Marine Probe Continues

WASHINGTON (AP)—The former Marine air commander in Korea Wednesday described Col. Frank H. Schwable, who made a false confession of germ warfare, as one of the most "conscientious and bravest" officers he had ever known.

Maj. Gen. Clayton C. Jerome, now aircraft commander of the Atlantic Fleet Marine force, gave this testimony in the second day of the court of inquiry convened to decide whether Schwable will be disciplined for the confession which he later repudiated.

Jerome said that Schwable was

his chief of staff at the time he was shot down on a flight in July 1952, and captured by the Communists. Aside from praising Schwable, Jerome also said he was one of the brightest officers he had known.

Jerome testified that Schwable's ill-fated flight was authorized but that the route had not been specified. Jerome added, under questioning by court counsel, that he believed Schwable had taken a route that was "well within a proper reconnaissance area" and that high winds had drifted the aircraft northward across the enemy's line.

The court—made up of three Marine generals and a Navy admiral—will report its findings to the Marine Corps, which then will decide whether to court martial Schwable for the confession he made while a Red prisoner in Ko-

rea. Schwable renounced that confession after he was freed last year. He said then the Reds induced him to sign after "extreme torment."

The court convened Tuesday and its counsel, Lt. Col. Kenneth A. Murphy, took up most of the time developing background of the case. He said the court would sit about two or three weeks.

This is the first time in Marine history that such a court has been convened to examine the conduct of one of its men while in enemy hands.

Water Group Meets In La Grande

LA GRANDE (AP)—A delegation from Baker Tuesday was not permitted to discuss the controversial Hells Canyon Dam at a State Water Resources Committee hearing here.

Lyle Watts of Portland, committee chairman, told the delegation: "It is beyond the scope of this committee to discuss Hells Canyon and we don't want to spend the entire afternoon on that question."

The meeting here was the second of a series to be held throughout the state this month and next. The Legislature, hopes at the conclusion of the hearings to develop a comprehensive water development program for the state.

Missing Yacht Found Safe

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (AP)—The Coast Guard reported last night that the Florida racing yacht Dirigo II, missing since Feb. 8 with four men aboard, was found 90 miles north of Galapagos Islands.

The Dirigo called the marine operator at the Coast Guard station here and said the passengers were well and not in any danger. The craft expects to reach the Galapagos Thursday, the Coast Guard said.

The owner and skipper, James W. Crawford Jr. of Bradenton and Sarasota, Fla., said the craft's radio had gone out of order and the crewmen were unaware of the search for them.

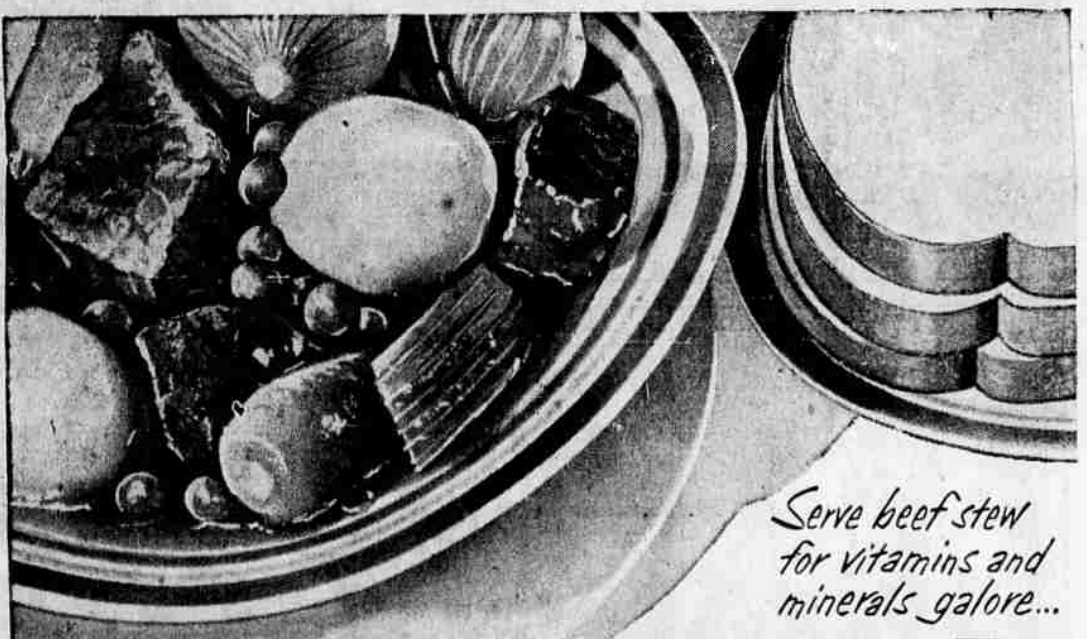
