100 For Selvy In One Game

NEW YORK (AP) - Furman's fabulous Frank Selvy isn't though yet. The terror of the Carolinas—and darling of the professional scouts—steps on the court against Woodford on his home grounds tomorrow night and if he scores 17 points, the last of the major records within his grasp will be his.

Right now, Johnny O'Brien, the ex-Seattle sharpshooter, holds the single-season scoring high of 884 points for major colleges. Frank, who poured 100 points through the hoop against Newberry Saturday, now has 888 points.

RECORDS
With his 100-point orgy, Selvy accomplished the following:
1. Broke the single-game record of 73 points for a major college player set by Bill Mikvy of Temple in 1951.

2. Established an all-time career record for a college player with 2,197 points (in less than three years), breaking the standard of 2,154 made by Jim Lacy of Loyola of Baltimore (in four years).

3. Broke the major college record of 1,540 for two seasons set by Dick Groat of Duke.

4. Enabled Furman to score 149 points, seven higher than the previous one-game record set by Baltimore against Lynchburg earlier this season.

And what did Selvy have to say about it all?
"I didn't have any idea I was breaking any records. I knew I was hitting better than ever."

CONSEQUENCES
Frank's great show also might have long-range consequences. Furman now is very much in the running for a bid to the National Invitation Tournament in Madison Square Garden next month.

Despite Saturday's wave of upsets in which such behemoths as Indiana, Oklahoma A&M, and La Salle were defeated, the postseason picture remained about the same.

Thirty-six teams will play in the NIT and NCAA competitions—24 in the NCAA and 12 in the NIT. Duke, Davidson, Dayton and Western Kentucky already are in the NIT. Furman probably will be invited as will Bevo Francis and his Rio Grande outfit (Bevo scored "only" 58 points against Salem Saturday).

The Garden has not been drawing this year and it needs whatever spectator attractions it can get, especially in view of the fact that there is a good chance that no New York teams will be in the NIT. The belief is that La Salle, Niagara, Louisville and Holy Cross all would prefer to play in the NIT than take "at large" spots in the NCAA, which grants conference champions first-round byes.

13 CHAMPS
The NCAA takes 13 conference champions, plus the top team from the Middle Atlantic Conference and the New England Conference, neither of which operate as a league. That makes 15 teams. It is rounded out by five Eastern "at large" teams - independents - and four Western.

If they can't get La Salle, Niagara, Louisville and Holy Cross, the NCAA probably will settle for Fordham, Navy, Penn State, Notre Dame and Bowling Green. Notre Dame, with 13-2, has the best record.

In the West, the four clubs are almost sure to be Seattle, Santa Clara, Oklahoma City and San Francisco. There isn't much else to choose from.

OCE Files Protest
PORTLAND (AP) - Oregon Collegiate Conference officials reported Saturday that Oregon College of Education has filed a protest concerning a disputed basketball game with Portland State.

Portland State won the Feb. 6 game 64-62 on a basket by guard Syl Hannon. OCE athletic officials contend that Hannon's shot was fired after the game ended.

OCE's protest has been sent to Winston Purvine, director of Oregon Tech and conference vice president. Stephen E. Epler is conference president, but he declined to handle the protest since he is director of the day division of Portland State—one of the schools involved in the dispute.

If Oregon Tech and Eastern Oregon, the other conference member, agree that OCE's protest is justified, the game will be replayed. Otherwise, the result will remain on the record books.

Owls End With 6-6 Loop Mark

Tornado Dents Pel Title Hopes

OTI Eyes 2nd After Cage Slam

Oregon Tech's Owls finished Oregon Collegiate Conference play Saturday night with a mark that could well figure as they swing into a couple of weekends of king-of-the-hill play before wrapping up the season.

Tech's 60-51 win over the Portland State Vikings Saturday night on Hilltop Court where the Owls play like they mean it gave them a final 6-6 conference record. (Oregon Tech won Friday night, 74-64.)

Oregon College of Monmouth, with a 4-3 record, will be hard put to catch the Owls for second position with two of their three games in LaGrande, home of the league-leading Eastern Oregon team (6-2).

Saturday's win over Portland State came somewhat tougher than Friday's win but the Owls pulled away with room to spare in the fourth quarter after a touch-and-go battle that saw four points the largest margin up to the fourth period.

The lead changed hands five times in the first period with four deadlocks, one a 14-11 standoff at the end of the frame.

