

Egyptian Leader Ousted; Syria Has Similar Crisis

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — One of the Middle East's "strong men" — Gen. Mohamed Naguib of Egypt — was ousted on Thursday and another — President Adiv Shishkly of Syria — was on a shaky seat.

Egypt's ruling revolutionary council dropped Naguib as president and premier of the young republic on charges that he was trying to pull Egypt "back to absolute dictatorship."

To replace him as premier, the council named hard-boiled Lt. Col. Gamal Abdel Nasser, the driving force behind the army coup that ousted King Farouk from the throne 19 months ago.

In Syria, radio Aleppo said a large section of the Syrian army had revolted against Shishkly. An

earlier Aleppo broadcast, heard in London, claimed — without confirmation — Shishkly had been overthrown. Broadcasts from Damascus, the Syrian capital, made no mention of any kind of trouble whatever.

The Aleppo broadcast said troops from Aleppo and the northern districts of Syria had seized Aleppo, largest city in the country, and declared open rebellion under the leadership of Col. Mustafa Hamoud.

Calling Shishkly "a tyrant, oppressor and slave of the Imperialists," the broadcast said Hamoud had given the president an ultimatum to resign by Thursday night and leave the country within 24 hours.

The Egyptian chief's ouster was announced following a heated session of the 11 young army officers making up the council that has ruled Egypt since the ouster of Farouk.

A council communique declared Naguib was suffering from "a psychological crisis" and reported unanimous acceptance of a resignation it said he had submitted Monday.

Although the council picked Nasser, who had served as Naguib's deputy premier, to take over the premiership, it left the presidency vacant.

British diplomatic sources said it was too early to speculate on what effect the changeover might have on British — Egyptian negotiations over the Suez Canal, a sore point in relations between the two countries.

PORTLAND (AP) — There will be no bluebird houses along Oregon's highways. The State Highway Commission Wednesday decided to tell Mrs. Claire Douglas of Ingle River that only official informational markers are allowable. That has long been policy.

Mrs. Douglas, Siskiyou District director of Garden Clubs, Inc., wanted permission to put up 25 bluebird houses between Central Point and Oakland. Now a Blue Star Highway, a war memorial, the garden club wanted to turn it also into a bluebird highway.

In another roadside matter, the commission agreed to cooperate again this year with farmers in the Heppner and Arlington areas in burning off dry vegetation along the highways before a fire menace is created.

Foresters To Be Shifted

PORTLAND (AP) — Six supervisors of national forests in the Pacific Northwest will be shifted in mid-year, when John R. Bruckart retires as supervisor of the Willamette National Forest in Oregon.

The changes were announced here by Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone, who said Robert Aufderheide, now head of the Umpqua Forest in Oregon, would succeed Bruckart.

Bruckart spent his forest service career in the Northwest. He began 45 years ago as a guard in the Snoqualmie Forest in Washington.

Aufderheide's post in the Umpqua Forest will be taken over by Yondis E. Miller, now supervisor of the Ochoco Forest in Central Oregon. Oleon Clark, who heads the Malheur Forest in Southeast Oregon, will move to the Ochoco.

J. Malcolm Loring will take over the Malheur. He now is supervisor of the Cheilan Forest in Washington. Chester E. Bennett, who supervises the Wallowa Forest of Oregon, will move to the Cheilan, and H. S. Coons, Whitman Forest supervisor, will take over the consolidated Wallowa-Whitman Forest.
