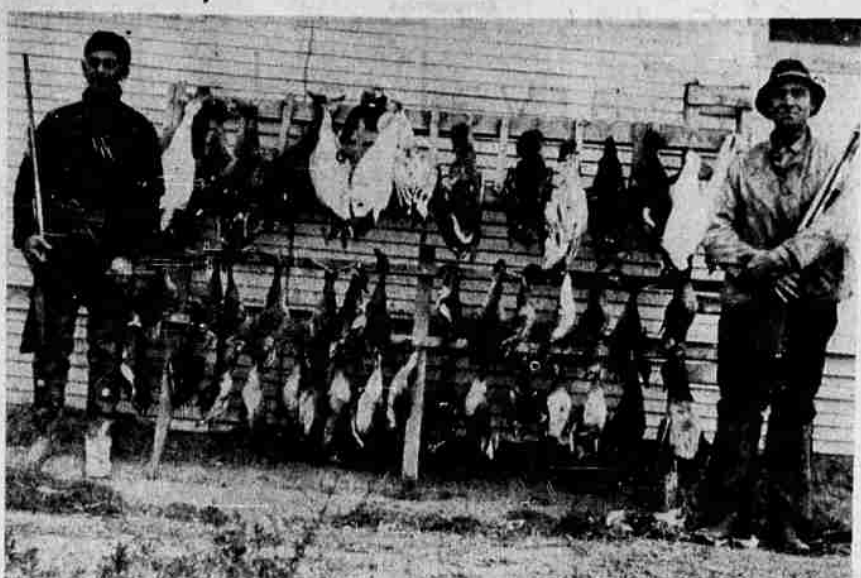

Jobless Lists Announced

Oregon's non-farm employment last month was ten thousand lower than a year ago, but at 431,000, was higher than any previous January. The drop of 25,000 from the previous month was about the same as in recent post-holiday periods.

The estimates were made by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission in cooperation with the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and were based on reports from more than 1,200 representative employers.

Declines in lumber and logging and in trade were responsible for the difference in the number of jobs. Wood products firms reported 65,500, of whom 59,900 were in logging and sawmills, against 73,500 a year ago and 71,100 in December, 1953. Retail trade employing 76,500 was 2,500 below last year but higher than in previous Januarys. Wholesale trade, railroads and furniture manufacturing also were off slightly.

Gains over previous winters were shown in metals, ship repairing, service and governmental activities although the latter two groups registered the usual drop from the holidays. Construction and food processing while declining seasonally also compared well with recent years.

Two Jima Peaceful, Quiet, As Japanese Start Salvage Of Junked War Machines

TWO JIMA (AP)—The Japanese are back on Two Jima, the sulphur-pocked island which in World War II cost the U. S. Marines 20,000 casualties to win.

Two hundred and fifty Japanese workmen are salvaging junk left over from the fighting nine years ago to ship back to Japanese factories.

They are working under an agreement between the U. S. military and a Japanese firm. American salvage firms turned down the project as uneconomical because of the distances involved and present U. S. scrap prices.

Atop Mt. Surabachi, the Amer-

ican flag flies where it was planted Feb. 23, 1945—one of the few spots where the Stars and Stripes are never lowered.

"We use about one flag a week," said Maj. Harry M. Edwards of Gleason, Tenn., executive officer at an Air Force base used by trans-Pacific planes.

Nearby are four shrines for the 23,000 Japanese defenders killed. Japan was permitted to send religious groups to build them.

Looking down on the black sands of the invasion beach from atop Surabachi, it is hard to believe that any force could storm up that open stretch in the face of 135 dug-in positions commanding every inch of the approach.

Japanese workmen have removed almost every sign of the heavy casualties. Still being removed, however, is a landing ship which had been washed high up on the beach, then covered by the sand.

Workmen are digging it out and cutting it up with torches. There still is plenty of evidence of the beating Japan took. The gun

ports and block houses along the cliffs bear multiple marks of machine gun, rifle and grenade attack.

The stench of volcanic sulphur still dominates the air but the scenery has changed. New foliage has appeared. Some spots have a jungle appearance.

One of the island's three air strips, with a 10,000-foot runway, remains in use. The Air Force keeps a 350-man force there.

High grass today covers the area where the 5th Marines cut across the southwest end and isolated Surabachi.

The Amphitheater and Death Valley, the two points where the fighting stalled for a time, today are parts of the big landing strip.

A U. S. Coast Guard long-range navigation station stands on the northeast corner, where the Japanese made their final stand and where their commander was slain.

On a sandstone cliff in this sector is a cut-out replica of the flag-raising ceremony on Surabachi. Beneath it is inscribed "W. L. Rich, 31st NCB (Navy Construction Battalion) July 27, 1945."

The Japanese junkyard is on the beach opposite the invasion beach. A Japanese workman is cutting up
