Oregon Tech goes to Portland Friday for its last scheduled wrestling meet of the season.

The Owls face Lewis and Clark, a team they whipped 28-6 in a meet earlier this month.

Couch Bob Smith's grapplers hold a 6-1 record for the season, reversing its only loss to Portland State in a later match.

Smith is switching his entries in the 167 and 177 pound divisions in the hopes of beating Lewis and Clark's star Ralph Staley. Dean Schnitz will go against Staley, with Kent Crawley entering the 157-pound division.

Tom Wells takes the place of Vic Schwetz in the 147-pound class.

Other Tech entries are Larry Dryden 123, Alvin Christie 139, Don Earl 157, Pete Stepper 157 and heavyweight Floyd Pierce who will face the Pioneers' Mike Clock.

## Pels Host Grants Pass

The Klamath Falls Pelicans, unbeaten in 60 meets over seven seasons (12 straight this season), host the Grants Pass Caversen on Pelican Court Friday, 3 p.m.

The Pels are getting ready for next week's state-qualifying district meet and some have moved down a weight to get used to the division in which they'll bid for a state berth.

## NCAA Taps Chieftains

SEATTLE (AP)—Seattle University, tapped by the NCAA as an all-star team for the 16th National Collegiate Basketball Championships, probably will play its first tournament game at the University of Washington pavilion here, the Post-Intelligencer said Thursday.

The Chieftains' first round opponent will be Idaho State, Rocky Mountain Conference (title), and the winner will play in the NCAA regionals at Corvallis, Ore., March 12-13.

The Post-Intelligencer said officials of the two schools favored March 8 as the date of their play-off and were expected to agree on the Washington pavilion as a neutral floor during a three-way telephone hookup Thursday with NCAA officials at Kansas City.

Seattle and Idaho State met in the first-round of last year's tournament, Seattle won, but was defeated by Washington in the opening game of the regionals at Corvallis.

## Jimmy Slade Upsets Henry

WASHINGTON (AP)—Jimmy Slade, 27-year-old comeback kid, has bounced right into the middle of the light-heavyweight championship picture.

"I outmaneuvered him," Slade said after scoring a surprising 10-round decision over Clarence Henry of Los Angeles in a nationally televised bout Wednesday night. Slade, of Norfolk, Va., weighed 175 1/2, Henry 186.

Jimmy's speed had Henry baffled through half the fight and then he added to Henry's confusion by rallying with telling blows every time it appeared he had been hurt himself.

Judge Harry Dwyer saw the fight for Slade, 90 points to 81. Judge Bob Kilmartin had Slade ahead 97-85, but Referee Charley Reynolds called it a draw, 94-94.

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## Toughies In Store For Dukes

NEW YORK (AP)—The easy sledding is over for Duquesne's talented basketball team in the Dukes' bid to go through the season undefeated.

Untested in collegiate play in two weeks, Duquesne romped to its 21st successive victory last night by walling off Little Geneva 93-59. It was no challenge for the No. 1 team in the latest Associated Press poll as the regulars all hit in double figures.

New, however, the Dukes go up against the nifty party of their schedule, starting next Monday against Bowling Green. Then in order will follow Cincinnati, Dayton, St. Bonaventure, Villanova and the National Invitation Tournament. If the Dukes can do it, they'll be the first team since Army in 1944 to go through without a loss.

Kentucky, the nation's only other undefeated team, also has a good chance to go through without a loss if they beat De Paul in the Chicago Stadium Saturday night. Kentucky, ranked second with 19 straight, has a routine date with Tennessee tonight and also must face Vanderbilt, Auburn and Alabama. If the Wildcats and Louisiana State tie for the Southeastern Conference title, as expected, they would play off for the championship.

Dayton walloped Cincinnati 91-66 last night and Villanova trimmed St. Bonaventure 79-64. Dayton, No. 17 team, ran its record to 21-5 as John Horan scored 26 points and Bill Uhl made 24.

