The year 1950 was when the state high schools were divided into districts for wrestling tournaments. At that time there were four districts. At the present time about 50 schools in the state support wrestling teams. Klamath has rated highly in the past district and sub-district tournaments, having won all four team championships and placed 32 champions, 18 runners-up, 13 third and 12 fourth places, making a grand total of 78 placements.

U.S. Embassy Housing Probed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigating congressmen say they found 12 British tenants living in the American embassy in London—and getting room service for meals—because American purchasing agents showed "very poor judgment" in acquiring the property.

The congressmen said they also found instances of "inexcusable inefficiency" and extravagance in a survey of the land and buildings bought by the State Department from Tokyo in London.

In Rome, 33 embassy housing units cost \$21,057 each, without furnishings, the congressmen reported. This is as expensive as the frequently investigated new housing project in Bonn, Germany, they added.

Their comments were made during hearings, made public Tuesday, by a House Appropriations Subcommittee on the State Department budget. The survey was made last fall by Reps. Bow (R-Ohio), Coon (R-Ore) and Preston (D-Ga.).

The congressmen said the United States bought property in London's Grosvenor Square with leases outstanding for as long as 21 years, some of them executed during negotiations for the sale.

Applicants must have high moral and personal qualifications as determined by a board of Air Force officers.

The family came here from Reno where they lived for 10 years. Mr. and Mrs. Rassuchine became citizens of the United States in 1941.
