## Police Probe Two Deaths

ROCKVILLE, Ind. (AP)—Two bodies in a wrecked automobile—a woman riddled by bullets and a man without a mar of violence—gave state police and the coroner a mystery today.

Coroner B. M. Merrell said the man was Clarence Anderson, 32-year-old Putnam County farmhand. He planned an autopsy to determine the cause of death.

The woman, in the late 40s, was not positively identified, but the coroner said she closely resembled

a picture Anderson carried in his billfold, which bore the name of Marie Myers, Indianapolis.

The bodies were found in a car which ran off Highway 59 north of Bellmore last night. Anderson was slumped at the wheel, and the woman's body was in the back, covered by blankets. The rear seat cushion had been removed.

Other motorists told the coroner the car went off the road after weaving as if the driver were drunk.

Dr. Merrell said Miss Myers' parents in Indianapolis stated that she left home yesterday to be married to a man who looked like a farmer, whose name they did not know.

The woman apparently had been killed at the tenant home where Anderson lived alone on the farm of Oscar Clodfelter near Russellville, Dr. Merrell said. Anderson was a widower whose children were grown.

Bullet marks and blood stains were found in the home.

## Morse Blasts At GOP Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon fired several more volleys of criticism at the Eisenhower administration over the weekend.

Interviewed on the CBS "Man of the Week" television program, Morse said the administration's economic policies had caused a serious recession.

"The administration should admit that it is trying to readjust itself as a result of some rather serious mistakes they made last spring. The sad fact is that things are not going well economically... They'd better get busy—time is a-wasting," Morse declared.

He proposed that a national network of super highways be built with federal funds to provide jobs and cut traffic deaths.

He also urged that surplus food be given to charitable organizations for distribution to the unemployed and that other surplus food be traded with backward nations for the right of Americans to invest in those countries.

In a statement Saturday, Morse asked Secretary of Interior McKay to clarify his stand on Mountain Sheep Dam.

## Loyalty Law Hit By Church

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles challenges a state law requiring a loyalty oath of nonprofit organizations seeking tax exemption as "a frontal assault on freedom of religion as guaranteed by the First Amendment."

This is the church whose pastor, the Rev. Stephen H. Fritchman, refused to testify before the House Un-American Activities Committee on the ground it sought "to invade the intimate confidence of the confessional."

Mr. Fritchman was listed by the committee as sponsor of "no less than 22 pro-Soviet organizations."

His congregation voted yesterday to instruct its trustees to decide against signing the loyalty oath. The trustees' chairman, Atty. Robert Schmorleitz, said the secretly taken vote was 206 to 31.

Mr. Fritchman did not participate in the discussion before the vote.

A 1953 amendment to the state revenue and taxation code provides that the property tax statement for churches and other nonprofit groups shall include a loyalty oath if tax exemptions are sought.

## CAA Recommends Jet Cargo Planes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) experts have recommended that jet airplanes be tried out as cargo carriers before they enter passenger service in the United States.

That would provide the jet testing and experience required before they are accepted for passenger transportation, a CAA jet evaluation team has decided.

The CAA team has forecast the U.S.-built jet planes will go into airline use between 1957 and 1959.

Jets will be used on domestic routes before they go into over-ocean service. Other sources have predicted that the first U. S. use of jets would be on long overwater flights.

Turboprop planes (jets combined with propellers) may be introduced by the airlines virtually simultaneously with the pure jets.

A practical reverse jet thrust device may be developed in time for use in the first U. S. civil jet transport operation, but further work will be needed on brakes and other decelerating devices.

## Ticking Bomb Found Dud

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A trash collector found what looked like, and ticked like, a bomb in a downtown alley yesterday. He called police.

Police called their crime laboratory director, Ray Pinker, and Army demolition experts.

A policeman stuck a nail into the clock part of the contraption, to stop the ticking, the "bomb" was taken to a field. Police Chief William Parker and Deputy Chief Thad Brown arrived.

A trigger counter was used—negative results. Then the device was tied to a stake. A 50-foot rope was tied to the clock and from a safe distance it was yanked out of the "bomb."

It turned out to be a \$1.95 alarm clock, sponge rubber, rags, paraffin, paper and beeswax.

"I think we've been had," said Brown.

"I'd rather be had than sorry," said Parker.

## RAF Now Has Atomic Bombs

LONDON (AP)—Atom bombs are now being delivered to Britain's rapidly expanding Royal Air Force, Prime Minister Churchill's government announced Monday.

An Air Ministry budget memorandum also disclosed that British jet fighters are being equipped with guided rockets to strengthen defenses against enemy atom bombers.

It said recent successful rocket tests in the Australian desert "foreshadow the most important developments in air defense since the invention of radar."