Both the NIT and NCAA tournaments gained one team yesterday. Wichita, ranked 15th with a 22-3 record, joined Duquesne, Dayton, Kentucky and Villanova in the NIT, and Seattle, No. 7 team, was named a Western "at large" team in the NCAA for the second straight year.

Louisville lived up to its NIT selection by whaling Kentucky Wesleyan 91-76 to make its record 19-6, and Little St. Francis of Brooklyn enhanced its chances of an invitation by trimming City College 71-51. The Terriers now have 12 straight victories and a 19-3 mark.

The NIT suffered a blow, however, when President Max Farrington of the Southern Conference announced that the conference would not change its rule that the NCAA is the only postseason tournament for members. The NIT had hoped to land Furman, if they did not win the conference title, because of high-scoring Frank Selvy's rate appeal.

Only two other top-ranking teams were in action last night. Notre Dame, No. 6, fell behind Butler 11-2, but picked up the quarter and won going away 81-58. Holy Cross, No. 8, romped to its ninth straight since a loss to Notre Dame in whipping St. Michael's of Vermont 69-67.

La Salle, No. 12, stopped Fordham 41-56 after leading all the way.

## Jones Boys In Act Again

NEW YORK (AP)—The time has come around again to spread the alarm that the Jones boys, father and son, have a Kentucky Derby horse, and that Eddie Arcaro has promised to ride it for them May 1 at Louisville.

This combination up to now has batted exactly 1,000 per cent in the 3-year-old classic. Four times Arcaro has straddled a Calumet colt trained by Ben the elder and son Jimmie, and each time the world's richest jockey has trotted him back to the winner's circle.

Last year, for a heartening change to the other stables, the Jones boys and Calumet passed their hand, not believing they had a horse capable of running with Native Dancer. But now they are back, and this is the customary warning issued by this bureau.

Their colt's name is Duke's Lea. His happy was the famous sire Blenheim II, whose previous progeny included the great stretch-running Whirlaway, winner of the 1941 Kentucky Derby. This one also likes to come from away back.

The reason you might have heard very little about Duke's Lea until just lately is that he ran only one time last year, in April, and didn't do any good then. The Jones boys stand turning him loose only recently out in California.

After a few trial spins, the newest Calumet threat came up to lose by a nose. Since then he has run away with three straight races, including a four-length victory in his most recent outing on Tuesday, a six-furlong affair in which he packed high weight of 120 pounds and finished eased up under Arcaro.

Now Duke's Lea is, of course, favored to win the \$100,000 Santa Anita Derby this Saturday. This race stretches out to a mile and one-eighth, only a furlong short of the Kentucky Derby route, and should indicate how far the colt likes to run.

Jimmy Jones, who learned from his revered father to tell nobody nothin', is quoted from out there as saying that Duke's Lea apparently can "go a distance." Coming whence it does, that is roughly equivalent to saying he looks like a second Citation, whose earnings enabled Ben Jones to buy another bank.

## Pehanick Ahead Of Halbrook

The basketball scoring derby in the Pacific Northwest has settled down to a head-and-head race between a couple of the tallest guys in the business—Wade Halbrook of Oregon State and Joe Pehanick of Seattle U.

No midget at 6 feet 9, Joe can't quite match Halbrook's 7 feet 3 in the altitude department, but he still tops him this week in tally totals, 527 points to 504.

Although Don Porter of Portland State is on their heels with 478, he's likely to run out of opposition before either of the big boys. Pehanick has at least three games left in which to stretch his scoring string and Halbrook has a certain four. Tourneys may lengthen the season for both.

## AT LARGE

The regular season gives Chief Joseph two tilts against Portland U. and the selection of Seattle as an "at large" team in the NCAA playoffs assured him of at least one more—against Idaho State to fill a berth in the regionals.

Halbrook should overtake Pehanick this week in two games against Washington State, Pehanick remaining idle until next week.

