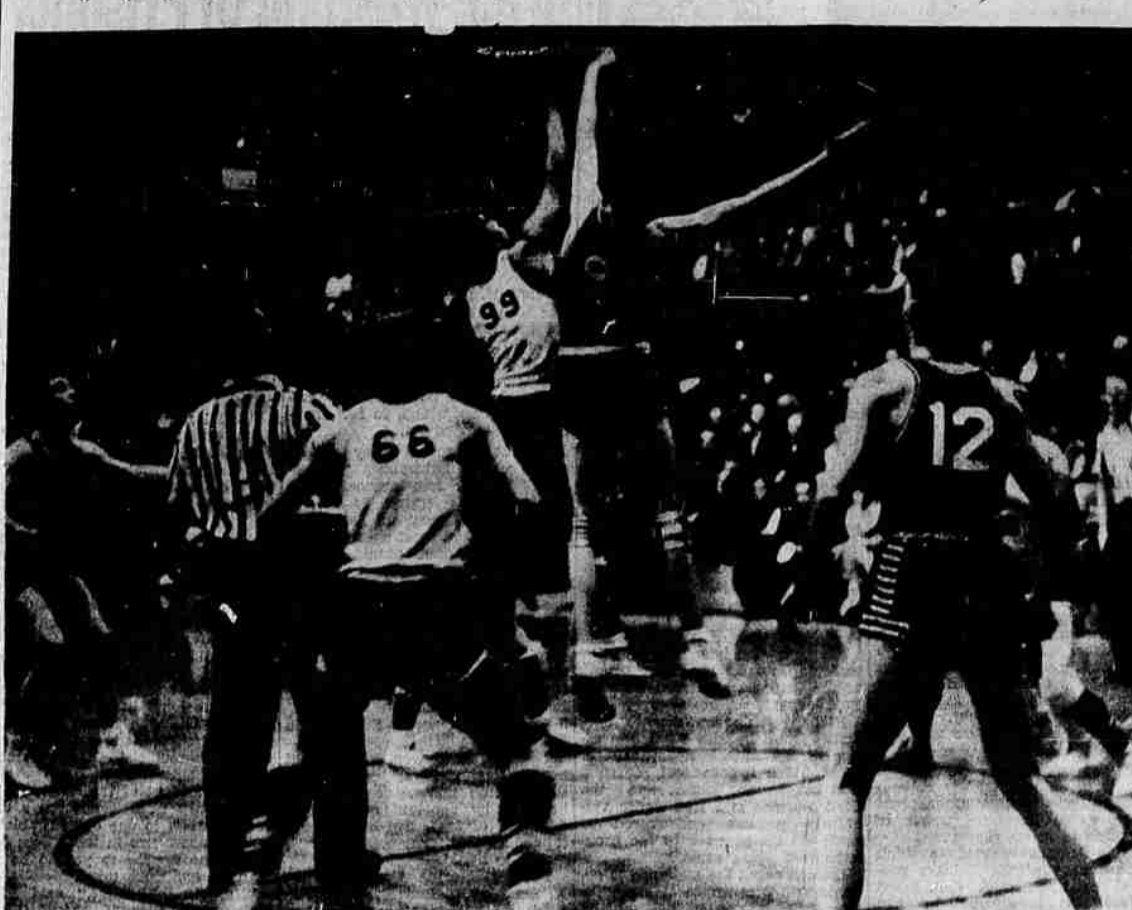

Antlers Face Sacred Heart In Consolation on Upset Victory

Malin and Chiloquin, cream of the crop in the Klamath-Lake County basketball tournament, followed form last night to reach tonight's title tiff on Pelican Court — although a surprise entry is down for action in the preliminary consolation game.
Bonanza, a team that broke a 16-game losing streak with a win over Merrill a few days before the tournament opened, did it again yesterday afternoon by a 44-37 count to qualify for a clash with Sacred Heart, winner over Gilchrist by a 48-39 score, in the consolation house-warmers.
Chiloquin and Malin worked up little more than a healthy sweat last night in wins over Paisley and Bly.
The Chiloquin Panthers clawed the Broncos of Paisley, the lone Lake County entry, 56-36.
The Malin Mustangs, after a shaky first quarter, hit their stride to roll over the Bly Bobcats by and Dick — and Jo Jo George continued hot to give Chiloquin a 39-14 halftime lead.
In the second half Ted Siemens followed up his left-handed hook shot to erase any hope the Paisley courtiers may have cooked up at intermission time.
Coach Frank DiUlio used his reserves generously in the second half but it was 43-27 heading into the last eight-minute stanza.
Ted Siemens ended with 18 points — on nine field goals, George and Dick Siemens contributed 12 and 11 each and Vernon Joe, in addition to a seven-point ante, was up to his usual play-making magic as he engineered the rout.
NO THREAT
Paisley, riding high on an opening-round win over Sacred Heart, never brewed up a threat in the entire contest.
Bly handed Malin a bunch of trouble for a quarter and a half but the Mustangs started living up to advance notices midway in the second to whip up a scoring binge that gave them a 24-14 halftime lead and it was all over but the shouting from the Mustang disciples.
Lavon Travis, a surprise starter for the Mustangs, showed his appreciation of Coach Jim Conroy's nomination with an outstanding performance in the scoring department and on the floor. He ended with 13 points, high for the Mustangs, as all but one of the 10 players Conroy used scored.
Rod Hadley, as in last night's win over Bonanza, sparked the Bly Bobcats. He scored 11 points, but did most of his damage in the first half.
Even greater margin, 35-29.
DISTRIBUTE PRIZE
Tonight's winner earns a shot at the Jackson County winner for the Dist. 5 prize and a state tournament berth that goes with it.
