# Milwaukie Collects All Votes

For the first time of the season, Milwaukie is the unanimous selection as the No. 1 team in the weekly Associated Press poll on high school basketball in Oregon.

Milwaukie, which now has 19 victories in 20 games, has been the No. 1 team all season, but never before was it able to corral all the sports writers' votes for first place.

No new teams appeared in the top 10 this week, but the others were shuffled about as several upsets were scored.

**TUMBLE**  
Eugene tumbled before Salem, 57-51, and fell from second to third place. Corvallis scored two more victories and moved back into second place, a position it held until last week's displacement.

Roosevelt of Portland managed to hold on to the No. 4 spot, despite a loss in city play, and Marshfield continued in No. 5, after scoring two wins in subdistrict play.

For the remaining positions the voting was closer than ever. Only eight points separated Albany, which wound up in the No. 6 spot, and Grants Pass, the No. 10 team.

- This week the order from 6 through 10 was: Albany, Grants Pass, Baker, Salem and Grants Pass. Last week it was Baker, Salem, Grants Pass, Albany and Grants Pass. Albany's climb stemmed from a 54-40 victory over Salem, which also accounted for Salem's fall to ninth place. Baker also lost one game over the weekend, and fell two places in the poll.

# Hornets Bid for Title

## Henley Five Paired With Eagle Point

At Fairchild's Henley Hornets go in search of the Dist. 4-A2 basketball title in a Thursday-through-Saturday tournament at Crater High School near Medford.

It's a six-team sub-district cage meet, the winner of which will face Grants Pass for the Dist. 4 championship and a berth in the state's Class A tournament March 16-20 at the University of Oregon, Eugene.

The Hornets, graduated to A-2 this season, notched a 17-4 record on an independent schedule that included all of their former playmates in the Klamath County Class B league.

**OPENS THURSDAY**  
The tourney opens Thursday night with Henley facing Eagle Point and Brookings meeting Illinois Valley. Crater High, the tourney favorite, and Phoenix draw first-round byes but meet in one of the two championship semifinal games Friday along with the winners of the Thursday night games.

Saturday night the championship game is in the main event spot, preceded by the consolation final and the tilt for third and fourth place.

Brookings, along with Henley, has not met the four teams in the Jackson-Douglas-Josephine league but are making a bid for the tournament title and shot at Grants Pass, a team that has already tied down the 4-A1 crown.

**UNDETECTED**  
Fairchild, who has done a good deal of mixing with his starting lineup, said yesterday he "hadn't decided" who would get opening nods.

But forwards will likely come from Bob Hill, Melvin Kaylor and Ray Seary. Louie Zarosinski is a likely starter at center, while guards will be chosen from Bill Seaberry, Rod Wright, Morris Parker and Dale Seary.

Francis Roberts, who injured his ankle in a recent game, may sit on the sidelines for the tourney.

## Kentucky's 'Big 3' Near Bow-out

NEW YORK (AP)—The sun won't shine bright on the home of Kentucky basketball today, for the three big stars have played their last game there.

All America Cliff Hagan, Frank Ramsey and Lou Tsiropoulos, the last remaining members of Kentucky's 1951 national champions, bowed out on the Lexington, Ky., court in fine style last night as they led Kentucky to a 100-64 rout of Vanderbilt. With Hagan getting 22 points, Tsiropoulos 20 and Ramsey 19, the big three came close to tying Vandy all by themselves.

Barred from play last year by the NCAA, they have two more regular season games away from home, then in all probability will wind up their college careers in a playoff with Louisiana State for the Southeastern Conference championship. Even if Kentucky wins that one, the three can't play in the NCAA tourney because they're now postgraduates.

**KEEP PACE**  
LSU kept pace with Kentucky in the SEC race by whipping Alabama 79-65 as 6-9 Bob Pettit, the best basketball player in the bayous for years, closed his home career with a 35-point scoring outburst.

Even though the big three have played their last game at home, the picture is brighter today for Kentucky, ranked second in the country behind Duquesne, than for third-ranked Indiana. The proud Hoosiers, expecting to clinch a tie for the Big Ten conference before the home folks, were rudely jolted by Iowa's brash sophomores 82-64.

