Ike To Hear Dulles Report
 PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Vacationing President Eisenhower will return to Washington Wednesday morning and get a report on the Berlin Big Four conference a few hours later from Secretary of State Dulles.
 The President's plans were announced here yesterday by his press secretary, James C. Hagerty who told newsmen Eisenhower had sent a message congratulating Dulles on "the fine job he did" at the conference.
 The President and Mrs. Eisenhower plan to board their private plane Columbine Tuesday evening for an overnight flight to the capital.
 They have been vacationing at this desert resort since late last Wednesday.
 Eisenhower planned to get back on the golf course today after a quiet Sunday. He and the First Lady attended services yesterday at the Protestant Community Church of Palm Springs, where the pastor—Dr. James H. Blackstone Jr.—praised them for devotion to Christian principles.
 The pastor said their regular attendance at church services had inspired "many, many thousands to think of righteousness."

Fire Chief Dies From Injuries
 PASCO, (AP)—Overcome by smoke while fighting a home fire, Pasco Fire Chief Larry Mathias died Sunday en route to a hospital.
 Asst. Chief Lyle Cooney said Mathias, 40, was trapped in the basement of the burning home when smoke and flames drove other firemen outside.
 The firemen fought their way back into the building when they discovered Mathias was not with them, Cooney said, and found the chief unconscious on the floor.
 Mathias was married but had no children. He had been fire chief here since January 1946.

Malenkov Said Eager For Meets

BERLIN (AP)—Communist officials and newsmen depict Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov as wanting to meet British Prime Minister Churchill and perhaps President Eisenhower. These sources also pictured Malenkov as gaining personal popularity at home and in other Communist nations.
 These opinions were voiced by Russian and satellite people here last week for the Big Four foreign ministers' conference. If they were intended as a trial balloon to sound out Western reaction, then they were well planned, with just about every pro-Moscow group briefed ahead of time.
 Opening up to Westerners to an unprecedented degree during the conference, a Russian official said frankly Malenkov wants to meet Churchill and possibly Eisenhower too, Polish and Czechoslovak newsmen said this was true, and East German Communist authorities concurred.
 "You can take this as at least semi-official," said one satellite source. "We know Malenkov wants a meeting and we want it too because we think something could be accomplished."
 Just as interesting were the comparisons of Malenkov with his predecessor, Stalin. The informants said Malenkov has impressed his own people and those in the Soviet orbit as a man less whimsical than Stalin and thus less likely to push the world into a new war that would mean their destruction regardless of the winner.
 "Malenkov is a smart man," said the satellite source. "He is not a genius but he is what you call a good housekeeper. We feel safer with him than we did with Stalin, who was a genius. But the question of war and peace is so delicate in these times that genius can ruin you."
 The communists who talked about Malenkov gave no hint of what they thought the Soviet Premier might offer as his proposed solution to Cold War tensions. But they seemed confident talks between the chiefs of state would produce something.

Lana Turner Back From Europe; Lauds Marilyn

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Marilyn Monroe may be beleaguered by her studio and badgered by rival actresses but she has one firm fan—Lana Turner.
 "Marilyn is one girl I'd like to meet," says the glamor Wood. "I've followed her career and I think she's got a lot of spunk. She must be a very interesting person."
 "Now that she's on top, she'll be hit from all sides. I know just how it is. I've been taking it for 17 years in this business."
 Lana made these remarks over cocktails in a quiet corner of a Sunset Strip restaurant. As we talked, several men came by and sat at nearby tables. They stared at the actress and I could sense they were thinking "That doll looks familiar, but who is she?"
 She seemed happy with this fragment of privacy. If her hair were its familiar blonde, the male admirers would have recognized and besieged her for autographs. Her present shade is a dark brown, and she is delighted with it.
 "Some people like it, some hate it," she laughed. "Everyone seems to have an opinion. I think it's a great situation: it's a controversy without a scandal. What could be more ideal?"
 Lana said that she reverted to her more natural shade for a good reason: her two pictures in Europe called for a dark-haired girl. In "The Flame and the Flesh" she plays a fiery Italian girl, a part very unlike the usual Lana Turner role. She wears one suit through the film. In "Betrayed" she plays a Dutch spy who dyes her hair dark.
 Lana is changed in more ways than her hair. She returned from her 10 months in Europe with a new husband and a new attitude toward life. She seems happier and more at ease than I have ever seen her.
 "The life of a movie star is great, except for all the bother that goes with it," she reflected. "I love the work; there's nothing more exciting than getting into a role that presents a challenge.
 "It's the other stuff that can make you miserable. The things that have been said and printed about me—I'd have to be eight different people to do all the things I'm supposed to have done.
 "I used to worry a great deal about such things. But now I have a different attitude. I figure this way: the only person you have to answer to is the one you face in the mirror every morning. If you yourself know that you have done what is right, that's all you have to worry about."
 She added that she and her handsome husband, Lex Barker, are aiming to lead a quiet life. "We stay home a great deal," she said. "We pass up the parties that look as though they might turn into brawls. We're happy to let the others have the front pages."