Malin, on its 6-0 league record in season play and two wins over Chiloquin (one a king's-Xer), has a host of backers who think the Mustangs have enough kick left to do it again.
But the Panthers, the class of the tournament so far, has just as much support from the gallery gods. Chiloquin's two wins (Gilchrist was the first-round victim) have been more impressive than Malin's pair of conquests (Merrill gave the Mustangs fits in the first-round game before losing, 42-51).
This, together with the fact that Malin's earlier wins over Chiloquin were both by slim two-point margins, have swung enough sentiment toward Chiloquin to make tonight's game a take-your-choice affair.
15-0 LEAD
Nifty ball-handling and scoring depth showed up against Paisley when Chiloquin ran up a 15-0 score in seven minutes before Paisley's stickout cager, Joe Bonarons, broke the spell with just a minute left in the first frame.
It was 17-3 at the quarter, though, and the Siemens brothers — Ted

ARCATA, Calif. (Special) — The Oregon Tech Owls went into overtime last night to shade Humboldt State College, 72-71, in the first of a two-game series.

Ashland whacked Klamath Falls and Grants Pass bumped Medford last night, any one of which would have spelled finish for the Klamath Pelicans in their slender mathematical chance to wind up on top in the Southern Oregon Big Four basketball race.
Ashland grabbed the lead in the early moments of the game on its own floor and led the rest of the way in a 61-45 win over the Pelicans.
Grants Pass took care of Medford by a 54-32 count.
The same teams mix again tonight.
Grants Pass clinched a tie for the title on its win and has to win just one of its three remaining games to put a secure knot on the championship.
The Pelicans enjoyed a momentary lead last night when Larry Yarnell opened the scoring with a free throw. But the Grizzlies soon erased the 1-0 Klamath lead and went on to post a 17-6 lead at the end of the first quarter.
It was 34-20 at the half, 53-31 at the end of three stanzas and the Pelicans never threatened although Don Mills, the only Pelican to hit two figures with 13 points, scored 8 of those points in a second-quarter upsurge. But Ashland was keeping pace as Walt McCoy; Ted Tenney, Jerry Mickle and Al Watrus all found double figures. McCoy had 14, Tenney and Mickle 13 and Watrus 12.
Klamath Coach Paul McCall used platoons throughout the game in an attempt to turn the tide, employing 15 players in all.