The memorandum, prepared for Parliament by Air Minister Lord De L'Isle and Dudley, said Britain's air budget for 1954-55 calls for increased spending on aircraft and armament. It includes large deliveries of swift and hunter jet fighters, the first deliveries of top secret swept-wing valiant medium jet bombers and allows for the first time for some atomic bombs.



**M/SGT. WILLIAM D. ROARK**, assistant engineering chief of MAMS 15, recently received a letter of recommendation from the Bureau of Aeronautics in recognition of a tool he designed to reduce time and save money in repairing jet aircraft. The letter was presented by Brig. Gen. John N. Hart, deputy commander of Air FMFPac. Sgt. Roark's design is for a jet combustion chamber remover. He designed a hydraulic check stand in 1946 while serving in Peiping, China, and a cam-lok fastener for FAU in 1947. Sgt. Roark has been stationed at El Toro and Hawaii since returning from Korea. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Roark, Modoc Point.

## Moscow Radio Backs Geneva

LONDON (AP)—Moscow radio said Monday the forthcoming Geneva conference, including Communist China, can help pave the way to a Korean settlement and "the establishment of peace in Indochina."

Quoting from the Communist Party organ Pravda, the English language broadcast heard here said the Western foreign ministers at the recent Berlin conference "had to agree to holding the Geneva conference with the participation of the Chinese Peoples Republic."

It added:

"There can be no doubt that this conference can help to eliminate international tension and to relieve the difficulties blocking a settlement of the Korean question and the establishment of peace in Indochina."

## Air Force Plans MIG 15 Flight

WASHINGTON (AP)—A selected audience will have a chance to see a Russian-built MIG-15 jet fighter plane in flight Wednesday in Dayton, Ohio.

It is the plane a deserting North Korean pilot delivered to U. N. forces, and for which he was paid \$100,000. The Communists have ignored an invitation to reclaim it by proving ownership.

The Air Force has arranged a flight demonstration for newsmen at Wright-Patterson Field, Dayton.

The plane already has been test-flown extensively. The consensus of U. S. pilots who have studied it is that, overall, it does not match the F86 fighter in performance and is considerably inferior in equipment.

The manager, Don Gibbons, arrived and the two robbers got \$700 more from the box office.

## Wiley Blasts Bricker Bill Changes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wiley (R-Wis) today denounced as a "hodge-podge" White House-approved changes the Senate has voted in a proposed constitutional amendment by Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio) to curb treaty powers.

Wiley, who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said in an interview he believes one change—to require all past and future treaties to be made in "pursuance" of the Constitution—"would raise Cain in the courts."

This proposal, adopted by a 44-43 vote of the Senate last week, would make all past and future treaties subject to court review on their constitutionality.

It was combined with proposals to require Senate roll-call votes on treaties and other international agreements conform to the Constitution to make up what now is known as the administration's bill.

Wiley, who has opposed any change in the Constitution at this time, said he hopes this measure—no other that comes up for a final vote in the Senate—can be defeated outright.

Wiley added, however, that he is going to canvass the situation in advance and may vote for a proposal by Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) to send the whole subject back to the Judiciary Committee.

The CIO Executive Committee, in a statement last night, said the chief backers of Bricker's proposal are diehard elements trying to force the United States into "self-defeating isolationism." The statement urged defeat of the Bricker amendment and "any compromise which would appease" its backers.

No votes were scheduled today. Both the Senate and House planned no activity other than the traditional reading of George Washington's Farewell Address.

## Bribe Charges Rock Japanese

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's political crisis boiled up anew today as a political opponent of Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida indirectly accused two Cabinet ministers of accepting million-yen bribes from a shipbuilding company.

Yoshida's opponent, Progressive party Diet Member Yashuhiro Nakasone, named the bribe takers as Transportation Minister Akiyoshi Ichi and State Minister Banboku Ono.

Both Cabinet members immediately went before the same Diet committee at which the charge was aired and denied receiving bribe money. Both demanded that Nakasone give the source of his information.

It is the latest development in a series of charges and counter-charges of kickbacks and lush entertainments for government officials by representatives of companies doing business with the government.

Yoshida himself has scorned the charges of scandal in his administration and apparently is planning to fight the issue out without resigning or dissolving his Cabinet or the Diet.

## Earth Tremors Disrupt City

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. (AP)—An earthquake-like series of tremors rocked an eight-block residential area Sunday causing extensive damage and disrupting gas and water supplies to some 1,600 persons.

The brief series of earth movements left streets ripped up and partly covered with water from broken mains. Fumes from cracked gas lines resulted in an all night vigil by police and firemen.

There were no injuries.
