Chilquin Nipped In Title Scrap, 50-49

Malin is two games away from a trip to Salem and a berth in the Class B state basketball tournament March 11-13 after a fictional 50-49 win over Chilquin Saturday night here that gave the Mustangs the Klamath-Lake County title and a Dist. 5-B shot at the Talent Bulldogs, Jackson County champions.

The Malin-Talent showdown series site and date hasn't been confirmed yet.

Sacred Heart won the consolation final from Bonanza by a 39-24 score Saturday night.

A capacity crowd near the roof of Pelican Court in the championship scrap, particularly in the second half when Chilquin rallied to wipe out a 23-27 intermission deficit and then fought the Mustangs right down to the wire when never more than four points separated the two teams in the last two periods.

LONG SHOT
A long shot by Lavon Travis and a free throw by Virgil Rick gave the Mustangs the slim one-point victory in the last two minutes of play.

Jo Jo George, Chilquin's cucumber-cool forward, calmly dunked a layup to give the Panthers a 49-47 lead when Malin roared down the floor and Travis took aim well past the key. Just two minutes were left when the ball hit dead center to tie the count at 49-49.

When Vernon Joe fouled Rick, it was the Chilquin field general's fifth foul and he watched with tears in his eyes from the bench as the Malin captain made good on his first of two from the charity line.

Malin got the rebound when Rick missed his second shot and played catch as the Panthers tried desperately to get hold of the ball for a last shot at the basket.

SEVEN SECONDS
But the cat-and-mouse game ticked off the time and there was just seven seconds left when Chilquin managed to bring a whistle on a jump ball.

But Rod Lyon got the tip and was shoved out of bounds by George as he closed in for a layup that missed fire as the final buzzer sounded.

Malin jumped into a 13-9 first-quarter lead then nipped up a 10-point advantage at 11-21 after Vernon Joe closed it to 11-13.

That's when the spunky Panthers staged their first rally to close it to 20-21 on a layup by Ted Siemens, another by George, a free throw by Dick Siemens, and two more two-pointers by George.

But Ray Johnson and Norm Oliva hit in that order and the Panthers had another uphill climb on their hands.

TAKE CHARGE
But George and Dick Siemens took charge after the rest period as Jo Jo, on a layup and free throw, cut it down to 25-27. Lyon's jump shot worked once for Malin but George and Dick Siemens retaliated with two baskets in a row to tie it at 29 and Dick Siemens gave Chilquin its first lead of the game — except for Vernon Joe's first basket of the game — at 31-29.

Travis, on a layup and jump shot, tied it at 35-35 and from that point every basket brought the crowd to its feet as the two teams battled right down to the end.

From the 35-35 deadlock, Dick Siemens tossed in a free throw and added a layup to give Chilquin a three-point lead. Rick on a jump shot and Lyon with a hook gave the lead back to Malin but George and the two teams into the fourth quarter tied at 40-40 with a free throw.

SCORES FIRST
George scored first under the fourth-quarter tipoff and the Panthers went ahead 45-41 later when George stole the ball at midcourt and raced down for another layup. Vernon Joe added a free throw.

But when Ivan Joe fouled out with 4:08 to go, Travis made good on a free throw and Rick followed with a jump shot to put Malin just one point shy of a tie at 44-45. Lyon tied it at 45 with 3:10 left on a free throw, then Vernon Joe scored on a jump shot and Chilquin was ahead 47-45. Then Lyon and George traded cory layups and it was 49-47 Chilquin with just two minutes left.

Then came Travis' long conversion and Rick's all-important shot on the house.

Bonanza gave Sacred Heart trouble in the consolation game and trailed just 13-15 at the half and tied it at 18-18 early in the third.

But three straight set shots by Dino Reginato late in the third gave the Trojans a 27-20 lead beginning the fourth quarter and the Academy breezed in from there over the cinderella team of the tournament.