Castellani Asks For Title Shot After Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Rocky Castellani sought a middleweight title shot today after trouncing Ernie Durando for his eighth straight victory.
"Will get up whatever guarantee is needed to assure Rocky a crack at either Bobo Olson or Kid Gavilan for Cleveland this summer," said co-manager Alvin Naiman of Cleveland.
If Olson, the 160-pound champion, beats back the challenge of Gavilan, the welterweight king, in Chicago April 2, such an outdoor show seems likely. But if Gavilan takes Bobo's crown, he'll have to give Olson a return bout. That would kill Castellani's hopes for a summer shot.
The No. 1 middleweight contender will be kept busy with fights in Grand Rapids and Akron, meanwhile, said co-manager Tex Sullivan.
It was an easy one all right. Castellani had to bottle up Durando's right hand power last night and he did just that. In the ninth the heavy-listed Bayonne bomber hurt Castellani with one right to the chin but that was the only good one to the head he got in all night. Rocky fought him right back after it.
Castellani, a 3-1 choice, jabbed, hooked and danced his way to a big lead through the first six rounds. In the seventh, he figured it was time to give the \$588 fans (\$19,355 gross gate) in the Garden and the countless TV viewers a show and he opened up with a series of right hand smashes that shook Ernie.
The unanimous vote for Castellani was: Referee Al Berl, 8-2; Judge Harold Barnes, 7-3-1, and Judge Jack Gordon, 9-0-1. The AP card had the Cleveland 4-1 winner.
Rocky weighed 160 1/2, Durando 160.

A's Trade Dave Philley Patty Berg In Front

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The management of the Philadelphia Athletics must be clairvoyant. Why else would they trade a veteran outfielder like Dave Philley, who hit .303 last year, for a pair of 24-year-old untested minor league pitchers.
The A's sent Philley to the Cleveland Indians Friday for pitchers Leroy Wheat and Bill Upton. Wheat appeared in only 12 games last year for the Tulsa Oilers in the Class AA Texas League and wound up with an .01 record. Upton posted a 10-8 log with Indianapolis of the A-American Association.
Earle Mack, vice president of the Athletics, admitted Philley was traded because he wanted more salary than the club was willing to pay him.
Mack said the A's offered Philley a \$6,000 raise which would have put the outfielder in the \$20,000 bracket. Philley has declared he was never offered more than half that increase.
MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Chicago's Patty Berg enjoyed a shaky one-stroke lead Saturday as a tough field of pros and amateurs teed off in the third round of the \$5,000 Scribn Women's Invitational Golf Tournament.
Miss Berg shot a steady 72 Friday, two under women's par for the Bayshore Municipal Course, to move into in front with a 73-hole total of 145.
One stroke behind was Atlanta's veteran Louise Suggs, with a pair of 73s for 146. Betsy Rawls, National Open champion from Spartanburg, S.C., was third with 147, and Babe Zaharias, now playing out of Chicago, also was in hot pursuit with 148.
Heading a sturdy field of amateurs was Vonnie Colby of Hollywood, Fla., who tied for fifth place at 151 with professional Marilyn Smith of Wichita, Kan.

Finns Win Ski Relay

FALUN, Sweden (AP)—Little Finland won the world's 40-kilometer Nordic ski relay championship Saturday after Arvo Vitanen completely outpaced Russia's Aleksei Kusnetsov in the third lap.
Finland's time was 2:18:37.
Vladimir Kusin, the world 30-kilometer cross country champion, barely managed to assure Russia of second place when he raced the last leg against Sweden's anchor man, Per-Erik Parson.
Russia's time was 2:15:07 and Sweden's time was 2:18:20.
The race practically was won in the third lap when Vitanen of Finland pushed ahead of Russia and built up a comfortable time margin.
