necessary to get the information.

The next public testimony, Beall said, will be by large buyers of coffee such as chain stores and other retailers.

Gustavo Lobo Jr., president of the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange, has urged all members to supply lists of all transactions and lists of customers.

He said member firms are "anxious to have the public know the facts and to disprove some of the erroneous statements."

Senators agreed not to publish names of customers and their trading in coffee unless they discover "something out of line."

Beall said he would not make public at this time the name of the first broker to cooperate.

This week the Senate approved a bill that would impose government regulation and supervision of all coffee futures trading by the Commodity Exchange Administration, an agency of the Agriculture Department.

House members plan committee consideration of this bill during the coming week.

## Lake Area Bandit Shoots Woman

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—MRS. Fay Shelton, ticket-taker in the Bay Bridge train station on Yerba Buena Island in the middle of San Francisco Bay, was found lying in her booth last night, apparently the victim of a bandit.

The middle-aged woman's limp form, huddled in a pool of blood, was found by California highway patrolmen checking her whereabouts for her employe, the Key System Transit Lines.

She died without recovering consciousness at the nearby Treasure Island Naval Station Dispensary. San Francisco homicide inspectors said she had been shot and her receipts taken.

## Lumber Shipments Decline In West

PORTLAND (AP)—Douglas fir production, orders and shipments fell sharply last month.

The West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. blamed snow and cold weather for the production decline. It was the lowest of any month since 1950.

It totaled 769,988,000 board feet. It was nearly 876 million feet in the previous January. Orders totaled 813,272,000 feet and shipments 785,561,000.

## Lincoln Day Sees Many Speakers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. George (D-Ga.) said today the battle royal between Republicans and Democrats over GOP charges of past Communist-coddling—which roared to a cross-country crescendo on Lincoln Day—may not, after all, have much lasting effect.

"This is a political year and you've got to expect things like that," the veteran Georgia Democrat said in an interview. With congressional elections coming this year, he said, he doesn't think anything much can be done to stop the infighting.

Republican speakers—with some notable exceptions—loaded their oratorical artillery yesterday with much the same sort of denunciation that had already brought Democratic complaints. Democrats have accused some GOP spokesmen of going beyond the laws of political warfare by seeking the epithets of communism and treason on the minority party.

President Eisenhower this week advised his fellow party members against extreme partisan utterances.

Among the speakers who conspicuously tempered their criticism yesterday were members of the President's official family and Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich), chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The Twentieth Century-Fox Movie Co. has discovered oil in its own backyard.

Universal Consolidated Oil Co., which began drilling last November on the Fox studio lot, announced yesterday "a new deep oil and gas zone at approximately 7,000 feet" has been discovered.

## Portland Site Of New Office

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior McKay Friday announced establishment of a new area headquarters of the Bureau of Land Management in Portland, Ore., Salt Lake City and Denver.

The new area directors, and the states under each include:

Area 1—Portland—James F. Doyle, now assistant BLM regional administrator there; Washington, Oregon and California.

The new area offices will replace six regional offices in Billings, San Francisco, Albuquerque, Washington, Portland and Salt Lake City.

BLM Director Edward Woolley said establishment of the area offices and appointment of the three administrators is the first step toward carrying out recommendations of a survey team for reorganization of the bureau. Secretary McKay approved the recommendations.

Woolley said in a news release that the area offices have been located "to give better economical service according to geographical locations."

Eleven state BLM offices to be operating units for the area offices will be located in Spokane, Wash.; Portland, Boise, Idaho; Billings, Cheyenne, Wyo.; Denver, Salt Lake City, Reno, Nev.; Sacramento, Calif.; Phoenix, Ariz.; and Sanata Fe, N.M. A branch of the Sacramento office will be in Los Angeles.

William Guernsey, now Portland region's director, will be called here "to accept a special responsible assignment pending further Washington office reorganization," Woolley said.

The regional office at Anchorage was not included in the changes as the survey team report didn't cover Alaska.