With second-year man Mill Scheurman stealing the ball and classmate Bill Seaberry putting it in the basket (for 21 points all told), Iowa took the lead in the second quarter and held it the rest of the way. The upset, coupled with Illinois' 66-64 thriller over Wisconsin on two free throws by Jim Wright with a minute to play, left Indiana in front with a 10-2 record. But Iowa is 9-3 and Illinois 8-3.

**NO CHANCES**  
Duquesne took no chances of similar trouble against Bowling Green, stopping the Ohio team with five points in the third quarter while racking up a 79-52 victory. It was the 22nd victory without a defeat for the defense-minded Dukes. Kentucky also boasts a 22-0 slate.

Western Kentucky, No. 4 team in the latest Associated Press poll, closed out its home season with a 92-77 victory over Cincinnati, and Notre Dame, No. 6, turned on the steam in the fourth quarter to down Pennsylvania 62-47.

Tulsa clouted Detroit 89-70 in a Missouri Valley Conference game while Wichita was dumping Houston 36-81 in another conference game.

All Wichita has to do now is beat Oklahoma A&M, No. 5 team in the country, Wednesday.

Princeton edged Yale 59-57 on Dick Batt's layup with five seconds remaining.

**OUT**  
Arizona dropped out of the running for the Border Conference crown after bowing to Texas Tech, the league leader, 97-68.

Kansas forged ahead of Colorado in the tight Big Seven race by making the most of its free throws for a 67-62 win over Nebraska. The losers made 24 fields goals to Kansas' 18, but only 14 free throws to Kansas' 31.

Furman's Frank Selvy continued his amazing scoring by dumping 41 points in Furman's 85-76 victory over Richmond. He now has 1,041 on the season, and 2,370 for his career.

St. Francis of Brooklyn became the seventh team in the National Invitation Tournament field, joining Duquesne, Western Kentucky, Wichita, Dayton, Niagara and Louisville.

The Yankees and Dodgers will play a night exhibition game at Miami, March 19.

## OCE Protest Disallowed

Oregon College's recent written protest after a 54-52 loss to Portland State in an Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball game has been disallowed, according to Winston Purvine, vice president of the league and director of Oregon Tech.

The protest, lodged officially by Dr. Bob Livingston, OCE coach, was turned over to Purvine and Dr. Frank Bennett, president of Eastern Oregon College at La Grande. Both Oregon Tech and Eastern Oregon are members of the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

Purvine issued this joint statement to the Herald and News: "From information submitted, it appears to us (Purvine and Bennett) improper and impossible to reverse decision of the game officials."

Livingston contended that the winning basket by Portland State's Syl Hannon came after the final buzzer.

## Reynolds Comes to Terms With Yankees

NEW YORK (AP)—The world champion New York Yankees had about everything but a brass band out to meet their big chief, Alie Reynolds, today when the aging hurler checked into their St. Petersburg, Fla., camp.

A holdout until last night, Reynolds came to terms with General Manager George Weiss in a telephone conversation from his Oklahoma City home. He assured Weiss he would get the first plane for the Southland.

Reynolds' signing is a significant one for the Yanks, who still have a dozen discontented athletes to round up, including such first-line pitchers as Vic Raschi and Whitey Ford. The Yank brass regarded Reynolds as the key man in the holdout siege. They figured that when they signed him, the rest would fall in line soon. They probably will.

**MUM**  
Whether Reynolds got his \$2,500 raise, neither he nor Weiss would say. But it was Weiss who made the phone call and Alie certainly doesn't need the money he makes out of baseball to keep himself. So it's fairly certain that he got the \$40,000 he was asking.

**CONDITIONING**  
Manager Paul Richards of the Chicago White Sox has divided his squad into three units with emphasis on conditioning pitchers.

Chicago Cubs have only one man named, catcher Bob Murray, a graduate engineer from the University of Arizona who hasn't decided whether to go into baseball.

Catcher Del Crandall will act as field captain of the Braves.

Seven clubs now are holding organized workouts, although the official training season doesn't start until March 1. Besides the Yanks, the Baltimore Orioles, the Milwaukee Braves, Philadelphia Phillies, New York Giants, Boston Red Sox and Detroit Tigers are limbering up.
