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Mayor, Council Hear D.A. On Vice; Award Bond Bid, Read Annexation Bill

Although vice stole the show at City Council Monday night, the spotlight that is city government also trained its beam on the regular routine business of bond bids and annexation.

The "tax" of the evening, District Attorney Frank Alderson, took the floor to reiterate his stand against the "unpleasant but important" matter of commercialized vice in Klamath Falls and to urge city officials' support in enforcing that stand.

Mayor Paul O. Landry assured the district attorney of the full cooperation of himself and the council, and won verbal applause from the Rev. Lloyd Holloway and the Rev. George Alder, two of the city's ministers who last week criticized the mayor for his "no-comment" attitude.

Alderson gave the council a copy of a letter and a brochure of compiled statistics he had received from Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton in which Thornton reiterates his stand against commercialized prostitution.

Thornton's letter says he has received several complaints from residents of Klamath County on the "wide open brothels — Myrtle's, Iron Door, Irene's and the Palm Hotel."

"I am no professional public moralist," Thornton declares, "but the more I have learned about it, the more firmly I am convinced that commercialized prostitution is a vicious racket."

The attorney general further states that there are only two communities in Eastern Oregon and only one in Western Oregon which still tolerate open prostitution. He asked public officials' cooperation in taking Klamath Falls off that list.

The district attorney expressed his agreement with the attorney general and the mayor expressed his agreement with the district attorney, and the show was over.

On the lighter side, Council rescinded last week's action of awarding the bond bid for improvement units 119, 120, 121 and 122 (street repairs) to United States National Bank and awarded the contract to Blythe and Co., Portland.

The action was taken to comply with legal opinion from Portland which said the bonds must be based on a ten year basis; council's first action granted the bonds to U. S. National on a basis that, if redeeming them in two to five years, the local bid was lower.

The third and final reading of the annexation ordinance was heard, proposing annexation of the area southeast from the city limits including the federal housing units, the school district adjacent and Sunnyland.

Residents of the city have 30 days in which to file a referendum. If one is filed, registered voters in the city will vote on the referendum. If it votes in favor, an election will be held, within the year, in the territory proposed for annexation. Fifty-one per cent of the registered voters in the territory proposed for annexation will be necessary to bring the area into the city.

If no referendum is filed, an election may be held anytime after this 30 day period is up, for registered voters within the proposed annexation territory.

Dorris Students Receive Awards

DORRIS—For maintaining high scholastic ratings and displaying traits of outstanding citizenship during their high school careers, four Butte Valley high school students this week were named recipients of the annual Bank of America Achievement Awards by Principal Harry Beck.

An achievement cup for excellence in general fields of study will be awarded to Allen McIntyre, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray McIntyre of Dorris, in science and mathematics.

For superiority in specific fields of study, achievement certificates will be awarded to George Reese, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. B. Reese of Dorris, liberal arts; Lois Alexander, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. K. Alexander of Macdoel, fine arts; Cieta Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller of Dorris, vocational arts.

Awardees are chosen from the graduating class by a faculty committee. Those receiving cups may be asked to attend regional selections at a date to be announced soon. Winners of the latter contests may be chosen for cash awards as high as \$1,000 at the final events in Sacramento and San Francisco in May.

In selecting the awardees, the student's participation in school activities and his leadership qualities are considered along with his scholastic record, with special emphasis on the promise of future success and service to society. Its purpose is to give recognition and encouragement to youth.

Parole Violator To Be Returned

Sheriff Murray Britton was notified Tuesday that Agent Manuel B. Foster of the California Adult Authority is en route from Sacramento to take custody of Thomas Victor Coates, 31, as a parole violator.

Last week Coates was denied a writ of habeas corpus by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg. He claimed he was illegally held here for California authorities.

Last month Coates was freed of a forgery charge in Circuit Court. After a jury had been impaneled, District Attorney Frank Alderson asked the court to dismiss the charge because witnesses said they could not identify the defendant as a forged check passer.

Coates was arrested in Texas on the Klamath county forgery charge and returned here under extradition by Deputy Sheriff Dal Reed.

Astoria Soldier Found In East

ASTORIA (AP) — A letter that would have put an early halt to a frantic search for Pvt. George E. Long of Astoria, arrived late Monday from Ft. Bragg, N. C. It said he was there, taking routine training with the 82nd Airborne Division.

Long was sought last week because a man held at El Reno, Okla., gave Long's name when arrested in a Los Angeles slaying. Long's parents hadn't heard from him since he left Ft. Ord for the West Coast. After extended checking, it was determined Saturday that Long had been at Ft. Bragg at the time of the Los Angeles killing and that the man who gave his name was an impostor who had known Long in the Army.

The letter that would have cleared it all up early was a routine "hometown" news item sent by the Astorian-Budget by Ft. Bragg's public information officer.

Memorial To U. S. Dead Unveiled

CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—The 90-year-old words of Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address resounded over the Australian bushland Tuesday as Queen Elizabeth II unveiled Australia's 258-foot high memorial to American help in the Pacific war.

Telling her audience that respect and thanks to the war dead were not enough, the young monarch quoted from America's Civil War President:

"It is for us the living rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work they have thus far so nobly advanced."

DORRIS — The first of three public study meetings on the proposed unification of Butte Valley school districts will be held Tuesday evening at the Butte Valley High School gym at Dorris, County High School Superintendent W. E. Roberts announced this week.

The series had originally been slated to begin several weeks ago, but a snowstorm caused its postponement.

The meetings are conducted by the Siskiyou County Committee on school district organization, plus the school boards of the Red Rock, Macdoel, Mt. Hebron, Dorris, Tenant and Siskiyou joint union high school district adjacent and Sunnyland.

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Postal Employees Take Examination

Thirteen Klamath Falls Post Office clerks and city letter carriers last Saturday took part in a written competitive examination for promotion to vacancies in supervisory positions in post offices.

The examination was given by W. R. Beall, post office inspector from Eugene.

According to Chet Langalet, local postmaster, the test is the first such exam for the local office held under the new program set up recently by Postmaster General Summerfield to assure that future promotions of employees to supervisory jobs will hereafter be made wherever possible on the results of impartial competitive tests which are part of the new modernized personnel program of the post office department.
