DORRIS—The second burglary in Dorris within four days revealed Thursday morning when Butte Valley high school's front door was found open, a closet in the principal's office pried open, and \$90 or more missing.

Principal Harry Beck said Cusodian A. V. Jacobson noticed the open front door about 7:15 a.m. Thursday as he parked his car at the school to go to work.

The hamp of the main door had been broken. The door to Beck's office pried open and the door to a closet where the money was kept had been shattered.

Later, Jacobson discovered that the back door to the boiler room had been pried open and the room entered, but nothing there was believed missing.

Beck listed as missing a money box with \$5 change, used at athletic events in the gym; \$34.00 collected at last Friday's assembly and between \$80 and \$100 deposited by students for pictures, plus the records of the picture payments. He said damage to the building was covered by insurance, but the money is not.

The intruder or intruders overlocked another \$5 in change in the closet, Beck said.

The school ordinarily has little or no money on hand, banking it each day. But Beck said C. Jean McDonald, the commercial teacher and faculty treasurer, was ill Wednesday and not at school, so the funds were left in the money box.

Beck and Coach Ernest Funtt had been in the school Wednesday evening and had noticed nothing amiss. Beck said he called Police Chief Fenton Mahrt to investigate and that Mahrt told him he passed the school about midnight Wednesday, after patrolling the north end of town in answer to a call that there was a prowler, and had noticed nothing wrong.

Two Dorris boys, 13 and 14 years old, are in the Siskiyou county jail awaiting action by the juvenile court on charges of burglarizing the Butte Valley Hardware and Supply on Third Street in Dorris of a quantity of guns and ammunition Saturday evening of last week.

They also face the charge of burglarizing the Dorris Post Office on two successive nights and taking several pounds of mail from the boxes.

Ralph Miller, owner of the hardware store, said the first he knew of anything being wrong was at about 9:15 a.m. Sunday when Henry Carroll, who rents the apartment at the rear of the store, phoned him to complain that the electricity was off and the front door glass of the shop was broken. Miller found the electricity clock stopped at about 11:45 an unsecured door in the front controlling both store and apartment circuits.

Entrance had apparently been gained through the broken door glass, the intruders letting themselves out by a door onto the alley.

Miller then called Dorris Police Chief Fenton Mahrt and Clarence Houston, at the Siskiyou county sheriff's office at Yreka to report the burglary.

The case became unsnarled not long after when the older brother of the 13-year-old boy brought him into the store to ask if a handful of change, several new cartridges and a check were Miller's. The money and shells were from the store, Miller said, but the unendorsed check, for Joe Allen's pay as county supervisor, was not.

An investigation at the home of the other boy turned up shells, a shot gun and mail.

The pistols, carbines and hunting knives turned up in various hiding places. The serial numbers of the guns checked with the hardware store records.

Lester E. Newton, county probation officer, has been questioning the boys and investigating the case.