Although he rated third in total scoring, Porter topped the Northwest on a per-game basis, averaging 24.4 through last Saturday. Halbrook was second in this category, too, with 22.9 and Pehanick was far back with 21.1.

## FOURTH SPOT

Jackie May of St. Martin's ran his total to 453 and surged into fourth spot ahead of Gonzaga's Jerry Vermillion. It took 378 points to land a player in the top ten—almost 50 more than last week. Others in the select group were Ron Begnink of WSC, Dick Edwards of Eastern Washington, R. C. Owens of College of Idaho, Phil Jordan of Whitworth and Ted Schadowitz of Eastern Oregon.

"They thrive on the idea of being the best," the big Indian right-hander added.

"Sure, it's true I don't need my baseball paycheck to keep me going," he said, "but this is the game I got my start in, and it's hard to break away."

"I know there was talk I might chuck it this year and devote myself to my oil business. But my oil business doesn't keep me tied down. So I want to keep playing baseball."

## Utah Grids Book Army

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—University of Utah will play Army's football team in 1957, Utah Athletic Director Jack Curtice said Thursday.

Curtice said it would be the first game for a Utah team against any school east of the Mississippi. He said signing for the Army game Nov. 9, 1957, is part of a stepped-up program of athletics at the University aimed at putting Utah in the national limelight.

"We have signed the University of Oregon for the home opener in 1955," Curtice said, "and next year we will play Washington, Arizona and Oregon in that order to open our season."

The Yankees are said to be offering the wealthy Cherokee no more than last year's \$37,500, if that much. He is reported holding out for \$40,000.

"That's another place pride enters in," he said. "There's very little difference in my demands and their offer. But I'm too proud to take less than I think I deserve. It's principle."

Reynolds, perennial World Series starter for the world champions and holder of a proud 7-2 record in Series play, had a 13-7 winning mark last year but his stout relief pitching is credited with bringing the Yankees their fifth straight pennant and world title.

## Durando Banks On Wallop

NEW YORK (AP)—Ernie Durando has a simple philosophy about boxing.

"If I can catch and hit a guy, then I've got him."

Having caught and belted Rocky Castellani the last time, the Bayonne, N. J., Bruiser feels very confident that he can do it again Friday night in Madison Square Garden.

"I'm going to try and knock him out again," he said as he finished his training in Stillman's Gym. "I'd like to make it real sensational."

Told that Castellani was a 2-1 favorite despite Ernie's seventh-round technical knockout in their last fight, Durando said:

"That's okay with me. I'm the best underdog fighter you ever saw. I was an underdog against Castellani two years ago. I was a 4-1 underdog to Charley Humes in Paris last October and I knocked the Frenchman out in the sixth round. Any guy I can hit solid I can knock out."

It seems that the heavy-fisted Jerseyite has to stop 'em to win. He has won 35 of 55 fights with 15 losses and 2 draws. He has lost 27 rivals, almost 80 per cent. But of the 28 fights that went the limit, his record is a poor 11-15-2.

## All Records Not Selvy's

NEW YORK (AP)—Bob Pettit of Louisiana State would have been the talk of college basketball this season, if Frank Selvy had been out of the picture.

Furman's Selvy, of course, is the leading scorer in major college competition with a 2-points per game average and with almost every important record in his possession.

But Pettit, according to the latest NCAB figures is second with a 33.1 average.

Bob's average is higher than anyone ever has posted except for Selvy this season.

There are other statistical departments in which Selvy doesn't hold the lead. "Niagara's" Charlie Hoxie and Larry Costello are the most accurate shooters in major competition. Hoxie is sinking 57.9 per cent of his shots from the floor and Costello 86.2 per cent from the foul line. And Connecticut's Art Quimby is still the No. 1 man in rebounding, hauling in 23.3 a game to 22.2 for Charlie Slack of Marshall and 22 for LaSalle's Tom Gola.

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