Then there were three more awards and one knot early in the second before Porter's tip gave the Vikings an 18-17 lead and the Owls spent the rest of the quarter trying to catch up, succeeding once at 24-24 on Don Hubble's free throw, one once at 30-30 on a tip shot by Bob Edgren and securing a half-time 31-30 lead on Jerry Wyatt's free throw.

The Owls lost some backboard strength in the second quarter when Keith Thompson fouled out but Edgren did an admirable pinch-hit job and finished high for the Owls with 15 points; Wyatt had 14 although he missed 12 free throws, converting 8.

The game continued nip-and-tuck in the third quarter with the Vikings gaining the lead again - at 34-32 - on a jump shot by Syl Hannon and a hook shot by Brown. The Vikes stayed that way too until Edgren tied it at 40 with a hook shot and put the Owls ahead 42-40 on two from the free throw line.

Stewart tied it up at 42 but Don Sutphin's field goal gave the Owls a 44-42 lead and the Techs stayed topside the rest of the way.

Porter scored 18 for the Vikings. The Owls go to Arcata, Calif., for two return matches with Humboldt State Friday and Saturday. The Lumberjacks lost a pair to Tech in the season-opening series for the Owls.

The Beavers smothered Washington 70-47 Friday night, but the Huskies came back to take Saturday night's encounter 51-47. Idaho meanwhile tromped Oregon 68-54 and 79-65.

This week Oregon State goes to Pullman for games Friday and Saturday nights with WSC while Oregon visits Washington at Seattle.

Washington held OSC's 7-foot-3-inch Swede Halbrook to 14 points at Corvallis Saturday night but they were enough counters to boost his season output to 504, a school record. The previous mark of 493 points was set by Cliff Crandall in 1949.

At Moscow, the Vandals caught fire at the start of the second period and pulled steadily away from the outclassed Ducks. Idaho led 38-27 at the half and 56-43 at the three-quarter mark. Oregon's Howard Page took scoring honors with 24 points.

The Vandals have a chance to narrow the gap Tuesday night when they play Washington State on their home floor at Moscow. The Staters have won only three of their 10 conference games this season.

Locals Need Miracle After Dropping Pair

It would take a miracle - or rather a series of miracles—for the Klamath Falls Pelicans to capture the Southern Oregon Class A high school basketball title after suffering a two-game slam at the hands of Medford over the weekend.

The Tornado won 68-52 Saturday night to add to its 45-40 Friday night win.

Grants Pass, meanwhile, kept its winning habit with a 63-56 win over Ashland Saturday after a 60-55 Friday night triumph over the Grizzlies.

That put the Cavemen at 7-1, two games ahead of Medford with 5-2. The Pels dropped to third place (4-4) on its two setbacks while Ashland takes up the rear with not a single win in eight starts.

Klamath's mathematical chance at the title is a slim one and would call for a particular pattern of events the rest of the way to come true.

But, for those who like to deal in conjecturing, here's the only chance the Pelicans have:

They'd have to win the rest of their games, two in Ashland this weekend, two here against Grants Pass the following weekend.

Grants Pass, meanwhile, would have to lose two to Medford in addition to a pair to the Pelicans.

The die-hards will hope for this but from here it looks like the Cavemen of Grants Pass are a shoo-in for the championship, although two victories for Medford over Grants Pass Friday and Saturday nights would more than brighten the hopes of Tornado fans.

As in Friday's game, the Pels outshot Medford in the field goal department, but more chances, plus superior shooting, on the charity stripe, gave Medford the win.

The Pelicans made Medford's all-time way lead Saturday night look somewhat shaky on several occasions after Medford surged from 12-14 to 20-21 at the quarter, then established its largest lead of the evening in the second quarter at 23-12.

Larry Yarnell, Don Mills and Jim Bevans palmed ... two-pointers, Jim Dougherty, Leo Davis and Guy Munsell added free throws to state this lead to 21-23.

But Medford had some steam left and it was 31-27 at the half. With just 35 seconds left in the third period, the Pelicans closed it to 38-29 on Denny Todd's field goal after Yarnell, Barron, Bevans and Don Summers did some scoring with Medford holding a 39-31 lead.

But it was 41-38 heading into the fourth period and the Pelicans were within two points, at 45-47, once in the pay-off stanza but they never got any closer.

Medford also made it two straight in junior varsity play with a 55-45 win over the Klamath Jayvees.
