

Favorites Lose Armory Bouts

The wrestling favorites got the cheers—but not the decisions—in last night's clambake at the Armory.

Popular Georges Dusette lost to baldheaded Jack Rush and injured his back in the process. John Paul Henning, as slick a workman as the punch-palace has seen in its long history, lost to Kurt Von Poppenheim when the Proud Prussian grabbed a handful of Henning's trunks for leverage on the back body press.

There was no particular favorite in the one-fall house-warmer, but if anyone was it was wavy-haired Danny O'Rourke and he lost to Bronco Lublich. Lublich used a toe hold for the victory in 12:15 of a bout scheduled for 20 minutes.

Both Rush and the Oklahoma skin-head, and Dusette, the French Canadian Strongman, fell out of the ring in the second shift of that bout—but Rush picked a softer place to land.

Dusette's back found the wrong spot on the ring apron and the full Nelson expert couldn't make it back in the ring within the regulation 20-count. In fact he didn't make it to the dressing room under his own power; two seconds had to help him.

Rush had won the first fall in 14:30 with what he called the spinning chinlock, his own tag for the reverse drop headlock. The fall came after Rush had used Dusette's head to splinter the ringposts. Then the tide switched to Dusette, who by that time had worked up a real mad. Powerful forearm smashes had Rush reeling around the ring like a New Year's Eve celebrant.

The knuckle treatment made Rush ripe for the full Nelson and that's what Dusette used. But the spindly-legged man with no hair on his head made a run for the ropes and the momentum carried both warriors over the top strand.

20 MINUTES
Rush had a pain in the neck—and a win. The match lasted just slightly more than 20 minutes of the allotted one hour.

The last scrap on the program lasted less than 30 minutes when Henning gave Von Poppenheim a lesson in catch-as-catch-can wrestling, but Referee Norval Stockstill, not the best arbiter who has shown here, failed to see the Prussian's tight tricep at the tag end of the bout.

Von Pop won also by using the ropes as a refuge. Henning had used a series of drop headlocks to make the Swastika Swatter's head as soft as an underboiled egg, when Pop scrambled for the ropes with Henning still in charge.

TRUNK HOLD
Von Poppenheim found a hold on Henning's trunks as both boomeranged off the hemp and the Miami, Fla., lad couldn't move with his shoulders chummy with the mat.

Von Poppenheim used half a Boston Crab for the first fall in 18:30.

Henning tortured Von Pop with the armstretch in the second round, then chopped him down with two dropkicks to the chin. That took just seven minutes.

But it was over in 2:05 of the third stanza and Henning's irate protests fell on Stockstill's deaf ears.

Honesty Pays Off

Coach Elmy Nickel of Bellflower High School thought his team had beaten Wapella High 62-61 Tuesday night. Nickel was feeling happy—with his second victory in 20 games—until he checked his score book when he returned home.

No matter how he added it up, the score came out 62-62. He telephoned the Wapella coach, Hank Roehrich, 35 miles away. Roehrich and his team, plus cheerleaders and a group of Wapella fans, drove back to Bellflower Wednesday night.

"It was our 14th loss," said Roehrich.
