The room of enormous flower-like formations in gypsum is on the edge of the uncharted area and had been observed before by only a few intrepid explorers.

William Burke Miller, an NBC newsman accompanying the expedition, described it as "an orchid paradise on the ceiling" and "the most beautiful sight any of us had ever seen."

The stone flowers, he said, "hung in clusters of indescribable beauty and their colors ranged from pure white to red brown."

They formed over the centuries in a reaction of the limestone with moisture in a circular room 18 feet in circumference and five feet high.

The sight whetted the enthusiasm of the 32 men and women in the expedition's Advance Camp No. 1, three miles and six hours of crawling and climbing from the cave entrance.

Joe Lawrence Jr. of Philadelphia, 27-year-old leader of the expedition, arrived at the outpost at midnight to take charge of the push into unknown areas.

Scouting teams still are searching for Advance Camp No. 2, which must be six hours farther in the cave.

The teams are equipped not only for crawling but have mountain-climbing gear for scaling domes which rise to a height of 50 feet and pits which drop to a depth of 100 or more feet.

One team of two women and four men, which became stranded by fatigue on the three-mile route to Advance Camp No. 1, finally arrived after 13 1/2 hours. Among them was Mrs. Ida V. Sawtelle of Brooklyn, the camp cook. She immediately prepared a spaghetti dinner for the outpost crew.

Dread Disease Claims Bride

SCRANTON, Pa. (AP)—A state trooper's bride of 10 days, whose doctor says she is dying of leukemia, went ahead making plans for the future today—unaware she has the deadly cancer of the blood.

Paul Chylak Jr. learned first that his high school sweetheart Marie Rebar had the dread disease two weeks before the marriage when doctors told him the results of a state-required blood test.

The wedding was held as scheduled on Feb. 6 and the couple left by automobile for a honeymoon in New York. After less than an hour's drive the bride collapsed.

They returned to Marie's home in nearby Olyphant. A week later she was admitted to the hospital.

Educators Deplore Modern Methods Of Teaching

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP)—Your bright young son or daughter may be a whiz at reading Goethe in the original German. But when it comes to speaking the language, it's enough to make a Teuton's hair stand on end.

About half the nation's college students grinding away trying to learn how to speak a foreign language are wasting time, says Dr. Albert J. George, head of Syracuse University's department of romance languages. But, he adds, it's not their fault. It's the way languages are taught.

Most can learn to read and write a foreign language, Dr. George concedes, but grasping the tricks of tongue twisting so a Frenchman or German understands what they're saying is another matter. Present teaching methods just don't do the job, he says.

Dr. George, with Dr. Luis M. Di Carlo, executive director of the university's hearing and speech center, think they have a remedy. They believe they have found a way to predict, before time and money is spent, whether a certain student will be able to learn to speak a foreign language fluently and to understand the rapid-fire phrases of a foreigner.

If their predictions are correct, those taught by the new method proved far more capable of speaking and understanding English, Dr. George reports.

The two professors refuse to discuss details of the methods they use to determine a student's abilities until a vast statistical study is completed with a pilot group

of 200 students from Colgate and Syracuse. They believe first returns indicate their theory is sound but they won't say definitely until the project is concluded several months from now.
