

# U.S. Watchful Of New Asian Policy

MANILA (AP)—The Philippines Republic has embarked on a new foreign policy, "Asia for the Asians," which has U. S. diplomatic officials watching carefully. Up to now, the new policy has left cold the Asian countries it was intended to influence.

The policy is based on developing an Asian nationalism under the wartime rallying cry used by Japan in promoting its East Asia co-prosperity sphere.

Philippine proponents insist the new policy will not affect traditional ties with the United States. Despite this, American officials here indicate they must remain alert for any unilateral action which might affect the balance in democracy's bulwark against communism in Asia.

The U. S. Embassy in Manila has not commented officially but appears concerned lest the policy be misinterpreted in some quarters in the United States. The Philippines still depend upon the United States for aid in supporting the islands' economy and so must move cautiously, U. S. sources indicated.

The basic change under the new policy would seem to be toward independent action in foreign matters and away from the old Liberal party policy of taking cues from the United States. At the last election, Elpidio Quirino, head of the Liberals, was beaten soundly for a second term as president by Ramon Magasaysay and his Nacionalista party.

The policy switch was disclosed in a surprising manner earlier this month. Instead of being enunciated by Magasaysay or by Vice President Carlos P. Garcia, the secretary of foreign affairs, it first was proclaimed by Garcia's under secretary, Leon Guerrero.

Guerrero was the "voice of freedom" during the early days of World War II until his capture by the Japanese. Later he was released from prison and broadcast Japanese propaganda.

Guerrero's first strong support for the new policy came from Sen. Claro M. Recto, wartime foreign minister of the Philippines under the Japanese.

Recto has been accused by critics of being anti-American but has denied the charge.

Vice President Garcia quickly added his support.

# Portland CCC Head Criticized

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Pelly (R-Wash.) Wednesday called on the Commodore Credit Corp. to replace its regional director at Portland, Ore., if investigation shows reports he "has an unsympathetic attitude toward the storage problem and the present administration" prove correct.

Pelly said in a letter to Undersecretary of Agriculture True J. Morse, CCC president, he is "in constant receipt of inquiries from my constituents" since he called for an investigation of Regional Director Clyde Kiddie last week.

Pelly requested an inquiry after recent conferences on storage of surplus wheat aboard Maritime Administration reserve fleet vessels in the Pacific Northwest.

The congressman said his first request was not answered and "interested parties" were asking for a report on the "progress of my efforts to bring Mr. Kiddie's disposition to the attention of the proper parties with a view to replacing him if such charges prove to be substantially accurate."

Pelly also expressed dissatisfaction with some points of the CCC decision to store wheat on ships moored near Olympia, Wash., and Astoria, Ore.

The CCC announcement last week said dredging will be necessary before the Astoria site can be used. Pelly said the dredging cost could be avoided by using an alternate site on the Columbia River between Puget Sound and after World War II. The site has sufficient depth to eliminate all but a minor part of the dredging, he said.

Guerrero claimed the "Asia for the Asians" policy has created a "favorable atmosphere" among Asian neighbors. But it appeared too early yet to tell what real effect it would have until it is converted from speeches to action.

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# Colorful Former Sheriff Speaks To Knife And Fork

T. W. (Buckshot) Lane, an ex-sheriff from down Rio Grande way, told Klamath Falls Knife and Fork Club members Wednesday night that the era when the average cop really believed there was more law in a rood, stout night stick than all of Blackstone's writings, is over.

The lawman added that beating confessions out of often innocent persons has been supplanted by the lie detector.

Lane, who is not the most self effacing person who ever came out of the Lone Star state, kept the after dinner audience at the Willard Hotel highly amused with his startling adventures. In typical Texas lingo he told his story which went something like this:

When Buckshot heard all the balloons had been counted and he was elected sheriff of Wharton County, he was plenty worried. Wharton is one of those big, old Texas counties that you still know would pass for a state in most any other part of these here United States.

After his election, Buckshot, who is a little guy, found himself a modern David, hemmed in by the scientific law enforcement, with all its gadgets, easy-to-ride Go-laths. He realized that no matter how quick he was on the draw or how fast he could shoot, he was no match for the Texas badmen.

Buckshot decided to beat brawn with brains, so he went in for scientific law enforcement. Within a short time the redoubtable Buckshot had talked the county officials who held the purse strings

out of an airplane, two-way radio set, teletype machine, high-powered camera and a lie detector.

With this collection of gadgets, Buckshot won national fame as a peace officer. The Saturday Evening Post, Time and Life magazines gave him lots of space. Now wherever spectacular crime-crushing is discussed, the name of Buckshot Lane always comes up.

On the serious side, Lane told the Knife and Forkers that they should give their sheriff, chief of police and other officers full support.

"Every sheriff should have a lie detector," he said. "Operated by a competent person a lie detector is almost infallible."
