

Japanese Honor Chiloquin Man

CHILQUIN — Honor was given to a resident of Chiloquin, serving with the marines in Korea, following a stampede of Japanese in which 17 persons were killed, and 65 injured.

Pfc. Julian R. Hood, 19, son of Mrs. Thelma Hood, Chiloquin, was one of 10 U.S. servicemen who were honored Wednesday, February 17 in champagne by Takeru Inukai, Japanese minister of justice, for heroic assistance to Japanese police when thousands of Japanese rushed a narrow palace gate at the imperial palace of the emperor, recently.

The 10 marines, airmen and soldiers were also given certificates of commendation and miniature gold statues commemorating the affair.

Pfc. Hood attended school at the Klamath Agency and at Chemawa, near Salem before enlisting. A brother, Haskell Hood lost his life in the Korean fighting. He also has a brother, Harvey in a military school, Portland and a sister, Thelma, Charlene Hood, student at OTI.

Cattle Sale Held in Prineville

Northwest cattlemen paid an average of \$477.95 for 83 head of purebred range bulls at the Oregon Cattlemen's Association's sale in Ontario, Saturday.

The top selling bull, Baca Prince 1st, consigned by Ed. Hopfer, Burns, sold to C. E. Tuttle, Prineville for \$1,650. This grand champion bull was the first animal consigned by Hopfer who established himself in the ranks of the state's outstanding breeders. The reserve champion bull, consigned by Clem Bergeson of Walla Walla, Washington, was purchased by R. T. Baker, Weiser, Idaho, for \$810.

Denmark Star, consigned by Dean Short of the Mile-away Ranch near Redmond, brought the top price in the Shorthorn division of this annual cattlemen's sale. S. K. Skinner and Sons of Jordan Valley paid \$875 for this outstanding herd sire prospect.

Governor Names Farmer To Board

PENDLETON, Feb. 15.—Ralph McEwen, wheat farmer from Athena, Oregon, has been appointed by Governor Paul Patterson to serve on the Oregon Wheat Commission. He will replace Jons Peterson who resigned from the Commission effective February 15, 1954.

The Oregon Wheat Commission is a state agency originated to find new markets for wheat and wheat products.

McEwen has farmed in Eastern Oregon for the past ten years, and prior to that was a cereal chemist with a large Pacific Northwest milling company for many years. He has been concerned with wheat producers' problems many times before, and served as president of the Oregon Wheat Growers League during 1948.

Recently McEwen has also been appointed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson to serve on the national Grain Research Advisory Committee.

Local Resident Declared Suicide

Marshall E. Fisher, 38-year-old Klamath Falls painter, killed himself with a 12-gauge shotgun shortly before noon Wednesday according to Sheriff Murray Britton.

The body, with the top of the head blown off, was discovered by his wife, Zelda, in a laundry room at their home, 1842 Summers Lane.

Mrs. Fisher was unable to ascribe a motive for the tragedy. The body was taken to Ward's Funeral Home.
