Reds Seek Canadian Trade Pact

OTTAWA (AP) — The Soviet Union is launching a campaign to expand her trade with Canada. There's room for plenty of expansion, since Canada sold Russia just \$466 worth of goods during the first nine months of 1953.

D. S. Chuvahin, Moscow's first ambassador to Ottawa since Igor Gouzenko's spy revelations of 1945, invited newsmen to his embassy Monday night to tell them the Soviets want to do business with Canada.

Chuvahin said his country is ready to start trade negotiations "right now" and a commercial attaché will join his staff within a month to handle all details.

The ambassador said Soviet authorities "regard favorably" Canadian Trade Minister C.D. Howe's statement last Jan. 4 that the Ottawa government is willing to enlarge trade with the Reds.

Chuvahin said Russia could seek Canada manganese ore, diesel fuels and petroleum products, cotton and probably many other commodities. He said his government is ready to buy freighters, textiles, farm machinery, butter meals, raw hides and maybe even some of Canada's surplus wheat — if that would help trading relationships.

He added Russia is ready to export items classified by the West as strategic materials — the war potential goods which Canada and the rest of the Western Allies won't sell to the Soviet bloc nations.
