Hornets Make A-2 Hoop Bid

Henley has thrown its hat into the Dist. 4-A2 basketball tournament, scheduled for Crater High School Feb. 25-27.

Although the Hornets did not meet any of the other five teams in the league during the season, they with Brookings have decided to take a fling at the tournament, the winner of which will meet the Big Four winner (Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, Medford and Ashland) in a two-of-three series for the right to represent Dist. 4 in the Oregon state tournament in Eugene March 15-20.

Other teams in the tourney are Eagle Point, Illinois Valley, Crater and Phoenix.

The Hornets face Eagle Point in the first game Feb. 25, 7 p.m. If the Hornets win, they face the Crater-Phoenix winner in a semi-final game Feb. 26. A loss would mean a consolation finals berth Saturday.

The Hornets, graduated to A-2 ranks this season, have played an independent schedule, including games with its former playmates in the Class B Klamath County League.

They've won 16 of 20 games, in addition to a contest with Sacred Heart that is still unsettled. The scoreboard and the Sacred Heart scorebook had the Hornets winning, 46-45; but Henley's official book, checked after the game, had Henley winning, 45-44.

Axemen Push Milwaukie In AP Poll

Milwaukie continued to be the No. 1 team but high-scoring Eugene gained enough new backing from sports writers this week to move into second place in the Associated Press' Oregon high school basketball poll.

Milwaukie, with a record of 17 wins in 18 games, was the first choice of eight of the 12 who voted. It had 114 points to Eugene's 95.

Eugene, which averaged 80 points a game in winning three impressive victories last week, squeezed ahead of Corvallis by two points. Corvallis had been No. 2 four weeks. Each team won two votes for first place.

One of Eugene's victims was Marshfield, to which it lost in the finals of the state tournament last year.

Behind Corvallis came Roosevelt, undefeated in the Portland league; Marshfield, Baker and Salem—the same order as last week.

Redmond, No. 8 last week, fell from the first ten. Gresham, the only team to defeat Milwaukie, jumped one notch to eighth and Albany advanced to No. 9.

Grants Pass moved back into the top 10 after a week's absence, taking tenth place.