The curtain all but rings down this week on the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball race with Oregon State leading the reins but still threatened, albeit ever so slightly, by Idaho and Oregon.

State Gill's OGC Beavers are riding the top of the standings with a 10-4 record and wind up their season this Friday and Saturday against arch-rival Oregon, in second place at 8-6.

A seven-point split in the series would give the Beavers the division crown.

From there on a number of things conceivably could happen. The race could end up in a tie between Oregon and Oregon State if Oregon sweeps the OGC series and Idaho dropped one of its three remaining games.

THREE-WAY
A three-way tie would go into the books if Idaho, in third at 7-6, won all three of its remaining games with OGC. The three teams would end up with identical 10-6 records.

Washington, fourth with a 5-7 record, and Washington State, the bottom club at 3-10, are completely out of the title picture.

Idaho plays three times this week, taking on Washington State at Pullman Tuesday night and moving to Moscow for a two-game series with Washington Friday and Saturday night.

Washington and Washington State officially wind up the season March 5-6 with two games at Rec Edmondson Pavilion at Seattle.

SIXTH LOSS

Oregon took its sixth loss from Washington, 67-69, Saturday night as sophomore Karl Voegtlin displayed uncanny accuracy from the corner in getting 20 points, the night's high effort.

The Huskies took over from the start and left the floor at the half-time buzzer with a 25-26 advantage. Oregon started hitting in the last half and trimmed the Huskies' lead to one point, at 42-41, midway through the third.

The Huskies shut out the Ducks on field goals for six minutes in the fourth quarter and allowed the same down to hang on for the win.

Oregon State had little trouble with Washington State's Cougars Saturday night, trimming the Pulloune outfit, 62-41, to insure the Beavers at least a share of the division title.

GO AHEAD

The Beavers took over the lead with less than three minutes gone in the first quarter and the issue was never in doubt after that.

Lanky Swede Halbrook of Oregon State and WSC's Ron Bennick led for high-scoring honors with 17 points apiece.

Shooting statistics told the story, with the Beavers hitting on 38 percent of their tries from the field and the Cougars making only eight of 47 tries for a very poor .170 percentage.

After six disastrous conference setbacks on the road that wrecked Klamath Falls' title hopes in the Big Four basketball race, the Pelicans are home this weekend to Grants Pass, the team that clinched the title and a district playoff berth over the weekend with two wins over Medford.

Ashland whipped the Pels by a somewhat closer score Saturday night, 64-58, after a 61-45 win Friday night.

The weekend results took all the shine off the Pelican Court series Friday and Saturday nights and will make the weekend activity — Ashland and Medford also mix in two games — anti climax.

The Cavemen are in and will merely wait for the winner of the six-team, 4-A2 tournament at Crater High Feb. 25-27, with whom they'll quarrel in a two-of-three series for the Dist. 4 state Class A tournament berth.

The lead changed hands three times and the score was tied six times — 13-all at the quarter — in Ashland Saturday night. It continued close in the second quarter with a tip by Jimmy Bevans giving the Pelicans a 23-22 lead, then Walt McCoy made it 24-23 Ashland on a hook shot as the Grizzlies waited into a 31-26 halftime lead.

Ed Barron, who scored 14 for the Pels, then Larry Yarnell bucketed shot from the field in the third to push Klamath Falls within a point of the Grizzlies at 35-36 in the third. But McCoy earned five straight free shots as Ashland went ahead 41-35 and stayed on top the rest of the way, 61-40 heading into the last quarter.

The Klamath club outscored Ashland, 18-13 in the last quarter but had too far to go.

The Pels outshot the Grizzlies from the field, 23-19 but Ashland took advantage of 30 Klamath fouls to dunk 26 free throws to just 14 for the Pels on 17 Ashland fouls.

McCoy ended with 20 points and Ted Tenney added 17 for Ashland. Don Mills chipped in with 10 to go with Barron's 14.

Klamath Falls won the junior varsity preliminary game, 54-17.
