Final Vote On Bricker Bill Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate today put off until next week a final showdown on the Bricker treaty power amendment, after a 44-43 administration victory on a test vote.

This outcome left the general impression among senators that the only proposed constitutional amendment with a chance of winning the required two-thirds approval of those voting was a substitute offered by Sen. George (D-Ga.).

George's proposal would amend the Constitution to say:

"A provision of a treaty or other international agreement which conflicts with this constitution shall not be of any force or effect."

"An international agreement other than a treaty shall become effective as internal law in the United States only by an act of Congress."

This substitute for a proposed constitutional amendment by Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio) has been found unacceptable by President Eisenhower and his executive assistants. They turned down also the original Bricker proposal, which has not

as yet been modified to meet the objections.

Nevertheless, several senators said that if George's proposal is not accepted by the Senate, no constitutional amendment is likely to be passed.

Bricker has said he would go along with the George proposition if his own revision of the constitu-

tional change is rejected by the Senate.

Bricker's proposal would provide that no treaty or international agreement should become effective as domestic law unless approved by a majority of both houses of

Congress or separate two-thirds vote of the Senate.

Bricker said in an interview he does not want the Senate to vote on this issue until next week because some of his supporters will be absent earlier.

Water Problems To Be Aired

The state water resources committee will be listening to water problems of Klamath County at 1 p.m. Monday, March 1, at the Willard Hotel, Klamath Falls.

The public meeting is one of a series being held throughout the state to learn the water problems and what might be done to solve them.

Lyle F. Watts, Portland, chairman of the committee, said the group is particularly interested in local water problems of stream pollution, fish and recreation, industrial development, irrigation and drainage, and domestic and livestock supplies. The committee also seeks opinions on what should be done about small dams.

According to H. J. Chandler, floor leader for the Klamath Falls meeting, everyone who has a water problem to present or a proposed solution to an existing problem will be given an opportunity to be heard.

Watts pointed out that water is one of Oregon's most important natural resources, and citizens have a responsibility to help solve its problems.

Arrangements to make a statement at the meeting can be made

through Chandler, chamber of commerce secretary, or the county agent, C. A. Henderson.

Findings of the state water resources committee are to be submitted to the 1955 state legislature as a proposed guide for developing water supplies.
